### Town Warrant

FRANKLIN, SS.

STATE OF MAINE

To Lee G. Hutchinson, a Constable in the Town of Carthage in said County,

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town on the 3rd day of March, A. D. 1947, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Town Reports of the Municipal Officers for the year ending February 10, 1947.
  - ART. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for support of Common Schools, including Tuition, Text-books and Supplies, Schoolhouse Repairs, Insurance, School Office Expense, High School Tuition, and Interest on School Fund, including Superintendent of Schools.
- ART. 6. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of repairing the road from Route 2 to the (Maxwell) White farm.
- ART. 7. To see what the town will do with the money received for the use of the town truck and plow.
- ART. 8. To see if the town will appropriate and raise \$1,000.00 and interest to pay on the Town Truck and Snow Plow for the year 1947.

- ART. 9. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 to paint and plank the Iron Bridges.
- ART. 10. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the Repair of Summer Roads and Bridges.
- ART. 11. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Patrol Fund.
- ART. 12. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for State Aid Road Construction, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and under the provisions of Section 19, C. 28, R. S. 1930, or under provisions of Section 3, C. 229, P. L. 1937.
- ART. 13. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, C. 132, P. L. 1935.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$262.00 for the maintenance of the Improved Section of the Third Class roads, to be used in conjunction with the State Apportionment for the Construction of the Third Class Roads.
- ART. 15. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for road tools.
- ART. 16. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of plowing and sanding Winter Roads on Routes 2, 142, State Aid No. 3.
- ART. 17. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Winter Roads.
- ART. 18. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for care of Poor.
- ART. 19. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for County Nurse services.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$15.00, being dues for Maine Municipal Association.

- ART. 21. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Discount on Taxes.
- ART. 22. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Overdrawn Accounts.
- ART. 23. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Abatements.
- ART. 24. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for Current Expense.
- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to pay and refund its indebtedness to the Rumford Falls Trust Co. by authorizing the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the town to the amount of said indebtedness, the number, terms, and conditions of said notes to be determined by the Selectmen.
- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town charges and town debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, and to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the town so borrowed to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate the total levy for the preceding municipal year, as temporary loans.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to charge interest beginning December the first, next, on all taxes remaining unpaid at time of settlement in the following February.
- ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee to arrange the place and number of schools for the ensuing year, to the best interests of the town.
- ART. 29. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise for advertising our Natural Resources, Advantages and Attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, S. 82, R. S. 1930, said sum to be expended under the direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- ART. 30. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

- ART. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate and raise for necessary Bonds for Town Officers.
- ART. 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- ART. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of White Blister Rust in accordance with the R. S., C. 11, Secs. 62, 63, 64.
- ART. 34. To see what rate percent and final date to be allowed on Discount of Taxes on the 1946 commitment, poll taxes excepted.
- ART. 35. To see what sum, if any, the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of hiring a doctor to inspect the Carthage school children.
- ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sell and assign unmatured tax mortgage liens for the amount unpaid and interest and costs.
- ART. 37. To see what sum, if any, the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of purchasing a sand spreader.
- ART. 38. To see what sum, if any, the town will appropriate and raise for an Honor Roll.
- ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the County Commissioners to discontinue the road from Potter Schoolhouse to the resident of Elva Maxwell place so called.
- ART. 40. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for a play ground at the Stickney Corner School, and by whom it shall be expended.
- ART. 41. To see if the town will fix a date when taxes shall be due and payable.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for revising and correcting the list of voters.

### Report of Public Health Nurse

To the Citizens of Carthage:

I submit the following report of this Association, covering the period from January 1, 1946 to January 1, 1947.

An old adage is, "To be forewarned is to be forearmed." Since the beginning of World War II, we have been warned of the expected rise in tuberculosis death rates. This has been true in European countries. In the United States, the change has been slight as we were "armed." Extensive industrial surveys were done reaching a great army of war workers who had come from many small hamlets and districts that would not be reached for many years under ordinary conditions. Intensive casefinding has been carried out as far as facilities permitted.

The opening of chest X-ray clinics in the county permits us to continue our school program interrupted by the war. The Maine Public Health Association will, this year, award certificates to schools for 100% participation in the tuberculin testing program. All children reacting will be X-rayed and a regular routine advised which will increase their resistance to infection. We will search for the source of the infection by offering X-rays to the adults who are contacts, that is, living in the family with the children. This will also be offered to teachers and school bus drivers. Your survey will be done before the June clinic. The family and citizens, with your nurse, share the responsibility as she cannot possibly know who the contacts are.

Due to the fact that it is difficult for physicians to find time for the physical examinations, Stickney Corner School has not been examined at this writing. 38 were examined at Berry's Mills.

Dr. Defoe feels that some plan for tonsillectomies should be made for the urgent cases, and stated that he would cooperate with the service in working out a plan.

Home visits have been tuberculosis 8, infants 2, pre-school 3, school 12, adult 2, crippled children 7, interviews 10. We have had 17 conferences with teachers and one demonstration of inspections.

As Dr. Arms has been retired and has left the state, some other plan for our immunizations must be made. Diphtheria is still being reported from various parts of the state. Carthage has always protected its children, and I feel sure that you will wish to continue.

Public health is primarily an educational process, guiding the citizens so that they may find a better way of living. It is gathering the latest authentic information and placing it where and how it will be assimilated to the advantage of the greatest number. To keep up with what is happening in health work and the rapidly changing standards and policies, requires a great deal of time in study and attendance at meetings. More than thirty meetings have been devoted to this. In most cases, your nurse has taken some part. It is regretted that you were not present at our annual meeting in April, when Miss Katharine Gay, Division of Tuberculosis Control, brought to the citizens a most complete outline of Maine's Tuberculosis Program, and this was followed by movies that you might see what you had heard. At the October meeting, Dr. Simpson, Director of Maine's newly organized Mental Hygiene, outlined the future program, after speaking on "Behavior Problems of Children." Both programs were of importance to every citizen.

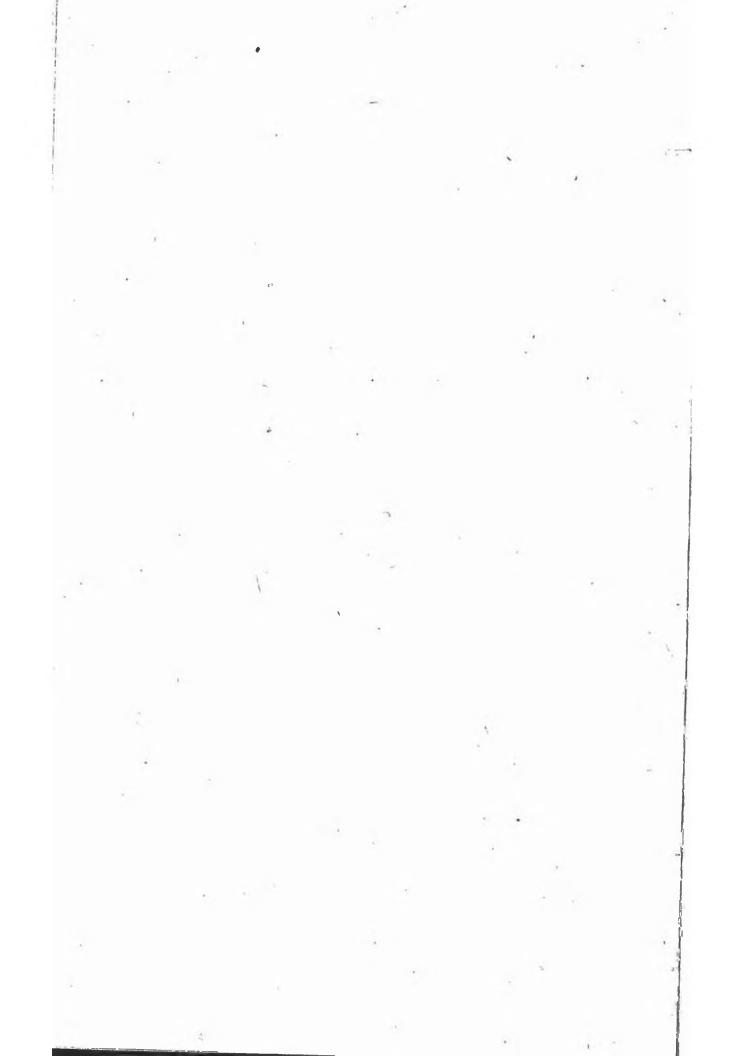

## Carthage School Report

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Carthage:

In submitting my first annual report of the Carthage schools, I should like to express my appreciation for the help and cooperation of the Superintending School Committee, former Superintendent Frank McGouldrick, and of the teachers, and for the interest that so many citizens in the areas served by the Berry Mills and Stickney Corner schools have manifested in the welfare of the pupils.

Throughout the state, this has been a year when it has been very difficult to maintain schools. Reasons for this are a serious shortage of certified teachers, delayed shipments of items ordered, and a rise of from twenty to forty per cent in books and supplies. We are, therefore, fortunate to be able to maintain our schools and retain certified teachers in all positions. No changes were necessary at the opening of schools in September.

#### HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

The following students were registered at High School during the Fall Term of this school year: At Dixfield High School, Iva Hinkley, Leslie Hinkley, Emily Daley, Lewis Webster, and Gary Hutchinson; at Mexico High School, Ruby Horne. Lewis Webster left school at the end of the first six-week period, leaving five in attendance at High School at the present time. It is probable that this number will be raised to six or seven next September.

### **FINANCES**

Total expenditures in the School Department were \$5,566.91, and receipts \$5,566.91. The Common School Account is overdrawn \$51.73, and there are unexpended amounts in Repairs and Equipment, Office Expense, Superintendence and Insurance. Subtracting the unexpended items from the overdraft leaves the school account in balance. Next year's budget must anticipate continued increases in the cost of operating schools as well as a probability of raising salaries to meet whatever minimum is set up by the present state legislature. It would seem logical to assume that about \$1,200.00 more than last year should be appropriated in order to be reasonably sure of meeting increasing costs all along the line. ### CONCLUSION

As a result of the state fire inspection, we were required to provide fire extinguishers for each room and repair the outside stairway escape at the Berry Mills building to conform to regulations. Fire extinguishers, with liquid of the non-freezing type, have been pro-

vided in all classrooms, and the fire escape will be repaired as soon as possible. Our schools are fairly well supplied with textbooks and working materials. As soon as funds are available, welcome additions would be a library for each room, consisting of suitable fiction and non-fiction reading matter adapted to each grade level, and provision of more materials for handwork activities.

The Stickney Corner School has acquired a section of land adjacent to the school in order to provide needed playground space. Use of this land was made possible by the gift of Earl Webster and is greatly appreciated. The pupils of the school with Mrs. Weld's assistance are assuming the burden of the expense in preparing the ground so that it may be used.

Pupils in elementary schools today are facing a future in which they will be forced to cope with difficult problems. It is of greatest importance that they receive in the grades better training than ever in such essential skills as reading, writing, and functional arithmetic and also the power to think constructively and develop the attitudes and qualities of good citizenship. We must continue to study and evaluate the educational facilities that we have and strive to shape them more and more to the changing needs of boys and girls who differ in individual interests and abilities.
