SAGADAHOC, SS.

To Russell C. Sturmer, Constable of the Town of Arrowsic, County of Sagadahoc, State of Maine, Greenings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Town Hall in said town on the second day of March, A. D. 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

- ART. 2—To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of Town Officers.
- ART. 4—To choose by ballot Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 5—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.
- ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

- ART. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highway and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highway during the ensuing year.
- ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes to comply with Section 3, Chapter 145, Public Laws.
- ART. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of Schoolhouse for the ensuing year.
- ART. 13—To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.
- ART. 14—To see what salary the town will vote the Tax Collector and Treasurer.
- ART. 15—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.
- ART. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.
- ART. 17—To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$10.00 for Public Health Nursing in Arrowsic, said sum to be expended by State Bureau of Health for local service.

ART. 18—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

ART. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the ensuing year.

ART. 20—To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

ANNUAL PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING REPORT. 1941

"It is a truism that total war means total defense, since a whole population and all the resources of the country are involved.

"When we take a long view of what is involved for posterity in defense and preparedness we know it goes beyond those engaged in military activities and industrial workers. It means family life and particularly healthy mothers, babies and children. Therein lies the future of any country if it is to have a future. This is accepted as our concern and responsibility even though there is still much to be done toward developing more adequate maternal and child health services."

The health program has continued another year. Routine visits by the nurse have been made to homes where there are children and to the school. Under teachers interested in the value of good health habits as a means towards producing strong, capable men and women, a good program has been carried on at school.

In the spring a child health conference and vaccination clinic was held at the school available to all

school and pre-school children. Fifteen were protected against smallpox.

22 home visits were made

3 visits to expectant mothers

8 visits to infants

20 visits to pre-school children (from 1 yr. to school age)

21 visits to school children

May we together press on with more vigor and determination to defend our families and community against the invasion of disease by practicing better health habits, better nutrition and making sure our children are protected agaist diseases such as whooping cough, diphtheria and smallpox. Immunization at small cost will give this invaluable protection.

IN GENERAL

It seems fitting at this time that we honor the memories of our former Superintendents of the original School Union 48. Mrs. Clara Reed pioneered as the first union superintendent, while Mr. John H. Carter followed her in office. Both Mrs. Reed and Mr. Carter worked unselfishly for the interest of Education as long as their health would permit. They were loved and respected by all who knew them.

The school was maintained 34 weeks this year, which is above the State requirements and shows the interest of all citizens in the welfare of the public school.

Mrs. Georgie Walker, who taught the Arrowsic School for many years was unable to continue because of sickness and death of her mother. Mrs. Walker has devoted her life to teaching and has been a remarkably able and efficient teacher, deserving of deep respect.

Miss Irene Chambers was elected to teach the school. She has maintained good order and the school-room atmosphere is one of interest and studious attention on the part of the students.

The Arrowsic School is partially unique in that it possesses a fenced in school yard with playground equipment, and free of dangerous ledges.

The continous efforts of the School League in behalf of the school is self-evident. The School Lunch Program and School milk are vital today. May I here introduce the following thought concerning the Health program. The school seeks to motivate Health Habits and teach the pupil how to preserve good health through proper diet, rest and correct body habits. It is essential that the health clinics continue to vaccinate and innoculate for various diseases.

Today the ravages of epidemics, occasioned by the war, threaten us in America, as starvation, pestilence and death sweep over Europe and Asia. Knowing these facts, we all realize more than ever before, the necessity of preserving the health of our children.

It is hoped the services of the School Nurse will continue to be made possible by a moderate appropriation for her work. I would also like to recommend the Dental Health Program in your school.

It is felt that the school with the new Basic Reading System, and other new books and materials is offering distinct advantages to the children. The superintendent can confidently state, that the ability of the pupils in reading is remarkable. Reading is the most important subject and progress in all subjects depends on the ability to read.

If the citizens can see fit to appropriate twenty-six dollars, which is included in the supply estimate, I should like very much to place a set of political and

economic maps in your school. The series include sixteen maps showing the historical growth of the U. S. A., with separate maps of industry, mines and farming. Such a set would create immense interest and provide for correlation of History and Geography.

In conclusion may I express my gratitude to the School Committee and the Citizens for their support of the Public Schools, America's most democratic institution. The members of your School Committee have served the town faithfully and well the past year, without financial recompense.

The present conflict is one of total war, not merely of armies. It has been in progress since 1914 with a lull of Peace between 1918 and 1939. Historians cannot predict how far into the future it will project. As a people, Americans must realize that the war effort will effect this generation. Those pupils in our schools in 1914 are now the ones bearing the burden of the second World War. Only because of America's most universal system of education in the world, wherin thirty million youth are gaining knowledge and skill are we prepared to strike back for Liberty, Home and Freedom.

The hope of America is in her youth. America's future is in the hands of our children. The schools must be protected and maintained at all costs.
