# NURSING REPORT

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## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FLANDERS BAY SERVICE, 1930

### MAINE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASS'N

To the Citizens of the Town:

I hereby submit the annual report of the nursing activities of the Flanders Bay Nursing Service. This service comprises Winter Harbor, Gouldsboro, East Sullivan and Sorrento, and is affiliated with and under the direct supervision of the Maine Public Health Association in Augusta.

The personnel of the executive committee remains the same as in the past four years—Mr. Fletcher Wood, chairman; Mr. Charles Small, treasurer; Mrs. Rubie Tracy, secretary—while local representatives of all the towns serve on the nursing committee.

The major part of this service is supported by the contributions of the summer residents. The rest depends on the town appropriations, Christmas seal sale, and on fees collected by the nurse. It has been demonstrated that nursing care is given regardless of the ability of the patient to pay.

#### *Analysis of Service*

Bedside Care—Four hundred and ninety-eight visits made to 138 patients (55 of these visits were made to 1 chronic patient and 32 were made to 2 active tuberculosis cases). The rest of the bedside cases include assistance at 24 confinement cases with 45 visits of after care to those mothers. These visits also include pneumonia, fractures, cancer, cerebral hemorrhage and emergencies.

Instruction—Two hundred and sixty visits of instruction in infant welfare, prenatal, tuberculosis, surgical, medical and home treatments.

Investigation—Sixty-six visits of investigation including communicable, tuberculosis, prenatal, sanitation, and social service.

Conferences and Clinics—Five well-baby and pre-school conferences and clinics were held; 155 adults attended and 95 babies and pre-school children received examination or inspection, with medical advice or treatment by the attending physicians. Through the courtesy of the Maine Sea Coast Mission it was made possible for 5 children (accompanied by the nurse) to attend and receive treatment at the tonsil and adenoid clinic held in the Bar Harbor hospital. These children were taken across the bay in the Sea Coast Mission boat, the Sunbeam, and returned by the same means to their homes the day following the operations.

School Inspection—Seventy-three visits were made to 19 schoolrooms; 812 full inspections were given 524 children. The inspections showed 402 defects with 363 corrections, defective teeth taking the lead. Four hundred and twenty audiometer (hearing) tests were given. Ten were found with hearing defects and were referred to physician.

It is very gratifying to note the number of corrections made during the year. In one school at the spring inspection, 24 pupils had defects that could be corrected and at the fall inspection it was found that 20 of these pupils had the corrections made during the summer months.

In order that parents might know the results of the school inspections, 339 notices were sent to parents stating defects found and 153 follow-up visits were made. Forty-five sanitary inspections of school build-

ings were made and 45 talks on health were given to schoolrooms. Forty-eight examinations were made by physicians and 24 pupils, as a result, were excluded with symptoms of skin disease and mumps.

In the interest of preventing children from having diphtheria, 21 inoculations by a physician were given of toxin-anti-toxin one week apart. The nurse assisted the physician with this preventive health measure.

The town was fortunate this year in being one of the towns to be offered a tuberculin test clinic. It is to be regretted that more parents did not take advantage of this opportunity to determine whether their child reacted to this test. It is generally accepted by specialists that the test, if positive, shows that there is present a tuberculous infection which may or may not be active. If the test shows a positive reaction, diagnosis may further be established by X-ray and physical examination. It is important to know early if infection is present, so that we may by simple home hygienic measures prevent the years of misery which follow when once a patient develops an active case of tuberculosis. The test is a simple skin test, the solution being placed on outer layer of skin. No pain or discomfort results. The children explain it best by saying "it tickles."

One hundred and thirty-four individuals were taken to clinics, physicians, hospital, sanatorium, dentist, or oculist. All school defects were referred to physicians.

Three staff meetings were attended, 2 committee meetings, 1 Red Cross meeting and 4 visits of supervision were made by the nurse director.

May Day (Child Health Week) Activities—Two lectures on sex hygiene, with films, were given, one for the boys and one for the girls, by Dr. William Holt from the State Department of Health in Augusta. One

hundred and fifty individuals throughout the territory attended these lectures. Transportation arrangements were made by the nurse and interested citizens. Miss Abbie M. Buck, child health director, gave interesting talks in all the schools, also being the speaker at a child health program held in West Bay on May Day.

In conclusion, the nurse wishes to extend thanks to the Maine Public Health Association for assistance and advice in solving problems, the State Department of Health for cooperation with May Day program, the Maine Sea Coast Mission, the physicians who assisted us so much this past year, and to all interested friends who helped by their encouragement and cooperation to make the public health program a success.

# SCHOOL REPORT

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## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

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### *Superintending School Committee*

To the members of the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Gouldsboro :

I herewith present my sixth annual report of the condition, progress and needs of the schools of Gouldsboro :

During the past year the schools have been making very satisfactory progress. Of the teachers with whom this year began, seven are normal graduates with experience and the other three have had some normal training and are experienced teachers. The training beyond high school of these teachers averages about 1.65 years, a slight gain over last year.

### *Enrollment*

The enrollment this year exceeds that of last year by about 15 pupils. Last spring it seemed possible that the enrollment at the Prospect Harbor school might be sufficiently large as to necessitate dividing the school, but before school began in the fall it was evident that the enrollment would decrease, as proved to be the case. While the enrollment for the fall term was 39, the winter term began with 31, with still too many grades for the best grade of work, but possibly not warranting a division of the school just at the present time. The best thing to do would seem to be to make available sufficient funds so that the school

committee can at any time take what action the changing conditions seem to warrant.

#### *Secondary School Pupils*

During the fall term there were 36 pupils enrolled in secondary schools as follows: First-year students, 14; second-year students, 11; third-year students, 10; and fourth-year students, 1. These students were enrolled in five schools, as follows: At Winter Harbor, 12; at Steuben, 10; at Higgins Classical Institute, 7; at Sullivan, 6; and at Fryeburg, 1.

#### *Text-Books*

The text-book situation is improving satisfactorily. During the past three years the basal system of reading has been completely changed and all the grades are now supplied with the new readers. This year the English and arithmetic texts have been changed in about half the grades and, at the present rate, another year will see every pupil supplied with up-to-date texts in these two most important subjects.

#### *Repairs*

Major repairs this year have consisted of shingling the West Gouldsboro building and painting the Bunker's Harbor building. Minor repairs have been made on all buildings as needed.

#### *School Year*

In general the schools of Gouldsboro are in good condition, with constant improvement in teacher training, with buildings kept in good condition and with the text-book situation steadily improving. The next logical step, which should be taken when the town feels itself able, is to lengthen the school year to 36 weeks, to provide for a change to an eight grade system. The cost in teachers' salaries, at the present rate, would be \$186 per year for each added week. That the added



cost would not be noticed appreciably might be shown by the fact that, while this school year will be 32 weeks as required, an average of slightly over 34 weeks have been paid for during the present municipal year.

With a nine-year system you are supporting each child in school nine years. Theoretically, to change to an eight-year system would mean the saving of the cost of one year, but practically, the advantage, in general, would be in enabling the teacher to give more time to each grade, thereby giving each grade more instruction at the same cost. For instance, to change a nine-grade school to eight grades would enable the teacher to give 12½ per cent. more time to each grade. Then, too, all courses of study, text-books, standard tests, etc., are made for an eight-grade system, and much time is expended and much confusion results in trying to fit these things to the schools.
