To Russell C. Sturmer, Constable of the Town of Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc,

GREETINGS:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Town Hall in said town on the sixth day of March, A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2-To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3-To see if the town will vote to accept the report of town officers.

ART. 4—To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.

ART. 5—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.

ART. 6—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highway and bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during ensuing year.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes to comply with Sec. 3, Chap. 145, Public Laws.

ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of schoolhouse for ensuing year.

ART. 13—To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.

ART. 14—To see what salary the town will vote the Tax Collector and Treasurer.

ART. 15—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

ART. 16- To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.

ART. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward the support of Public County Health Nursing under the State Department of Health to continue work with mothers and children. ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the ensuing year.

ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town may charge for identification cards on the Carlton Bridge.

ART. 21-To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 229, Public Laws of 1937.

ART. 22 – To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

ART. 23—To see if the town will vote by ballot to accept the road leading from the Georgetown Highway to Frank Snipe's residence as a town road.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

School Report

To the Citizens of Arrowsic:

The annual report of the town school is respectfully submitted.

IN GENERAL

The resources amounted to more than the expenditures, therefore, there is an unexpended balance of \$52.07. The Town received from the State School Fund \$238.44 and \$100.00 adjustments. The School Committee have maintained 36 weeks of school.

The teachers wages have been \$16.00 a week the entire 36 weeks. Mrs. Georgie Walker has efficiently taught the school in an interesting manner. She has a well managed school. Members of the Senior School League have made some very valuable changes in the school room. Movable desks, shelves for more books are among the more noticeable. We trust the members will continue their work in the North School.

The State Bureau of Health and Child Welfare have asked the town for an appropriation for School Nursing. Health work in the school is a very important objective in these times of unrest and dissatisfaction. The Arrowsic school has several 7 point pupils.

Nearly every pupil had the Whooping Cough when the Fall term opened.

The School was visited by Miss Yvonne Daigle, Rural Field Agent from the State Department of Education. It was my pleasure to visit with Miss Daigle.

It has been an instructive year. The meetings of the School Commitee have been pleasant and very helpful.
