## Town Warrant

SAGADAHOC, SS.

To Collingwood C. Shea, Constable of the Town of Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc,

#### GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall in said town on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

- ART. 2—To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers.
- ART. 4—To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 5—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.
- ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor.
- ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

- ART. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- ART. 10—To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 20, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- ART. 11—To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.
- ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of State Aid Highway during the ensuing year.
- ART. 14—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay for cutting bushes to comply with Sec. 3, Chapter 145 from any unexpended money in the treasury.
- ART. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the schoolhouse for the ensuing year,
- ART. 16—To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.

- ART. 17—To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the town officers.
- ART. 18—To see what salary the town will vote for the Tax Collector and Treasurer.
- ART. 19—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell part or all of any property in its possession during the year.
- ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.
- ART. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward the support of Public County Health Nursing under the State Department of Health to continue work with mothers and children.
- ART. 22—To see what sum of money the town will vote for Mothers' Aid.
- ART. 23—To see if the town will vote to use one-half of the excise tax from automobiles for the care of snow.
- ART. 24—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- ART. 25—To see if the town will vote to accept the private road as now travelled and known as the Spinney Mill Road, leading from the Georgetown Road, so-called, and running in a general westerly direction to the Frank Snipe place.
- ART. 26—To see if the town will vote the sum of \$50.00 to be expended on the Spinney Mill Road.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

#### IN GENERAL

Owing to an increase in the State School Fund amounting to \$162.42 and an Equalization Fund of \$34.00 to lengthen the school year, with the unexpended school money last year of \$176.41, your School Committee decided to maintain a school year of 36 weeks. The unexpended amount this school year seems to warrant this procedure.

There are six pupils attending Morse High School this winter term. I trust they will complete their year's attendance. The annual appropriation must be large enough to cover the tuition of \$20.00 each for the winter term and \$15.00 each pupil the spring term.

The town school has been under the careful instruction of Mrs. Georgie M. Walker. Her methods of teaching are so well known that words of commendation are unnecessary.

It is hoped that the town will vote an appropriation for school nursing.

Hot lunches are being served this winter. The N. R. A. officials were thoughtful enough to assign beef soup to all the children who carried their lunches to school. This has been served two days each week. Milk is served other days as well as cocoa and baked potatoes donated by the parents,

The Senior League members are generous in every project connected with the school. The nicely equipped schoolroom is a sample of their generosity.

The meetings of the School Committee have been very harmonious. It has been a very successful school year.
