*To Russell C. Sturmer, Constable of the Town of
Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc, State of Maine,*

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Town Hall in said town on the third day of March, A. D. 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2—To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of Town Officers.

ART. 4—To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.

ART. 5—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.

ART. 6—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highway and bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highway during the ensuing year.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes to comply with Section 3, Chapter 145, Public Laws.

ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of schoolhouse for the ensuing year.

ART. 13—To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.

ART. 14—To see what salary the town will vote the Tax Collector and Treasurer.

ART. 15—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deed for such property.

ART. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.

ART. 17—To see what sum the town will vote to raise toward the support of Public County Health

Nursing under the State Department of Health to continue work with mothers and children.

ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the ensuing year.

ART. 20—To see what sum of money the town may charge for identification cards on Carlton Bridge.

ART. 21—To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

ART. 22—To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of a sander for use on ice on the roads.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

The enrollment of the Arrowsic School has increased to 31 pupils, also an increase of the number of pupils conveyed to 17, means a rise in cost in itself. Other factors are, additional pupils attending High School next year, and a reduction in the State School Fund. The reduction in the School Census from \$3 to \$1.65 per pupil is very noticeable. The per pupil cost of \$28 per year, is very reasonable compared to the cost in other towns. The Committee and Superintendent shall economize wherever possible, where such economy does not detract from the efficiency of the school.

IN GENERAL

The school year has been thirty-two weeks. The school has been running harmoniously. Much credit is due to the attitude of good will and interest shown by the parents and citizens. Without public support, and the Senior League activities, the immediate effects would be felt.

Mrs. Georgie Walker has devoted her time to the school without restraint. Her attitude is reflected in the atmosphere of the schoolroom. A more enthusiastic group of children would be hard to find. As emotions govern attitudes and character, it is most satisfying for me to find children who like school, and are

developing such desirable attitudes of study, patriotism and ideals.

It is hoped the town will be able to appropriate a sum to continue the Health Work, by having the services of the State Health Nurse. Through her yearly check up, many physical ills are uncovered, which if corrected, immediately will save suffering and permanent injury later on.

The new Basic Reading Course, which was introduced, is one of the best in use today. It is desirable to have other supplementary readers, as pupils gain speed, fluency and proper eye-span, by silently reading alone.

It is hoped the estimated budget can be appropriated to cover this, and to extend the school year to thirty-four weeks. The children are the future citizens. No nation can rise above the character of its people. An educated citizen insures the perpetuation of democracy.

I am glad to be privileged to serve the people of Arrowsic. The cooperation and help of the School Committee members and town officials is gratefully acknowledged. May we look forward to additional progress in the school thru mutual understanding of our problems another year.
