

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To Samuel W. Bridges, one of the constables of the town of Isle au Haut, in the county of Hancock,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Isle au Haut, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the School House, in District No. 1, in said town, on the 12th day of March. A. D., 1900, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To choose Selectmen for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To choose Assessors of Taxes.

ART. 5. To choose Overseer's of the Poor.

ART. 6. To choose a Treasurer and vote his compensation.

ART. 7. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

ART. 8. To vote his compensation.

ART. 9. To choose an Auditor of Accounts.

ART. 10. To choose two School Committee, one for one year and one for three years.

ART. 11. To choose a Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 12. To choose a Road Commissioner.

ART. 13. To choose Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

ART. 14. To choose Fence Viewers.

ART. 15. To choose Pound Keeper.

ART. 16. To choose a Field Driver.

ART. 17. To choose Constables.

ART. 18. To choose Truant Officers.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote for support of Poor.

ART. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote for Current Expenses.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote for support of Schools.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote for free Text Books.

ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote for repairs on Roads and Bridges.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote for clearing roads of snow.

ART. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote for repairs on School Buildings.

ART. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to help build a road from Charles Robinson's house to the main road as petitioned by Charles Robinson and others.

ART. 27. To see what action the town will take on the petition of E. W. Bowditch, viz:

The undersigned as Managing Director of the Isle au Haut Co., and in his personal capacity as a land owner, respectfully petition your Board to lay out a public road from or near the end of the existing west side road at Deep Cove Head and running in a generally Easterly direction to a junction with the lower end of the East Side road at Head Harbor following the shore as near as can be reasonably expected.

ART. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to build a turn at the end of the road at Head Harbor.

ART. 29. To act on any other town business that may

come before said meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

I am pleased to submit the following report of the schools of our town for the year ending Feb. 1900. I think a good year's work has been done in all the schools, the pupils and teachers both working together faithfully and harmoniously in almost every instance.

The spring terms were taught by Miss Hattie Turner, Mrs. Cora Gray and Miss Edith Simpson in the respective districts.

Miss Turner has taught here many terms before, and I think gave general satisfaction, and the usual progress was made by the pupils under her instruction.

Mrs. Gray is one of Stonington's most experienced and successful teachers, and we were fortunate in securing her for Dist. No. 2. The school was small, and I think good thorough work was done by all the pupils.

Miss Simpson is a Normal student and gave good satisfaction in the school which she staught, being popular with both pupils and parents, and I think was faithful and conscientious in the performance of her duty.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Grace Wormell, Miss Mabel Harrigan and Miss Josie Phinney.

Miss Grace Wormell is a very thorough and experienced teacher, having taught twelve successive years in the city of Waterville with excellent success, and coming to our town with the highest recommendations. She did good work in Dist. No. 1, and rapid progress was made by all under her instruction, and with her long years of experience in governing and methods, gave general satisfaction throughout the district.

Miss Mabel Harrigan is a Castine Normal Student, will graduate in June, and came highly recommended by the principal of her school. I think she tried her best to teach a good school and was well qualified in all branches, but it being her first attempt the government was perhaps not all that could be desired, but with a little more experience I am sure she will become a very worthy teacher.

Miss Josie Phinney is one of our own town girls and is expecting to enter the Castine Normal School for the spring term.

She gave general satisfaction in the district in which she taught, and I found the school in fine condition. Her governing ability is good, as also her methods and I think she has the material for a first-class teacher.

I made a much needed change in the Grammars, Histories and Reading books at the beginning of the spring term, and I would suggest that the coming years change be made in Geographies as many important events have occurred since the last change was made.

The Grammars were not all that we expected, and I think a change could be made for the better in regard to them.

As for the school buildings themselves I would suggest in Dist. No. 1, new windows throughout, and in Dist. No. 2, a shed in which to put the wood, so it can be under cover, and this, I think, is very much needed. These are the only necessary repairs which are needed on the buildings.

In closing this report I would like to suggest one more idea for your careful consideration which perhaps could be accomplished in the future. I think it a regular course of study could be introduced into our schools, covering just so much work for each year, and have each year's work completed before going on to the next higher grade, we should get more thorough work from both our teachers and pupils, or in other words, have our schools partially graded, and I think it could be done without much trouble, and it would make more of an incentive for study among the pupils and we would get better work.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to the School Committee, parents and all who have manifested any interest in the schools for their co-operation with me in their behalf.
