STATE OF MAINE

To Lee G. Hutchinson, a Constable in the Town of Carthage in said County. Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Town on the 6th day of March, A. D. 1950, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Reports of the Municipal Officers for the year ending February 11, 1950.

Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for support of the Common Schools, including Tuition, School Office Expenses, High School Tuition, and Interest on School Funds, including Superintendent of Schools, Insurance and School House Repairs, Textbooks, Supplies and High School Conveyance.

Art. 6. To see what the Town will do with money received for the use of Town truck and plow.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise \$1,000. and Interest of \$200.00 to pay on the Town Truck and Snow Plow for the year 1950.

Art. 8. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the repair of Summer Roads and Bridges. Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the State Aid Road Construction, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and under the provisions of Sections 25 & 29, Chap. 20 R: S. 1944 as amended.

Art. 10. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying Bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section L. 1935.

Art. 11. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Road Tools.

Art. 12. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of Plowing and Sanding Winter Roads on Routes 2, 142, State Aid No. 3 and 4.

Art. 13. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Winter Roads.

Art. 14. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for care of Poor.

Art. 15. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for County Nurse service.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$20.00, being dues for Maine Municipal Association.

Art. 17. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Discount on Taxes.

Art. 18. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Overdrawn Accounts.

Art. 19. To see what the Town will appropriate and raise for Abatements.

Art. 20. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Current Expenses.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to hire sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town Charges and Town Debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, and to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the Town so borrowed to an amount not to exceed in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year, as temporary loans.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee to arrange the place and number of schools for the ensuing year to the best interests of the Town.

Art. 23. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise for advertising our Natural Resources, Advantages and Attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, S. 82, R. S. 1930, said sum to be expended under direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Art. 24. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

Art. 25. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for necessary Bonds for Town Officers.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Pine Blister Rust, in accordance with the R. S. C. H. 32, Sec. 54.

Art. 28. To see what rate per cent. and final date to be allowed on Discount of Taxes on the 1950 commitment, poll taxes excepted.

Art. 29. To see what sum, if any, the Town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of hiring a doctor to inspect the Carthage School children.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sell and assign unmatured tax mortgage liens for the amount unpaid and interest and cost. Art. 31. To see if the Town will fix a date when the Taxes shall be due and payable.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to pay and refund its indebtedness to the Rumford Falls Trust Co. by authorizing the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the Town to the amount of said notes to be determined by the Selectmen.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest beginning December the first, next, on all taxes remaining unpaid.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance creating and governing the Fire Department of the Town of Carthage, as proposed by the Special Fire Equipment Committee appointed March 7, 1949.

(A) To see what sum of money the Town of Carthage will appropriate and raise for the Fire protection and apportion the same between Berry Mills and South Carthage.

Art. 35. To see what action the Town will take in regard to trading the present School Bus for one with a larger Carrying Capacity, and raising money for same.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$650.00 to pay note and interest on New School Bus.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Town, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, on the said day of said meeting, for revising and correcting the list of voters.

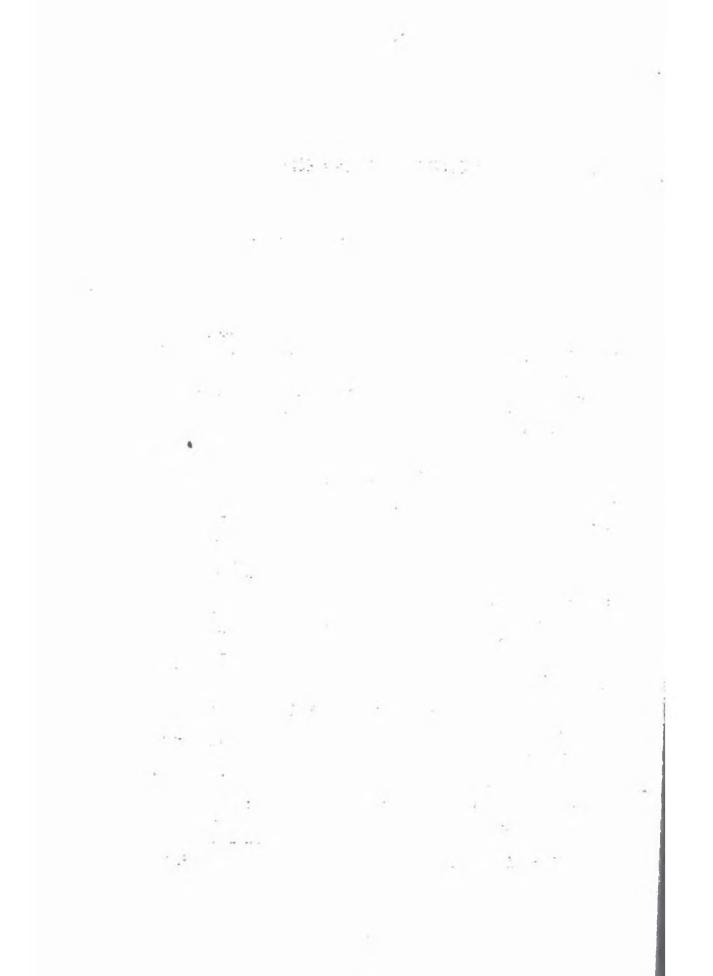

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Carthage School Report

To the Superintending School Committe and Citizens of the Town of Carthage:

I hereby submit my first annual report of the Carthage Schools;

When schools opened last September, we were fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Florence Stone of Norridgewock as teacher in our Berry Mills Grammar room. By moving the fourth grade from the Primary room to the Grammar room and keeping the 5th, 6th and 7th grades in town it gives Mrs. Stone a teaching load of 33 pupils and four grades. Mrs. Swett's teaching load is still too high. She has 40 pupils and four grades. If the school enrollment continues to increase as it has in the past then the two teacher program at Berry Mills will prove inadequate to offer the best school program.

The Stickney Corner School opened in the Fall with 10 pupils and now has 12 pupils. The cost, on a per pupil basis, for running a small school is great. It would be beneficial to the pupils, if the average attendance falls below eight, to transport them either to the Wilton school at East Dixfield or to Dixfield Grammar School.

Two of the above students will graduate next June and we anticipate that at least six will enter as Freshmen next September. This will make our high school enrollment about 15 next Fall. Tuition at Weld High School is now \$125.00 and at Dixfield it is \$150.00. Next Fall the Dixfield High School Tuition will probably be \$175.00. Our High School students are doing commendable work and deserve much credit for their achievements.

REPAIRS

The amount spent for repairs on the Berry Mills School this past year was considerable more than had been anticipated because of the State Department's recommendations that needed to be carried out before the Grammar room could be opened for classes. The Grammar room floor was put in new, sanded and refinished. New toilets had to be built so that the Grammar Students would not have to go thru the Primary room. The old toilets were made fly proof. The School house roof was reshingled on one side. The costs of the materials for the repairs was \$621.16.

FINANCES

If it had not been necessary to carry through a program of unexpected repairs on the School house then our school finances would have been in average condition. In examining the financial accounts it will be noted that there is a balance of \$50.00 in High School conveyance and \$2.22 in office expense; Overdraft are \$512.46 in Common Schools, \$1,088.89 in Repairs and Equipment, and \$35.65 in Insurance. Subtracting the total balances from the total overdraft leaves \$1,584.78 the amount our school account is overdrawn.

BUDGET

The budget as presented here represents an increase of \$828 over the budget of last year. The increases are \$50 for Common Schools, \$250. for High School Tuition, \$475. for Repairs and Equipment, \$50. for High School Conveyance, and \$3. for Insurance. Next December the State expects to pay the State subsidy on a pro-rated basis, 96%, which means that we will not receive as much from the State next year as we did this.

CONCLUSION

Some of our needs for the coming year are new reading books in the Grammar room, new social studies books for the entire school, the other side of the school house roof needs to be shingled, the fire escapes should be replaced, the lighting system in both rooms should be greatly improved, the ceiling of the Grammar room should be insulated, the front steps should be replaced and the front doors should be repaired.

Some thought should be given to the problem of conveyance. At present we are covering much of the route twice. A larger vehicle would be able to convey the students in one trip and would also provide transportation for our high school students.

My appreciation to those whose help and cooperation have continued to make our schools a success.

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Health Officer's Report

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FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEB. 11, 1950

South Franklin County Tuberculosis and Health Association

To the citizens of Carthage, we submit the twenty-second annual report of this association, covering a period from January 1st, 1949 to January 1st, 1950.

This year we are selecting some phases of our program objectives, which appear to be little understood, that the community may understand what service is available. Through working committees, as your Mother's Club, under the professional guidance which we offer, you are able to have adequate service.

Program in School:

As a voluntary agency we offer our contribution in developing a sound health education program, and as an aid in securing maximum health for every child, within his limitations, and we propose;

"---- b. To aid the teaching staff, in an advisory capacity, in curriculum planning, and aid them in using home, community, and school experiences as procedures for developing attitudes, improving health behavior, and meeting life situations. c. — evaluate the scientific soundness of health material — from a public health point of view. d. To give school personnel impressions gained through home and community contacts — e. To secure information as to existing health and social resources available — h. To be sensitive to environmental conditions affecting the health of children and staff — n. To encourage teachers to make observations and measures — and note deviations from normal on the health card. o. To promote periodic medical examintions — r. To offer a scholarship in Health Education to a teacher —."

These are some of the reasons why we had 16 conferences with your teachers during the year. We have long felt the need of a better health record system and this year, with the approval of the Department of Education, devised a permanent record which we feel will be the means of better understanding of the child and will carry more information relating to the pupil and his environment. We hope Carthage will adopt this form.

We were promised the dental unit last fall but they were not able to keep the dentist. The standards for dentists working alone are very high and it is difficult to find one with that training to come to Maine and live on the road. For a year we have tried to make some permanent plan for flourine treatments within our towns. Again it is personnel. Your second and fifth grades will come under the Federal Demonstration in the Rumford area, which begins in April. In the meantime we will hope a dental hygienist will be found who can be depended on to do this regularly.

With the aid of Robert Smith, the Stickney Corner children were taken to Dr. Defoe's office for examinations, and part of the Berry Mills children have been done. We await the doctor's convenience to complete these.

In April we had a one day Health Education Institute in Wilton which your teachers attended. There were speakers on various health topics. We will again offer a scholarship of \$50. to a teacher attending the Health Education Workshop at U. of M.

Program for Individuals and Family Groups.

Changing emphasis in all social advancement is on the family as a unit and how their pattern may be adjusted to that of the community. No longer can a plan be made for an individual until some consideration is given to the home environment, family background, family finances, and how resourceful they may be in meeting their own health needs. There must be coordination between all organized activities and the home, and as our contribution;

"a. To be sensitive to the teaching value of all visits — b. — return visits only when need is urgent on a basis of physical, psychological or social problems. c. To make visits, on request, to help parents with their problems of child health supervision — or to those with special problems. d. To guide parents in selection of community resources for medical or social care — e. To interpret school health objectives to parents — g. To aid the physician by visiting all patients referred, to instruct patient or family in such measures as are necessary to carry out his orders."

It is here that we feel that we could be of service and yet we have so few calls. We made 14 follow up calls from school, one tuberculosis and 4 to younger children. Program for Groups and Community:

Again we say there is great benefit in sharing planning and action, and we offer our services by;

"a. To welcome opportunities to work through the health programs of other organizations, intergrating our program with that of the community as a whole. c. To cooperate with community agencies in disseminating health education — d. To assist with community projects for protecting and improving child health, and for improving and expanding community health facilities. f. To assist the health officer in his plan for prevention and control of communicable diseases — h. To promote xrays among groups —"

We have attended 48 meetings this year, 2 in Carthage. We assisted with 2 immunization clinics. By working with the Mother's Club you have had an excellent program. 40 innoculations of the diphtheria and whooping cough preventive, mostly booster doses of previous treatments, 83 of the triple-diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus preventive and 26 vaccinations were done at these clinics. We approve of the record which the club keeps of these immunizations.

If the preschool clinics could be held other than August, which is our vacation month, we could be of more assistance.

One patient came to the xray clinic in Wilton. We are still interested in xraying the whole county and this may come to pass.

There have been 14 interviews in behalf of the work this year.

Appreciation is extended to all who cooperated in the health pro-
