SAGADAHOC, SS.

To Collingwood C. Shea, Constable of the Town of Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc,

GREETINGS:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall in said town on the second day of March, A. D. 1936, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2—To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers.

ART. 4—To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.

ART. 5—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.

ART. 6—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote “Yes” or “No” on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 20, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.

ART. 10—To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 175, Public Laws of 1933.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintenance of State Aid Highway during the ensuing year.

ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes to comply with Sec. 3, Chap. 145 Public Laws.

ART. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the schoolhouse for the ensuing year.

ART. 15—To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.

ART. 16—To see what salary the town will vote for the Tax Collector and Treasurer.

ART. 17.—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell part or all of any property in its possession during the year.

ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward the support of Public County Health Nursing under the State Department of Health to continue work with mothers and children.

ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote for Mothers' Aid.

ART. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

ART. 22—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

ART. 23—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the ensuing.

ART. 24—To see what sum of money the town may charge for identification cards on Carlton Bridge.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall one half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

IN GENERAL

The amount received from the State was less than last year, \$137.05. Several families having moved from the town, the registration of the school is 6 pupils only. The teacher's wages per week was cut during the sum-

mer from \$18.00 to \$15.00 a week. The size of the school seemed to warrant this procedure.

Arrowsic sends almost 100% of her grammar graduates to a secondary school. Nearly all of the students have been in a high ranking class at Morse High where the tuition is \$65.00 a year.

The North School has been capably managed by Mrs. Georgie M. Walker as teacher.

The Union League has been very helpful to the school. We trust the members will continue the good work.

The State Bureau of Health and Child Welfare ask the town for an apportion for school nursing. Common colds seem to cause us an amount of trouble. It is responsible for more sick or semi-invalid days than any other disease. Its cause is a germ. There are several organisms that have this distinction to their credit. A certain authority states, "common colds are an infection and are not due to cold weather and terrific winds."

To prevent colds and their consequences is a matter of vital concern to every person. No one is immune. Keep the body resistance high. No cold is a simple affair. It may end in pneumonia or a permanent laming of the body. Build body resistance. As one values good health and relative freedom from colds, one should carry out the laws of personal hygiene, essential to health, ever remembering that health is not obtained from a bottle, but results from obedience to the body's requirements for sunshine, rest, sleep, exercise, proper food and fresh air.

We are grateful to the State Department of Education for a gift of \$30.00 to be used for our school library. This money was not listed with the State appropriation for common school funds. It is to be used for books on travel, history, description of life in foreign countries,

biography and poems for children. The town treasurer holds the money.

We thank the citizens for their generous help in all matters pertaining to school affairs.
