NURSING REPORT

To the Citizens of Winter Harbor, Gouldsboro, Scorrento and East Sullivan:

I hereby submit a condensed report of the nursing activities of the Flanders' Bay M. P. H. N. A. services.

The past year has presented about the same problems as former years, and the same type of work was carried on, except that winter setting in so early and the unemployment situation still a problem caused more social service and relief visits than we usually have.

In all, 1,327 visits were made during the past year; this includes everything—investigations, instructions, follow-up and bedside. The bedside work has been very light compared to past years. Four patients were taken to the doctor, one to the oculist, 77 to the dentist and 28 to the hospital for emergency and throat operations. These patients were taken personally by the nurse. Fourteen clinics and well-baby conferences were held, with an attendance of 144, including the mothers and interested adults.

An outstanding project the past year made possible by an interested summer resident, was the free dental clinic, lasting one month, in West Gouldsboro, for the school children and pre-school also. This school was able to obtain a 100 per cent. dental award from the State; 105 attended this clinic, including adults, who paid the fee asked by the dentist; 138 extractions, 278 fillings and 59 cleanings were the result of this project.

Ninety-three visits were made to the 10 schoolrooms; 384 pupils received inspection twice; 273 received inspection for special reasons, namely communicable diseases; 300 were examined by the dentist; 30 were examined by the doctor. These inspections show that 227 pupils have 354 defects that can be corrected, teeth as usual taking the lead. This also shows that many pupils have several defects, a handicap that may interfere with their school progress. All schools need dental work, except the West Gouldsboro school. Plans are being made for a partial free dental clinic this coming summer for the children in the territory, and with the cooperation of all, this plan may materialize.

Statistical Report

Winter Harbor, 147 pupils; 81 have 114 defects; 55 corrections past year.

Gouldsboro, 173 pupils; 104 have 186 defects; 44 corrections past year.

Sorrento, 26 pupils; 15 have 20 defects, 14 corrections-past year.

East Sullivan, 52 pupils; 41 have 40 defects; 4 corrections past year.

The milk that is furnished by the State for under-nourished children, and planned to be delivered the entire school term to June, is proving to be a splendid project, as several children have shown a decided gain in the short time they have taken this milk. Plans are under way for the pre-school children to receive this needed milk. The report has been sent in to the State, and when permission is given, the under-nourished children will also receive the benefit of this program.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of
Gouldsboro:

I have the honor of presenting to you my third annual report of the condition, progress and needs of your schools.

Out of the ten teachers we employed last year, five of them are teaching for us this year. Four new teachers have been elected, namely: Miss Julia Whitaker, Corea primary; Willis Allen, jr., Corea grammar; John Donaghy, South Gouldsboro grammar, and Mrs. Emma Joy, Birch Harbor.

The work in all of the schools has gone along very well during the entire year. The attendance has been very good. Regular attendance is a very important factor in getting the necessary amount of work done. When pupils are obliged to stay out of school for one thing or another, it not only holds those particular pupils back in their work, but the work of the classes to which those pupils belong is also retarded. The lessons that the pupils missed while they were absent have to be reviewed so that they will not fall behind the rest of the class in their studies. I am very grateful to the parents for helping to have a good attendance.

To know just what kind of teachers we have in our schools, the best way to find out is to make several visits during the year and see the kind of work each teacher is doing. If the citizens will do this, then they will realize, as they can in no other way, that we have a corps of teachers of whom we have a right to be proud.

School-yard supervision is a very essential part of school work. It is just as much a part of the work of a teacher as is her teaching. In fact, I believe that the teacher who makes it her job to have the best kind of yard supervision, is also that kind of a teacher who does all of her other school work in the best possible way. Today the teacher is not out in the

yard merely to prevent trouble among pupils, but she is there to plan and regulate school-ground activities so that all of the pupils will get the exercise they need. All of our teachers are very much interested in yard supervision, and are doing all they can to make their work successful. At four of our schools we have installed swings, and during the spring term we expect to have teeters at some of these schools. At the other two schools we expect to put up, during the spring term, either swings or teeters.

We are very grateful to the C. W. A. that is making it possible for so many of our children to have milk every school day. I can foresee that this milk will be a great benefit to the children, and will also be the means of helping them to improve in their school work.

We should be thankful that we have not been visited by contagious diseases as have so many of our Maine towns. Our school children, as a whole, have been well and have been out of school very little on account of illness. I am very thankful, and I know you are, that we have a well-trained nurse to look after the health of our children. By having such a nurse, many diseases are prevented from spreading. When we realize that so many towns do not have any nursing service whatever, we should be doubly grateful for the splendid service we are getting.

The health of children, before and after they enter school, is a very important factor. To enjoy life in its fullness, one needs the best of health. In order for the child to enjoy doing his school work and to get the most out of his studies, his physical well being is very essential.

The greatest need at the present time is a better school system. The times will demand more of the future citizens than they are demanding of the citizens of today. For this reason, we should not be satisfied to go along in the same way year after year; we should not expect our children to go to the same type of school to which we went when the times demand that they be better educated. Especially is it unjust, when for even less money than is now being expended for schools, we can have the kind of school to which they should go.

It has been very gratifying to me to have the friendly interest of the school committee, teachers and citizens, and the

support which was necessary to carry on successfully the work of improving our schools. For this splendid cooperation, I wish to thank all.

 - 11 To choose constables for the town.
 - 12 To choose fence viewers for the town.

- 13 To choose surveyors of lumber, and measurers of wood and bark.
- 14 To choose a fire ward or wards for the ensuing year.
- 15 To see if the town will elect one, two or three road commissioners, or authorize the selectmen to appoint the road commissioner or commissioners.
- 16 To choose a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 17 To choose a budget committee for the ensuing year.
- 18 To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 19 To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable on the first day of May.
- 20 To see if the town will vote when all taxes shall be due and payable.
- 21 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the property now owned by the town for 1932 taxes.
- 22 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make a temporary loan or loans, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$12,000, in anticipation of and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year of 1934.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue the town's negotiable notes in a sum not exceeding \$17,000, for the purpose of renewing, refunding or paying certain indebtedness of the town during the municipal year of 1934, to wit:
 - Bar Harbor Banking & Trust Co., \$6,200.
 - First National Bank, Bar Harbor, \$4,000.
 - Union Trust Co., Ellsworth, \$2,000.
 - A B Bunker, \$4,000.
 - Florence Bunker, \$800.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of the poor.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the contingent fund.

- 26 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,377.37, the amount of overdrawn accounts during the municipal year of 1932; said sum to be used for paying permanent loans.
- 27 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400, to widen and repair the Island road, so-called, at Corea, leading from the postoffice to the sea wall.
- 28 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of roads.
- 29 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of bridges.
- 30 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay its part of the State patrol and 50-50 maintenance work.
- 31 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50 for repair of State-aid highways, not under State patrol, in accordance with section 18, chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 32 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to cut bushes on improved sections of State-aid highways, in accordance with section 44, chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to cut bushes on unimproved town roads.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$248 for the maintenance of third-class roads, or to be used in connection with the third-class apportionment made by the State for the improvement of third-class roads.
- 35 To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid as provided in section 20, chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- 36 To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State-aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges), under the provisions

of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 5, chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

- 37 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 271, P. L. 1931.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money in accordance with section 81, chapter 5, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, for placing flags on the graves of soldiers' and sailors', Memorial Day.
- 39 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be used for placing properly marked guide boards at intersecting roads within the town.
- 40 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$74.50, the amount due the C. L. Lindsey estate, for the expense of burial of the late Florris H. Briggs.
- 41 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for notes and interest due in 1934.
- 42 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the department of public welfare and mothers' aid.
- 43 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Flanders Bay Service of the Maine Public Health Association.
- 44 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy snow fence.
- 45 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for snow removal.
- 46 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for street lights.
- 47 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$821, the amount which the town, at a special town meeting, held December 5, 1933, voted to authorize the selectmen to hire to defray the town's part of the C. W. A. expense, as approved by the State Civic Works Administration.

- 48 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 for draining and grading the Prospect Harbor schoolyard.
- 49 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitors' services, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, text-books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- 50 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the superintendence account.
- 51 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of school property.
- 52 To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as the moderator reads.
- 53 To act on any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the town house, West Gouldsboro, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.
