

SAGADAHOC, SS.

To Collingwood C. Shea, Constable of the Town of Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc,

GREETINGS:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall in said town on the first day of March, A. D. 1937, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

- ART. 2—To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of town officers.
- ART. 4—To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 5—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.
- ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

- ART. 9—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 20, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- ART. 10—To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 175, Public Laws of 1933.
- ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highway during ensuing year.
- ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes to comply with Sec. 3, Chap. 145 Public Laws.
- ART. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of schoolhouse for ensuing year.
- ART. 15—To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.
- ART. 16—To see what salary the town will vote for the Tax Collector and Treasurer.
- ART. 17—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell part or all of any property in its possession during the year.

ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Spinney Mill Road.

ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward the support of Public County Health Nursing under the State Department of Health to continue work with mothers and children.

ART. 21—To see what sum of money the town will vote for Mothers' Aid.

ART. 22—To see what sum of money the town will raise for snow removal.

ART. 23—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

ART. 24—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the ensuing year

ART. 25—To see what sum of money the town may charge for identification cards on the Carlton Bridge.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

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IN GENERAL

The town received from the State School Fund, \$375.30 and \$100.00, adjustments. The committee were pieased to have 35 weeks of school. As the resources were larger than the expenditures account this left an unexpended balance of \$146.02.

The teachers' wages were \$15.00 a week. The uniform wage in four of the towns in Union 48. The North

School has been very efficiently taught by Mrs. Georgie M. Walker.

The activities of the Senior School League have been a wonderful assistance to the teachers and pupils of the North School, We trust the good work will continue for years to come.

Last year the State Department of Education sent \$30.00 to the Arrowsic School to be set aside for the special project of enlarging the school library. Last April the Superintendent received a box of books on travel, history, poems and geography from the American Book Co. Mr. Robie Marriner visited the school a week later to learn how many of the books were accepted by Mrs. Walker and myself. The selections were considered a valuable addition to the North School Library.

The State Bureau of Health and Child Welfare asked the town for an appropriation for school nursing. Common colds which lead to influenza, this winter are attacking the whole country. It has divided the people into three groups: those who have had it, those who are having it and those who are afraid they are going to have it. What is flu? That is, it starts without any warning and presents the following symptoms; a general tired feeling, severe headache in most cases, no desire for food and general pains in the muscles, back and limbs. Influenza is an infectious and contagious disease. Contagious diseases are spread by the disease germs going from someone who has the disease to someone who does not have the disease. It is dangerous to use the same drinking glass. Fingers and food most easily carry the disease germs. We must not place in easy access the flu germs. Be out in the open as much as you can. Sleep in a well ventilated room. others by not caughing or sneezing on them. Wash the hands often and always before eating. All should follow careful habits useful for the prevention of the spread of this contagious disease.

A special note of appreciation is extended to the citizens of Arrowsic for all favors rendered.
