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NURSING REPORT

To the Citizens of Gouldsboro:

I hereby submit my annual report of the nursing activities from January 1, 1932, to January 1, 1933.

The Flanders' Bay Service is affiliated with the Maine Public Health Association of Augusta, and under its direct supervision. The personnel remains the same as in past years--Fletcher Wood, chairman; Mrs. Rubie Tracy, secretary; Charles Small, Ashville, treasurer; Mrs. Therese Anderson, R. N., director, nursing service.

The service is supported mainly by contributions from interested summer residents, fees, Christmas health seals and the balance is met by town appropriations.

Child Health Welfare and Pre-Natal Work

This is one of the most important programs of public health service. It has been a satisfactory and cooperative service this past year. Forty-six clinics and conferences were held throughout the territory, with an attendance of 210 babies and 190 pre-school children (With the mothers, pre-natal cases and interested adults, the attendance was brought up to 507). As a result of these conferences, 17 pre-school children had defects corrected and were ready to enter school in the fall without the handicaps these defects might give them.

It is interesting to note that the first and second years of the Flanders' Bay Service, the combined number attending clinics and conferences totalled 100. This comparison shows how the service has grown.

School Health Service

If the country is ever to realize her health resources, she must conserve the health of her public school children, as health is the greatest wealth and most solid foundation for true happiness and good citizenship, the physical as well as the mental health of the school children is as much ours during a period of depression as it is during a period of prosperity. Sixty visits were made to the seventeen school-rooms; 652 inspections were given 326 children; 454 audiometer or hearing tests were given; 181 Von Pirquet skin tests were made; 25 reacted to this test, showing a tendency to this dread T. B. disease. The reactors were X-rayed and the films read by a specialist in Bangor, who advised that eight needed chest examinations. The skin test and X-ray were given by the Maine Public Health Clinic Service, which also arranged the chest clinic held by Dr. Lester Adams of the Hebron Sanitarium. Although nothing serious was found at this clinic, it was advised that follow-up work and annual examinations be made. The sale of the Christmas seals pays for this particular health program.

Of the 652 inspections to the school children (a fall and spring inspection) 200 were found defective, teeth as usual taking the lead. Ninety-six corrections were made during the year. Forty-eight attended the dental clinic held in the nurse's office in August. Fifteen school children were taken to the hospital for throat operations.

Child Health Week or May Day was observed through the territory. The second annual Flanders' Bay Health Field Day

was held, with an attendance of 487. This includes the children from the 4th to and including the 8th grades, teachers, members of the school board, superintendent of schools, those who transported the children, and those who acted as judges. The usual athletic events were held and the silver cup donated by the Maine Seacoast Mission, as a trophy, was awarded for the second time. As the May Day program is for the benefit of all children, those from the 1st to the 4th grades were entertained and took part in games, etc., while a special conference was held for the babies and pre-school children.

General Service

Five hundred and forty-three nursing visits and 732 followup and instructive, and 100 social service visits were made to 468 cases. Many details of a general nature have been looked after through this service—15 patients have been taken to a physician, 20 to the dentist, and 20 to the hospital. Visits have been made to give care to surgical and medical cases, assistance at operations and deliveries. Instructive visits have been made to pre-natal, infant, pre-school, post-partum and T. B. patients. In the social service, with the cooperation of the Maine Seacoast Mission, several families were provided with bed covering and layettes.

In closing, I extend my thanks to the teachers, superintendent and all others, who, by their splendid cooperation, have helped to make this program a success. I appeal to this continued interest and support, as it is everlasting team work of every soul that will bring results.

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Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Gouldsboro:

I have the honor of presenting to you my second annual report of the condition, progress and needs of your schools.

When schools opened September 12, we had an enrollment of 182 pupils which are arranged in grades as follows:

normal graduates, with teaching experience, and three teachers with a partial normal training. This year we have eight normal graduates, with teaching experience, and two with some normal training. Miss Ivy Rice, who taught the Birch Harbor school very successfully, resigned her position and accepted a position to teach grades 4, 5 and 6 at Winter Harbor. To succeed Miss Rice at the Birch Harbor school, we were fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Marjorie Pineo, who has had several years of successful teaching experience.

I can truly say that we have made progress this year. Our teachers are working diligently and faithfully in planning their work and in instructing the pupils under their care. The pupils also are showing a keen interest in their work, and by their desire to be present at school every day are showing 'that they like to go to school. These two things are a great 'inspiration to the teacher to do her best.

We have had several teachers' meetings during the year. At these meetings we have discussed the best methods of teaching and the best ways and means of trying to improve the backward pupils. While we must not forget the teaching of all subjects, I feel that special emphasis should be placed on reading, because it is the foundation for learning well all of the other subjects. If a pupil is to do well in arithmetic, geography, English, and other kindred subjects, he must first learn to read intelligently. This is the reason that reading is considered the most important subject and the cornerstone of the educational structure.

A year ago our weekly pay roll for teachers' wages was \$182. This year the weekly pay roll is \$172. This is a saving to the town of \$10 a week and \$320 for the school year. There has been a saving of \$8 a week on conveyance and a saving of \$256 for the school year of 32 weeks. There has also been a saving in the cost of fuel. These savings have been brought about without doing any harm to the school system.

Have you realized how important is the health of your child? Do you know that if you would have him do the best kind of school work, he must have the best kind of health? See to it, then, that your child is sound in body and mind by having him carry out the best rules for health. Then you will have a child who will do his school work in a natural way and one who will bring happiness into your home. Please cooperate with our school nurse, Mrs. Holt, who is doing such a splendid work for our boys and girls. If Mrs. Holt tells you that your child needs to have his eyes examined or that he needs to have a physical examination for this or that thing, please feel assured that she has made a thorough investigation of your child's needs, and do everything you can to help her for the best good of your child.

Text-Books

In grades from 5 to 9 inclusive, our books in English are

uniform. We have also purchased a new language book for grades 3 and 4. New spellers have been purchased for half of our schools, and next year we expect to be able to purchase enough spellers for the remainder of our schools. We have bought supplementary readers for grades from 1 to 6 inclusive. We are pleased to state that our book situation is better than it was a year ago, and we want to improve it still more during the coming year. We have tried to use the book money wisely and have endeavored to get full value for every dollar spent.

Repairs

After the schools closed in June, the members of the school committee and superintendent of schools went to every school building in town to see what repairs were needed.

At the Prospect Harbor building, part of the foundation was relaid and both rooms were painted inside. This building needs to be painted outside this coming year.

At the South Gouldsboro building, the ceilings of both rooms were painted and the walls of the grammar room were painted. The walls of the primary room need painting.

At Birch Harbor, the toilets were put in good condition so that they can be cleaned readily, and thus avoid the bad odors that had been prevalent with the chemical toilets.

At the West Bay building, the chemical toilet tanks were taken out, a cement foundation laid, and the toilets put in a condition that would make them more sanitary. Now the toilets can be readily cleaned out at any time of the year. The two rooms and hall were painted. The upper room of this building needs a new hardwood floor.

If you should go to each school building and examine the work done, you would say that the repair money had been wisely spent and that a great amount of work had been done.

During this fall term, 47 students were enrolled in high schools and academies, as follows: Winter Harbor high, 25; Higgins Classical Institute, 3; Steuben high, 15; Sullivan high, 2; Bucksport Seminary, 1; North Yarmouth Academy, 1.

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To George C Joy, Constable of the Town of Gouldsboro, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Gouldsboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, West Gouldsboro, in said town, on Monday, March 6, 1933, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear the report of town officers and commissioners and act thereon.
- 4 To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of the selectmen and assessors.
- 5 To choose selectmen and assessors for the ensuing year.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to serve as overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
- 7 To choose a member or members of the board of overseers of the poor.
- 8 To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of the collector and treasurer.
- 9 To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 10 To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 11 To choose a member or members of the superintending school committee.

- 12 To choose constables for the town.
- 13 To choose fence viewers for the town.
- 14 To choose surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark.
- 15 To choose a fire ward or wards for the ensuing year.
- 16 To see if the town will elect one, two or three road commissioners, or authorize the selectmen to appoint the road commissioner or commissioners.

- 30 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended on the Western Gouldsboro Point road, on that section known as the Orrin Whitaker ledges.
- 31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to gravel the road on Crowley's Island, Corea.
- 32 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars (50) to gravel the road extending from the Guzzle road to the homestead of George C. Joy.
- 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of roads.

- 35 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay its part of the State patrol and 50-50 maintenance work.

- 40 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for State-aid highways, as provided in section 20, of chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 41 To see if the town will vote to apply \$2,665 (appropriated in 1930) plus whatever the State may apportion in accordance with the provisions of section 22 (Five Times Provision) of chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 42 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of sections 26 to 32, inclusive (Three Town Act), chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, for the construction of a Stateaid highway, extending from State Highway "N", at West Bay, so-called, thence in a southerly direction, passing through the village of Prospect Harbor, to the Winter Harbor line; thence through Winter Harbor by the way of the village and Club House road, to Stateaid No. 1; thence by Summer Harbor road, so-called, to Route No. 186; thence by Route 186 to State Highway "N"; thence over State Highway "N" to Tunk Pond road, so-called, or Sullivan's State-aid No. 2; thence on Stateaid No. 2 to end of Sullivan's designation.

- 43 To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State-and highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.
- 44 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for notes and interest due in 1933.
- 45 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Department of Public Welfare, mothers' aid.
- 46 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Flanders Bay Service of the Maine Public Health Association.
- 47 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy snow fence.
- 48 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for snow removal.
- 49 To see if the town will vote to continue having street lights, and if so, to raise a sum of money for the same.
- 50 To see if the town will vote to close the Birch Harbor school and convey the scholars attending that school to the Prospect Harbor school.
- 51 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, text-books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- 52 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for superintendence account.
- 53 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of school property.
- 54 To act on any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
