## Town Warrant

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Sagadahoc, ss.

To Collingwood C. Shea, Constable of the Town of  
Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall, in said town, on the third day of March, A. D. 1930, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers.

Art. 4. To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor and all other necessary town officers.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

- Art. 7 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensaing year.
- Art. 9 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10 To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid road, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916
- Art. 11 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$300.00 for the improvement of the section of state aid road, as outlined by the state highway commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section, 18 Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 12 To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

- Art. 14 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of state aid highway during the ensuing year.
- Art. 15 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to lay out a town road on land of R. F. Stinson, known as the Cut-off, and to pay reasonable damage for same.
- Art. 16 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to expend the sum of \$300.00 for the improvement of the road near Ralph Stinson's, the same to be taken from any unexpended money in the treasury, a like amount having been asked from the state, as a Special Resolve for the same purpose.
- Art. 17 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to expend the sum of \$150.00 on the unimproved town road, for the purpose of drilling, the same to be taken from any unexpended money in the treasury.
- Art. 18 To see if the town will authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to procure a loan, or loans, of sums of money, as may be necessary to pay demands against the town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to act as agents for Arrowsic bridge for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20 To see if the town will vote to accept list of jurors, as prepared by town officers.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to be used with Federal and State aid to combat the white pine blister rust.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote for mothers' aid.

Art. 24. To see what salaries or wages shall be paid the town officers.

The Selectmen will be in session at the town hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

## IN GENERAL

A school year of 32 weeks was maintained this year. The attendance has been somewhat broken by the whooping cough and bad colds.

Three pupils, Alma Pierce, Ruth Lawrence and Frank Stafford, were graduated from the eighth grade, which allowed them to enter a secondary school last fall.

Miss Maxine Walker severed her connection with the teaching corps of Union 48 and accepted a school in Southington, Connecticut. Her resignation was received with regrets, as Miss Walker's training and experience demanded a larger field of labor.

The fall term was under the guidance of Miss Priscilla Hodge of Bath, a normal school graduate of last June. As this was Miss Hodge's first term of school, lack of experience in rural school work was her only handicap.

We were very pleased to secure Miss Doris Worcester of Bangor for the winter term. Miss Worcester's work was very well done during the eight weeks' term. It is hoped she will return for the spring term.

The school is well equipped with a piano, victrola, a small library, a drinking fountain, a reading table, and a sink for washing the face and hands of the pupils. Towels and drinking cups are furnished the pupils.

The school needs better blackboards and several reference books for the library.
