SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Superintending School Committee

Irving Bunker term expires 1937

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro:

I hereby submit my second annual report of the condition, progress and needs of your schools.

I believe each school can be characterized this year as a group of interested boys and girls who are in most cases working up to the limit of their capacity, under the leadership of an enthusiastic teacher who is anxious for his or her pupils to get the right start on the road to good citizenship. The spirit of interest and cooperation which I find in all with whom I come in contact as superintendent in the town of Gouldsboro is gratifying, and insures the success of the educational project in which we are engaged.

Following the testing program, which was instituted last year, the Stanford Achievement Test was once more given to grades three to eight inclusive. The results are interesting and enlightening, for the tests as viewed from one year to another may be considered as a sort of educational yardstick. It appears that most pupils have made a consistent gain over last year, that of the eighty-seven pupils tested this year, twenty-three are far above grade, thirty-three are about at grade and thirty-one are below or far below grade. Seven pupils who were somewhat above grade last year advanced as much as two grades and one pupil who last year was below grade advanced nearly three grades. Pupils far below grade may be expected to advance but little and may even drop back. It is hoped that this knowledge may enable teachers to do a certain amount of remedial work in the hope of bringing a larger number of pupils up to grade.

We are very fortunate in having the health of our children

so carefully checked by the school nurse. When parents realize that health is fundamental they are willing to cooperate fully in having corrections made in teeth and throats. The seven-point circle, which is a part of the annual field day parade, is an inspiring sight to all who are fortunate enough to witness it. For the child who is able to participate it holds joy and self-satisfaction, for he knows he is physically fit. We should be sorry for the boy or girl who is left out and who can only be a spectator, when perhaps the correction of a few teeth might have given him or her a real thrill.

We are now engaged in a rather intensive course of spelling in the grades of the entire district, the results of which may be announced on field day.

I feel sure that all who have visited the Lincoln school have been impressed with the improvements made there in light and sanitation. At the opening of the present school year rooms which had formerly been dark and unsanitary were found to be clean and attractive. This improvement is much appreciated by teachers and pupils. We wish now to turn to Prospect Harbor and Birch Harbor schools to point out the need of more windows which we hope can be installed before another fall. Our school flags need to be put in order and I am asking for a small appropriation for that purpose.

Even though the natural lighting of a room is good, on dark days in winter the eye-strain is great without electric lights. For this reason and also because of an interest in visual education through motion pictures, I appreciate the generosity of Mrs. Paine which has prompted her to wire the Prospect Harbor school. I hope that in the near future we can find a way to provide electric lights for other schools in Gouldsboro.

I feel sure that all who have an interest in the schools will share with me in this expression of appreciation to Mrs. Ernest T. Paine and Mr. Morton Bunker for their gifts at Prospect Harbor and South Gouldsboro respectively.

NURSING REPORT

Annual Report of the Flander's May Nursing Service For the Year 1936

To the Citizens of Gouldsboro, I hereby submit the 11th annual report of the service from January 1, 1936, to January 1, 1937:

The personnel of the committee remains the same, with Fletcher Wood as chairman, Charles Small as treasurer, Mrs. Rubie Tracy as secretary and Mrs. Theresa R. Anderson, R. N., as supervising nurse.

"Life," says Longfellow, "without health is a burden, with health is a joy and gladness."

Those who have been interested in the service and have watched the public health program these past years, will probably have noticed that it meets a definite community need devoting itself continuously to the problems of tubercu-

losis, of the prevention of infant and maternal mortality, the health of school children and the prevention of contagious diseases. This is done by visits of nursing, instruction, investigation, follow-up and supervision, in the pre-school and infant welfare, and in the pre-natal program.

The success of this health service is due to a great extent to its affiliation with the Maine Public Health Association by which it receives supervision, and to the many opportunities offered to the nurse through this affiliation in keeping abreast with modern methods, by attending lectures, institutes, conferences, by opportunities to meet with other nurses for general discussions and round table talks. The nurse working alone, especially in a rural section in a service with no other organization, works at a disadvantage.

General Report

In all, 648 visits have been made, which include visits of nursing, instruction, investigation in general, pre-natal, infant, pre-school and social service cases. Many adults and mothers, pre-schools and infants attended the midsummer clinic held in Winter Harbor, as well as attendance at local clinics. Forty miscellaneous visits were made, which included distribution of clothing, layettes, blankets to social service cases, conferences with parents, school superintendent and distribution of literature. Twenty individuals were taken to the hospital, one of these being a case to the Togus hospital, one to the clinic for crippled children in Portland, six to the physician for X-ray and physical examinations, and twenty were taken to the dentist.

Tuberculosis

Four health talks were given by the nurse in town halls; one to a Farm Bureau meeting. These health talks were given in conjunction with the films shown by the school superintendent of pictures taken on field day, safety, educational films showing the engineering feats, such as the Boulder Dam and other high lights of educational value. The health films on tuberculosis were very appropriate, it being the Christmas seal sale season.

The Early Diagnosis Campaign which is conducted each spring emphasizes prevention with its distribution of literature. Follow-up visits were made to contacts, six X-rays were taken, two were found from the X-ray standpoint to be

negative, two were childhood type, one was an arrested case, and one is under observation. These cases all had the standard physical examinations and need close follow-up for a long time. This coming April another Early Diagnosis Campaign will be held, literature, posters, exhibits, health films, also radio talks will be given over several stations. Citizens of Gouldsboro and readers of the town report are requested to watch for this program as it is an important project. It has been estimated that for every recorded death from tuberculosis, there are from 8 to 10 cases afflicted with this disease. These figures point the need to an educational campaign emphasizing early diagnosis.

School Health Service

Education is of little use if the individual is incapacited through ill health, and since health is believed to be the foundation of skills and all other virtues that belong to good citizenship, it should receive sufficient emphasis in the school program. Ninety-four visits were made to the twelve schoolrooms and of the 251 students, twenty-two of these had an annual physical examination by the physician. One hundred and sixty-two were found with defects that can be corrected, such as teeth, vision and throat. These defects were reported to the parents either by follow-up visits or notices sent to them. The fact that eighty-nine children had defects corrected since the last full inspection is evidence of the cooperation given by the parents and teachers. Eighty-nine 7-pointers marched in the 7-point circle on Field Day, and judging by the interest shown by the parents, teachers, and last but not least by the children themselves, many more will be added to the list this coming year. All defects were referred to physician, oculist or dentist.

In closing, I wish to extend my thanks to the superintendent of schools, to the teachers, parents, town officials, and all others who by their cooperation and help have contributed so much to the success of the health service. A appeal for their continued interest and cooperation which in the past has made this service a success.

To Irving P. Hinckley, Constable of the Town of Gouldsboro, in said County, GREETING:

- 17 To choose a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 18 To choose a budget committee for the ensuing year.
- 19 To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 20 To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable on the first day of May.
- 21 To see if the town will vote when all taxes shall be due and payable.
- 22 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell all property now owned by the town for 1934-35 and 1936 taxes.

- 49 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to rent the town house for amusement purposes, under such provisions as are recommended by the budget committee.
- 50 To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise a sum of money to wire the town house.
- 51 To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise a sum of money to insure the town buildings.

- 52 To see if the town will vote to adopt Daylight Saving Time.
- 53 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor's services, conveyance, tuition and board of pupils, text-books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- 54 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the superintendence account.
- 55 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of school property.
- 56 To see if the town will vote to wire all schoolhouses not now wired and raise a sum of money for the same.
- 57 To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
