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

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It is with pleasure that I submit for your examination my first annual report of the schools of Carthage.

I have not obtained all material for the statistics and will be obliged to omit that part of the usual report.

I shall make the report by schools and endeavor to explain what has been accomplished and what is needed in each school as I take it up.

The school in the Stickney District was taught very successfully by Miss Orrissa Rollins. This relates to the fall and winter terms. Miss Rollins is a teacher of considerable experience and ability. The pupils did good work and I believe that parents were well satisfied.

The number of pupils attending this school during the winter term was four. So far as I am able to ascertain there will be only three pupils to attend during the spring term. It is very likely that after the snow is gone one family will return, and that will bring the number to five. In accordance with Section II of the school laws a vote must be taken by the town if the school is to be maintained. If + it does not seem advisable to continue the school it will be necessary to convey a part of the pupils, and as there is no school nearer than the Ellis this would have to be the school unless it was deemed better to convey to East Dixfield and pay tuition to Wilton. The buildings at the Stickney school are very poor and would have to be repaired considerably to be comfortable. It seems to me that it would be much the better plan to convey the pupils to some school where a good sized school could be maintained. I am sure that the pupils would profit by such an arrangement.

At the Ellis school Mary Murray, an inexperienced teacher, has taught an unusually good school for a beginner. I have heard no complaints from parents and have heard much of a commendable nature.

The building in this district is the best in town but lacks sufficient window and blackboard space. With a small outlay to remedy these two things the building would be in very suitable condition. I wish here to mention one thing that distinguishes this school frcm all the other schools that I supervise, and that is the quiet and orderly manner of the pupils in the building. They are also very polite to the teacher and to visitors, a thing which is sadly lacking in most of the other schools.

Mrs. A. L. Coburn has given me entire satisfaction in the Newman school. The pupils have accomplished a large amount of work and have done it thoroughly. This building needs to be repaired considerably in order to provide proper light and ventilation.

In the grades at Berry Mills Mrs. Packard has taught a good school where conditions have been unfavorable.

I fully realize that the town is financially unable to put all of its buildings in first class shape at once, but I am sure that a beginning could be made by making of one of its buildings a modern one, with proper lighting, heating and ventilating, and chemical closets placed in an outhouse, which should be connected with the school room by a covered passage. These are the necessary things to a good schoolhouse. They teach proper sanitation as no text-book or teacher can do. The out buildings are a disgrace to any community, especially the one at Berry Mills, and they will continue to remain so until some arrangement like the above mentioned is made.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

We were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Chamberlain for the year. Mr. Chamberlain is a young man of no experience, but he has the qualities necessary to a successful teacher. The work that he is doing is very satisfactory. I note that pupils do not prepare their lessons as well as they should and it appears that they do little work at home. It is very hard for a teacher to get many pupils to do work out of school hours unless parents require their children to do it.

My attention has been called by the State Department to the inadequate equipment of the library. Every High school should have a library well supplied with reference books relating to subjects taught in the school.

I am told that at least \$25.00 should be expended each year for this purpose and that a larger amount should be expended to make a start. The town is not in a position to raise any large sum and in my recommendations I shall ask for only \$30.00. Opposition is expected to an appropriation for this purpose but the Department can bring pressure to bear in many ways, and it would be profitable for the town to co-operate and show a disposition to consider favorably suggestions of this nature.

#### **FINANCES**

You will notice that some of the accounts have been overdrawn, especially that of common schools. In spite of this I believe that the schools have been run as economically as possible. Good economy means the least possible outlay to insure the best results. It seems to me that enough better results could be obtained by a larger expenditure to economically warrant it.

In asking for \$800.00 on common schools, I have in mind the overdraw, which has been increasing for the past two years. It is needed and I am not sure that the overdraw can be fully made up with the additional \$300.00 that is asked for. I have made all recommendations as low as possible, and some are lower than they should be.

#### CONCLUSION

In closing I wish to extend to you my thanks for the kind and liberal assistance you have given me.

I want you to realize that a superintendent can do little without the cooperation of the school committee. I feel that you have done much to famillarize me with conditions and my work with you has been very pleasant.

# TOWN WARRANT

### To Daniel W. Berry, a Constable in the town of Carthage, in the County of Franklin, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Carthage qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Grange Hall at Berry Mills in said town of Carthage, on Monday the 5th day of March, A. D. 1917, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

#### ARTICLE 1.

To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2.

To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

#### ARTICLE 3.

To hear the reports of town officers for the year and act on the same.

#### ARTICLE 4.

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

#### ARTICLE 5.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for summer roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

#### ARTICLE 6.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for winter roads for the ensuing year.

#### ARTICLE 7.

To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

#### ARTICLE 8.

To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$300.00 for the improvement of the section of the State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 25 of the Public laws of 1916.

#### ARTICLE 9.

To see what action the town will take in regard to back taxes in the collector's hands.

#### ARTICLE 10.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

#### ARTICLE 11.

To see if the town will vote to have a free High school and what sum of money shall be raised for the same.

#### ARTICLE 12.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for tuition of High school.

#### ARTICLE 13.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for janitors' services and wood for High school.

#### ARTICLE 14.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the purchase of text-books.

#### ARTICLE 15.

To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repair of schoolhouses.

#### ARTICLE 16.

To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of poor.

#### ARTICLE 17.

To see what sum of money the town will raise for current expenses.

#### ARTICLE 18.

To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance.

#### ARTICLE 19.

To see what sum of money the town will raise for the observance of Memorial day.

#### ARTICLE 20.

To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire loan, if necessary.

#### Article 21.

To see if the town will vote to pay a discount on all taxes paid on or before August 20, 1917, and what sum of money shall be raised for the same.

#### ARTICLE 22.

To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes of the 1917 commitment that remain unpaid on December 1, 1917.

#### ARTICLE 23.

To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of grading the road and clearing the brook from the D. W. Berry bridge to the A. M. Fuller turn, and how the same shall be expended.

#### ARTICLE 21.

To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay salary of Supt. of schools.

#### ARTICLE 25.

To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to widen and grade the road between the Albert Tainter residence and the basin turn and see how the same shall be expended.

#### ARTICLE 26.

To see if the town will vote to give the superintending school committee authority to maintain schools in such districts as they deem necessary.

#### ARTICLE 27.

To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for town office repairs.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange hall at Berry Mills in said town at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the check list.
