To Russell C. Sturmer, Constable of the Town of Arrowsic,
County of Sagadahoc, State of Maine,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Arrowsic, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Schoolhouse in said town on the second day of March, A. D. 1946, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1—To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3—To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the Town Officers.

Art. 4—To choose by ballot, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor and all other necessary town officers.

Art. 5—To vote compensation of Collector and Treasurer.

Art. 6—To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the various town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 7—To see if the town will vote to allow the use of the schoolhouse for religious meetings for the ensuing year.

Art. 8—To fix the date when taxes for the ensuing year shall become due and payable.

Art. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the State Aid Highway during the ensuing year.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes during the ensuing year.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of Schoolhouse for the ensuing year.

Art. 15—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to procure the loan of money as may be necessary for the ensuing year.

Art. 16—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Road during the ensuing year.

Art. 18—To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$10.00 for Public Health Nursing in Arrowsic, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

Art. 19—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Art. 20—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 21—To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944 as amended.

Art. 22—To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) to be paid the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 23—To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chap. 11, Sections 62-63-64.

Art. 24—To see if the town will vote to raise \$150.00, and to use \$150.00 from the Treasury, making a total of \$300.00 for the repair of the Spinney Mill Road.

The Selectmen will be at the Schoolhouse one-half hour before the time of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof fail not, and make due returns of this warrant with your doings to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

An examination has been completed of the books of account and records of the town of Arrowsic for the municipal year ended February 11, 1945.

Town of Arrowsic

Exhibits and schedules are submitted which, in our opinion, properly reflect the financial status of the town.

TREASURER

As far as could be ascertained, all receipts were recorded and the cash was deposited in the bank.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants, supported by invoices and payrolls on file.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank statement.

Payment recorded as received on a tax lien was applied against the proper item.

ASSESSORS

The 1944 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the Assessors' records.

TAX COLLECTOR

The balance due from the Collector is represented by unpaid taxes taken from the records.

As the detailed lists of taxes were printed in the last town report, they are not included herein.

TOWN CLERK

The records of the Town Clerk were examined and appeared to be in proper order.

SELECTMEN

Our test check of paid invoices and payrolls indicated they were proper charges and correctly recorded.

The State Valuation of Arrowsic is \$74,198.00. The average State Mill Rate is 18 Mills. The Arrowsic School Mill Rate is 18.19 based upon the \$1,350.00 appropriated last year.

We should appropriate \$1,483.96 for Common Schools in order to devote 20 mills to schools, thus making us eligible for Equalization Fund and an extra \$135 for our Teacher Position, giving us \$435 instead of \$300 as the Town Mill Rate would be over the State average of 18 mills.

State Equalization Money will extend the school year to thirty-six weeks, purchase the necessary text books and supplies and the balance can be applied to High School Tuition costs. I would recommend that the town for at least the following year take advantage of extra State Subsidy under the law. The School Committee can, I believe, operate the school to their best judgment and be enabled to carry a favorable balance forward in 1947 with this extra State money.

The Town School Year has been maintained thirty-five weeks. The school enrollment has been large, with a constantly changing program to accommodate the classes. By grouping and alternating classes time has been found to provide necessary instruction.

The general work of the pupils is up to grade level. Variations occur because of individual differences or lost time from school. The Plan Book indicates all ground covered in all grades and is kept daily to provide information for the superintendent and school committee.

The eye and ear tests were given the Fall Term and indicate nine children having difficulty in vision and two in hearing. These defects can have a profound bearing upon the nervous system and upon school progress of a child unless corrected in time.

I trust that the parents will feel free to call upon the Health Nurse for advice concerning their children.

This year a new law makes it necessary to send the Birth Certificate to the teacher when the child newly enters school.

The school room has been renovated and the lighting greatly improved. Storm windows help to make the room more comfortable in cold weather. The room has been kept clean and orderly through the efforts of the teacher and pupils.

It would be of direct benefit if the playground equipment could be repaired, and possibly more added, to provide something for the children to do at recess and noon time.

The four pupils Joseph Frances Lawrence, Ruth Marie Woodward, Eleanor Pearl O'Brien and Charles William Paradis who graduated took part in the joint Graduation Exercises of Woolwich and Arrowsic June 14, 1945. Their parts were very well carried out.

I wish to thank the School Committee for their support during the past year. The cooperation of the other Town Offi-

cial is gratefully acknowledged. To all other citizens of the Town I extend my appreciation for their support of public education.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING

Annual Report for 1945

Nine visits have been made to the town to visit in the schools and homes to discuss with parents and teachers the health needs of those under their supervision. The Audiometer to test the hearing was given to 19 children with two found with slight defective hearing.

The Tuberculosis Patch test was given to 12 children with three reacting to the test. If there is a reaction to the test this does not necessarily mean they have active tuberculosis, but simply indicates that further examination by X-ray should be made to detect the unsuspected cases. Appointments have been made for all reactors to be X-rayed at the Bath Clinic. There were five X-rayed.
