NURSING REPORT

FLANDERS BAY NURSING SERVICE.

To the Citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro :

I herewith submit my report as a public health nurse for the period from January 1, 1931, to January 1, 1932.

The Flanders Bay Service, comprising Winter Harbor, Gouldsboro, Sorrento and East Sullivan, is affiliated with the Maine Public Health Association and under the direct supervision of the nurse director. The service is supported mainly by the contributions of interested summer residents, fees and Christmas health seals; the rest of the budget is met by town appropriations.

It is practically impossible to measure the value of a public health program by statistics, but the following report will give some idea to the citizens of Gouldsboro of the work accomplished by the nurse the past year.

One thousand visits were made in homes. These visits were made for the purpose of caring for the sick patients, babies or new mothers with babies, for instruction, investigation and school follow-up. For children shortly to enter school, it is especially urged that physical defects be corrected, if possible, so that a child may enter at his best.

Twenty-two well-baby and pre-school child conferences were held last fall. These conferences were omitted the months of July and August, due to reported cases of infantile paralysis, but were resumed in the fall, with an attendance of 211. Of these, 59 were babies, and 39 pre-school children; the rest were mothers and interested individuals. A weekly conference is held in the nurse's office every Tuesday after-

noon; also one is held in the church in South Gouldsboro the third Thursday of every month.

In the miscellaneous work are included 56 urinalyses, 10 adults taken to doctor, hospital or dentist for treatment, 87 school children taken to dentist, 10 taken to hospital, 4 taken to oculist, 9 taken to physician. Assistance was given also at an operation for school child in the home. Three mothers were provided with baby layettes. In the social service and family welfare work, with the cooperation of the Maine Seacoast Mission, several families were provided with supplies, clothing, also supervision. Twenty tuberculin tests were made by the Maine Public Health T. B. service nurse. X-rays taken and examined by specialist showed that one case needed further examination, which was immediately done after report was received.

Observation has shown us that where there is health teaching in schools and community and regular inspection of pupils, there is less chance for epidemics of disease to start, with the consequent loss of school money and school time.

These defects were: Eyesight, hearing, teeth, throat, 20 per cent. overweight, 10 per cent. underweight. Defective teeth led.

Corrections: Teeth, 94; posture, 50; throat, 60;

vision, 53. Ninety-one of these corrections have been made since the spring inspection.

The inspection of the Gouldsboro schools showed 123 school children with defects. It also showed that eighty-eight have had defects corrected. Teeth take the lead in the defects throughout the territory.

The outstanding features in school work the past year have been the physical examinations by the physicians and the school health field day, with its attendance of 300 children. A silver cup was donated by the Maine Seacoast Mission as a trophy in athletic events. It has been decided to hold a field day this spring, as parents and interested adults also attended and enjoyed the social contact.

In the control of communicable diseases, several cases were reported, investigations made, and specimens for examination sent to the State laboratory. Isolated cases of chicken pox and whooping cough were visited and instruction given.

Several cases of impetigo were excluded from school by the physician, and treatment given. Visits also were made to tubercular cases, both for nursing care and instruction to family.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the members of the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Gouldsboro:

I have the honor of presenting to you my first annual report of the condition, progress and needs of your schools.

On September 8, 1931, all schools opened, with an enrollment of 188 pupils. Thinking that you might be interested to know how many of these pupils are in each grade, I have arranged the following table:

Among our teaching staff we have seven normal graduates with teaching experience. The other three teachers have had some normal training with teaching experience. For a teacher to be successful in her work, she not only must have the training necessary, but she must have a love for her work and a knowledge of how properly to handle pupils. Many a teacher has made a dismal failure of her teaching because she has accepted a position to teach the primary grades when she should have accepted a position to teach the grammar grades, and vice versa.

During the fall and winter terms I have made several visits to each school and at each visit I have

stayed long enough to know how well the teachers are instructing their pupils and what the pupils are getting out of their work. I realize that it is necessary to have the best teachers we can afford in order that the pupils might get the best instruction possible. As a whole, I am very much pleased with the results thus far, and as time goes on I expect to be able to get better results from teachers and pupils.

By action of the school committee, Bunker's Harbor school was closed because there were only four pupils attending. These pupils are being conveyed to Birch Harbor school. This was done so that the pupils from Bunker's Harbor might attend a school where there would be more pupils in their grades, and by so doing would enjoy their school work better and also would get more out of it.

We are striving to make our school system just as good as we possibly can. This we are trying to do so that every child might have the same educational advantages. In a two-teacher school, twice as much time can be devoted to the work of each grade as can be given to each grade in a one-teacher school.

For this reason I am certain that it would be to the advantage of every pupil at Birch Harbor school if they could be conveyed to the Prospect Harbor school, where there are two teachers. The fact that there would be more pupils in each grade would make the work more interesting and more profitable. If this plan is carried out, it not only will be the best thing for the pupils but it also will cost less than it will to maintain the two schools as they are now maintained.

Text-Books

The text-book situation is one that needs serious attention. We have a basal set of readers for each grade, but we need supplementary readers very much indeed. A complete change has been made in arithme-

tic books, and is working out very well. A change in geographies was started this year in grades five and six, and during this next year we shall try to purchase geographies for one or two other grades. Two years ago a change of English books for grades five, six, seven, eight and nine was started. This year we purchased more English books so that now every school but one, from the fifth grade to the ninth inclusive, is supplied with them. We need language books for grade four. While we do not expect to make all these changes in any one year, we do want, this coming year, to make the changes that will do the most good.

Repairs

Only minor repairs have been made at this writing but other repairs have been planned that are expected to be finished before town meeting. These repairs are the painting of one or two rooms at the South Gouldsboro school. Ceilings and walls of these rooms need to be painted so as to make the rooms lighter. The ceiling and walls at the West Gouldsboro school also need to be painted. The repairs that have to be made next year can be done with the usual appropriation.

This town is very fortunate in having a trained nurse to look after the health of its school children. I am indeed pleased with the efficient work that Mrs. Holt is doing in our schools. She not only makes her regular calls at our schools, but is ever ready and willing to make special calls for special cases. She has been the means of having a great deal of corrective work done that is worthy of praise. Remember that our nurse is working to have every school child physically fit to do his best work.

Secondary School Students

During the fall term there were 45 students enrolled in high schools. There are 22 students at Winter Harbor, 5 at Higgins Classical Institute, 12 at

Steuben, 1 at Bar Harbor, and 5 at Sullivan. To send 45 students to high schools in Maine speaks well for the town of Gouldsboro.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the parents for the interest they have taken by having their children attend school regularly; the members of the school committee for their splendid cooperation; the teachers for their faithfulness in doing their work from day to day.

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 7, 1932

COUNTY OF HANCOCK ss.

TOWN OF GOULDSBORO, STATE OF MAINE

To George C. Joy, Constable of the Town of Gouldsboro, in
said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Gouldsboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, West Gouldsboro, in said town, on Monday, March 7, 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear the report of town officers and commissioners and act thereon.
- 4 To choose selectmen and assessors for the ensuing year.
- 5 To choose a member or members of the board of overseers of the poor.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of the collector and treasurer.
- 7 To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 8 To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 9 To choose a member or members of the superintending school committee.
- 10 To choose constables for the town.
- 11 To choose fence viewers for the town.
- 12 To choose surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark.

- 13 To choose a fire ward or wards for the ensuing year.
- 14 To see if the town will elect one, two or three road commissioners, or authorize the selectmen to appoint the road commissioner or commissioners.
- 15 To choose a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 16 To choose a budget committee for the ensuing year.
- 17 To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 18 To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable on the first day of May.
- 19 To see if the town will vote when all taxes shall be due and payable.
- 20 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make temporary loans, if necessary.
- 21 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to refund, with notes of one year, whatever part of the town notes, due in 1932, they deem necessary.
- 22 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of poor.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the contingent fund.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 to blast rocks and repair the so-called Island road at Corea, leading from the Lewis Young store to Crowley's Island. Three hundred dollars to be expended from the Lewis Young store to the Sea Wall and \$100 from the Sea Wall to the home of A. B. Young, the selectmen to hire some competent man to have charge of the work.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to lay out a town highway, at Corea, leading from the Island road, past the cottages of Levy Day, Nathan Fogg and John L. Bray, and raise the sum of \$100 to be expended on the same.
- 26 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair the Guzzle road at Gouldsboro.

- 27 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of roads.
- 28 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of bridges.
- 29 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100, to ditch and repair the road leading from Wasgatt's Corner, so-called, to Lighthouse Gate, in Prospect Harbor.
- 30 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire a helper for the State-aid road patrolman, and raise a sum of money for the same.
- 31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay its part of the State patrol and 50-50 maintenance work.
- 32 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to cut bushes on improved sections of State-aid highways, in accordance with chapter 28, section 44, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to cut bushes on unimproved town highways.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50 for repair of State-aid highways, not under State patrol, in accordance with chapter 28, section 18, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 35 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$209 for the maintenance of third-class roads, or to be used in connection with the third-class apportionment made by the State for the improvement of third-class roads.
- 36 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise, in accordance with the provisions of sections 26 to 32, inclusive, of chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, for the construction of a State-aid highway, extending from State Highway N at West Bay, so-called, thence in a southerly direction, passing through the village of Prospect Harbor to the Winter Harbor line, thence through Winter Harbor by the way of the village and Club House road to State-aid No. 1, thence by Summer Harbor road, so-called, to

- Route No. 186, thence by Route No. 186 to State Highway N, thence over State Highway N to Tunk Pond road, so-called, or Sullivan's State-aid No. 2, thence on State-aid No. 2 to end of Sullivan's designation.
- 37 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for notes and interest due in 1932.
 - 38 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Department of Public Welfare and mothers' aid.
 - 39 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Flanders Bay Service of the Maine Public Health Association.
 - 40 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy snow fence.
 - 41 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for snow removal.
 - 42 To see if the town will vote to put in one street light near the residence of Hattie Sargent, South Gouldsboro.
 - 43 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for street lights.
 - 44 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
 - 45 To see if the town will vote to close the Bunker's Harbor school indefinitely.
 - 46 To see if the town will vote to close the Birch Harbor school and convey the scholars attending that school to the Prospect Harbor school.
 - 47 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, text-books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
 - 48 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for superintendence account.

- 49 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of school property.
- 50 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to insure town help under the Workman's Compensation Act.
- 51 To see if the town will vote to have the town house wired for electric lights, and raise a sum of money for the same.
- 52 To act on any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the town house, West Gouldsboro, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.
