## Town Warrant

Franklin, ss.

State of Maine

To Guy C. Robbins, a Constable in the Town of Carthage in said County,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town on the 1st day of March, A. D. 1943, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports of the Municipal Officers for the year ending February 10, 1943.
- Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for support of Common Schools including tuition, text books and supplies, school house repairs, insurance, school office expense, High School tuition and interest on school fund, including Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 6. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for repair of summer roads and bridges.
- Art. 7. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Patrol fund.

- Art. 8. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for State Aid Road construction in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and under the provisions of Section 19, C. 28, R. S. 1930, or under provisions of Section 3, C. 229, P. L. 1937.
- Art. 9. To see what sum if any the town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, C. 132, P. L. 1935.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of two hundred and sixty-two dollars (\$262.00) for the maintenance of the improved section of the Third Class Roads, to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of the Third Class Roads.
- Art. 11. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for State Aid road tools.
- Art. 12. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of plowing and sanding winter roads on Routes 2, 142, State Aid No. 3.
- Art. 13. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for winter roads.
- Art. 14. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for cutting bushes on Routes 2, 142, S. A. No. 3.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for care of the Poor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for County Nurse services.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$15.00, being dues for Maine Municipal Association.
- Art. 18. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for discount on Taxes.

- Art. 19. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Overdrawn accounts.
- Art. 20. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Abatements.
- Art. 21. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Current Expense.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to pay and refund its indebtedness to the Rumford Falls Trust Co. by authorizing the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the town to the amount of said indebtedness, the number, terms, and conditions of said note or notes to be determined by the Selectmen.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town charges and town debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, and to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the town for the money so borrowed to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding Municipal year, as temporary loans.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to charge interest beginning December the first next on all taxes remaining unpaid at time of settlement in the following February.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee to arrange the place and number of schools for the ensuing year to the best interest of the town.
- Art. 26. To see what sum if any the town will vote to raise for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of Chapter 5, S. 82, R. S. 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 27. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the care of cemeteries.

- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for necessary bonds for Town Officers.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deed for such property.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 or less for blister rust control, in cooperation with the State Forest Service and U. S. Department of Agriculture.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to rescind any amount appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway Construction in excess of amount required to meet State apportionment.
- Art. 32. To see what rate per cent. and final date to be allowed on discount of taxes on the 1943 Commitment, poll taxes excepted.
- Art. 33. To see what action the town will take in regard to providing fire extinguishers for the South part of the town.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to transfer the amount of \$300.00 appropriated in 1942 for State Aid Highway construction, also unexpended balance in material for Special Resolve (\$67.60), to an account for purchase of snow removal equipment.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for revising and correcting the list of voters.

#### **COMMENTS**

#### CASH:

All cash recorded as received was properly accounted for as summarized on Exhibit B.

Payments were made by check from properly authorized warrants as summarized on Exhibits B and D.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank as per detail on Schedule 1.

#### TAXES:

The 1941 tax commitment was added and found to agree with the Assessors' records. The total commitment was accounted for by cash, discount, abatements, tax liens, or was uncollected as shown by Schedule 2.

The records covering the prior years' taxes were examined and those taxes still unpaid are also shown by Schedule 2.

The excise tax receipts were added and, according to these records, all cash collected had been deposited with the Treasurer as shown by Schedule 7.

The tax liens were examined and those still unpaid are shown by Schedule 3. All recorded payments were credited to the proper year.

#### TRUST FUNDS:

The savings bank books covering Cemetery Trust Funds were examined and the detail is shown by Schedule 4.

The Ministerial & School Fund was used by the town some time in the past.

#### GENERAL:

The vouchers and supporting invoices were examined and as far as our examination went, all appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

It was necessary for our auditor to check in detail all tax payments to the Collector in order to arrive at a correct unpaid list. The Collector has been furnished with a copy of the list of unpaid taxes and we believe same will assist him in making a complete unpaid list at the end of the 1942 year.

With the exception of cash and trust funds, no external verification was made of your asset or liability accounts.

Every pupil was absent at least one-half day during the school year which ended June, 1942. The following pupils were not absent during the fall term ending December 18th, 1942: Harlan Jepson, Ronald Mc-Intire and Faye White of the Berry Mills Primary School; Everard Grant and Kenneth Flagg of the Berry Mills Grammar School.

This matter of attendance should receive more thought and care than is generally given, and it is clearly a matter that should be of special interest to parents, for they are directly responsible for more than three-fourths of the absences. The children who come to school a few days, and then remain away a few, cause much trouble. Such children are behind in their work for they cannot possibly keep up with their respective grades when they are absent so much. They increase the teachers' work because they must receive special attention and be given special lessons until they are able to keep up with the regular work of the grades.

In most cases, the parents who complain that their children are not getting ahead fast enough will blame the teachers and the school system, when the fault is due entirely to the parents' lack of interest in the children's attendance. This is especially noticeable at the end of the school year when the pupils are promoted to the next grade, and it is generally true that the child's promotion, or failure to be promoted, rests almost entirely upon his regularity, or irregulaity of attendance.

#### HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

During the past year tuition has been paid for seven pupils in Dixfield High School, four in Weld High School, one in Phillips High School, one in Wilton Academy and one in Mexico High School. They are Edward Daley, Frances Daley, Doris Daley, Raymond Webster, Olive Stickney, William LaPlant and Roberta Smith at Dixfield; Linwood Burtchell, Grangie Hinkley, Leslie Hinkley and Lorensten Hinkley at Weld; Charles Jepson at Phillips; Ruth White at Wilton; and Wilhelmina Brown at Mexico. Doris Daley and Olive Stickney were

graduated from Dixfield High last June. Frances Daley withdrew from school during the spring term. Edward Daley has been transferred to Mexico as his parents moved to that town in August. The Hinkley brothers withdrew from Weld High about the middle of the fall term. William LaPlant left school in the fall and went to work for the Wilton Woolen Company. The other pupils are still in attendance at their respective high schools.

#### **FINANCES**

The receipts in the school department have been \$4,467.38 and the expenditures, \$3,914.08. There is a balance of \$645.63 in the Common School Account. The account for Repairs and Equipment is overdrawn \$76.11, and the one for Insurance, \$16.22. This leaves a total amount unexpended of \$553.30.

The total amount asked for is \$74.20 more than was raised last year. The increases are \$50.00 for Repairs and Equipment, \$14.20 for Superintendence, and \$10.00 for Insurance.

## South Franklin County Nursing Service

To the Citizens of Carthage:

The fifteenth annual report of the Nursing Service is submitted covering a period from January 1, 1942 and ending December 31, 1942.

In reviewing our work for the year we are impressed with the gradual change in our duties as some old procedures were dropped to assume new responsibilities and duties.

Our entrance into the war made everyone realize that health was one of the most important factors in winning and a responsibility we owe our community is to maintain our own health. We find that families are giving much thought to this. Under a new Director in the Department of Education, it has been decreed that the school must assume more responsibility and the excellent programs carried by your teachers must be adopted by all. This might make it appear that the nurse would be relieved of some routine details, and she was, to take on others.

The public health nurse in each community has national recognition as the one person who has the confidence of the people and an understanding of their problems. Her training in public health and social service is being utilized by the Army, Red Cross, and other national groups, by making her the connecting link with the homes. Most of these calls are concerned with health but there usually is a social aspect.

Newspapers and magazines have told you that with the first mobilization of troops, the United States Public Health Service instituted a venereal disease program directed towards prevention as far as is possible, and a more adequate control than was enforced in the last war. With so many soldiers in Maine and defense areas, we have been asked to cooperate with official agencies in regard to this other menace. The cooperation we have received has been gratifying as it shows that the attitude of the public has changed and we now accept this as a public health problem instead of blindly refusing to see it in our midst.

The shortages of doctors and nurses has been felt by all public health services and we find that it increases our responsibilities. Your nurse has been asked to act as County Nurse Deputy, Emergency Medical Service, Office of Civilian Defense. This applies not only to work in first aid stations in emergencies, but also pertains to the supply of available help in any disaster.

There has been a great deal of emphasis on prevention of communicable diseases, as they are inceasing, and the usual care may not be available. Your past response to prophylactic measures has been excellent, and we urge your full cooperation with health authorities in the rules and regulations issued by that department.

Transportation has always been difficult to plan and under existing conditions is a great handicap to our corrective program in schools. It was due to this that the dental clinics were discontinued last spring.

We endeavor to carry out our usual work in homes and schools as far as war time conditions permit, but to the parents and teachers many of the minor details must be delegated.
