### AUDITOR'S REPORT

Gouldsboro, Me., Feb. 10, 1942.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gouldsboro:

In accordance with your request I have examined the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended February 10, 1942.

Submitted herewith is a comparative balance sheet which, to the best of my knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of the above date, subject, however, to a possible shrinkage in final settlement of unpaid taxes and deeds.

I am also submitting a summary of accounts and analysis of change in net town debt.

Cash: All cash as received appeared to be accounted for. The payments were made by checks from properly authorized warrants.

Taxes: The 1941 commitment was added, and after an adjustment of fifty cents, agreed with the charge to the collector. The commitment was accounted for by cash, authorized abatements or still uncollected. A list of the 1941 uncollected is shown in the tax collector's report; also the amounts of uncollected taxes of previous years.

General: The warrants authorized by the selectmen for payment were checked, and as far as could be determined all entries on the books of the selectmen were properly substantiated by subsidiary records on file.

With the exception of cash, no external verification was made of your assets or liability accounts.

A complete report of audit will be mailed to you within a few days.

#### POND ROAD

Project suspended on April 14, 1941, to permit transfer of crew to Strategic Highway project on Route U. S. No. 1.

When this project was suspended on April 14, 1941, all base gravel, ditching, shoulders and all culverts were completed. The work remaining to complete this project consisted of 12,000 lineal feet of surfacing, and fine grading of shoulders and ditches.

The project was reopened on December 23, 1941, and work was started on placing of surface gravel on the above 12,000 lineal feet of road, approximately 7,000 lineal feet of surface gravel has been placed as of this date leaving a balance of 5,000 lineal feet of surface gravel to place. This should be completed about March 1, as an average of 2,300 lineal feet has been placed each period since project reopened. There will be considerable cleaning up, and fine grading work to do when the weather conditions will permit this type of work.

Work on the Pond road started October 20, 1939, under

- O. P. 665-11-1-70. This project was superseded by the present project on October 1, 1940. The two projects operated a total of 19 months, and during that time the following work was accomplished.
- (1) 3.71 miles of shoulders constructed on both sides of road.
- (2) 3.71 miles of ditches constructed on both sides of road.
  - (3) 3.71 miles of sub-grade constructed.
- (4) 3.71 miles of base gravel 15 inches in depth and 21 feet wide, placed.
- (5) A large number of culverts were installed as the drainage of the road was a major item of work.

The completion of the Pond road should be accomplished as soon as the weather permits.

# SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report on the condition and progress of your schools. This is a pleasant task, since so much can be said that is favorable.

First of all, you are fortunate in good teaching. The teachers employed by you compare very well with the best in the field. They are adequately trained, have a wealth of experience, and, best of all, have a sincere interest in each individual child. Yes, you are favored, so much so, that any one of them could go elsewhere and command a much higher salary. For personal reasons they prefer to remain here, their worth in no way diminished. The school committee, appreciative of the fitness of these teachers and aware of the serious teaching shortage that now exists, recommends that teacher salaries be increased at the annual town meeting. Your approval is solicited in the interest of a sound investment and the welfare of your own children.

I doubt if there can be found anywhere a rural school system which personifies pupil initiative and a "try hard" attitude as does your system of schools. It is my observation that a large majority of Gouldsboro boys and girls act as though they are headed somewhere; perhaps down the highway of a career. At least, they are alert, highly competitive and fine school citizens.

The extra-curricular competitions covering many contests, initiated this year, were warmly received by all the pupils in grades 6-7-8. Local contests paved the way for competition with other pupils in this school district. These activities have done much to stimulate interest in school work in general and individual achievement in particular. The following contests are scheduled for this year—more will be added next year: Spelling, oral reading, 1-act play, mental arithmetic, penmanship, essay and letter writing.

The introduction of a cumulative personal record system is doing much to emphasize this business of getting ready for an opportunity when it comes. The teacher begins to collect

information in the sub-primary grade on such factors as school grades, personality traits, formal test scores, etc. This data is passed along each year from grade to grade and from school to school. The pupil becomes more and more conscious of his own personal record as time goes on, and knows as well that it will be useful to him in time in the form of references and the like when he is ready to apply for a job or makes application to enter some institution of higher learning or trade training.

An increase in the equalization allotment from the State Department of Education has made possible the much desired lengthening of the school year and the purchase of dditional text-books and supplies. From now on the schol year will consist of 36 weeks instead of the usual 32 weeks. The 36-week year is mandatory under the equalization law. New text-books will be provided in reading, health and safety, science, language and literature. Some of these are already in use. The rest are on order and will be paid for out of the unexpended equalization fund as soon as the delayed invoices are received.

In closing, I wish to express appreciation to Mr. Calvin Stinson for the many occasions on which he has donated the services of a truck to convey pupils to various school events, particularly those on field day. The school committee, with Mr. Grover Smith as chairman, has given freely of its time and energy. Meeting in regular session once each month throughout the year over a period of time has enabled them to acquire a grasp on school problems which is of immeasurable value to the town of Gouldsboro.

## **NURSE'S REPORT**

To the Citizens of Gouldsboro:

I hereby submit the report of the nursing service given your town for the year beginning January 1, 1941, and ending December 31, 1941.

During January, after the winter weighing of 136 pupils was completed, attention was turned to the Seven-Point program. Teachers were consulted regarding children now qualified, and classroom discussions were held so that each pupil would know what corrections were needed before he could be a Seven-Point pupil. The nurse offered to assist the families in any way she could to secure the corrections.

In March and April the nurse assisted with the cancer and early diagnosis campaigns. Pamphlets on the subjects were placed in libraries, schools and stores. Each home represented at school received a set of early diagnosis pamphlets. Posters were exhibited in schools and public places.

Ten school children were vaccinated against smallpox. This was offered free as a part of the school program. Arrangements were made and assistance given the doctor by the nurse. The audiometer, a device for testing hearing was used in all the schools to test the pupils above the third grade. Those failing to pass the test were retested. There were 69 children tested, and seven retested, with only one defect.

Gouldsboro, as usual, took a leading part in the School Health Day program on May 22, with 186 Seven-Point children—21 more than last year—marching in the health parade, headed by the Bar Harbor school band. They had one 100 per cent. Seven-Point room and three 50 per cent. Seven-Point rooms. Fourteen children qualified for the Five-Year Seven-Point certificates. The highest ranking pupil in the union to take the high school entrance test was from the Birch Harbor school, and received the cup at field day. Six of the essay prizes also went to the Flander's Bay section. Mr. Harry Edwards of the State Department of Education was guest speaker.

An invitation was given all mothers to bring their babies and pre-school children to Winter Harbor for the annual allday clinic on July 24. Dr. Haven, a summer resident from Gouldsboro Inn, was the examining doctor, assisted by the nurse. Miss Waters, from the State Department at Augusta, assisted the mothers with their food problems.

During the opening week of school in September, special inspection for skin infection and a sanitary inspection of the school buildings, as well as playground equipment, was completed. Annual inspection was completed in all the rooms during October. Notices were sent or home visits made to all parents where symptoms of defects were found, and a full report left with each teacher and the superintendent of schools. Routine visits and special classroom inspections have been made during the year and help given wherever needed.

Number of pupils inspected, 136. Defects found: Vision, 4; hearing, 1; glands, 5; throat, 11; scalp, 6; speech, 1; teeth, 59; orthopedic, 1. Corrections made: Throat, 4; teeth, 38.

During the year 482 instructive and investigation visits have been made to babies, pre-school children, pre-natal patients and tuberculosis contacts, as well as visits to give bedside care. Seven patients, adults, were taken to hospitals, doctors and clinics. Thirty-two school children have been taken to the dentist, oculist, and hospital, for corrective work. All tuberculosis contacts and suspects have had chest X-rays as advised and home supervision given by the nurse

The success of the program belongs to everyone who has helped during the year. Particularly, I thank the doctor, selectmen, members of the school board, superintendent of schools, teachers and parents.

I am enclosing tabulation of calls at the information booth at Franklin Roads from June 27 to August 22, inclusive. Besides the enclosed information, I also report:

- (1) The majority of those who stopped did so for route information only.
- (2) Through checking for one whole week and for shorter periods throughout the summer, I believe I secured a fairly accurate estimate that out-of-state traffic going east took No. 1, the shore route, in preference to No. 182. the Black's Woods road, at the ratio of five to two.
- (3) That most of those who took 182 did so without hesitation, and also found that several out-of-state maps routed them that way.
- (4) Three hundred thirty-five cars going east stopped at the booth for route information, and of this number, 264, or about 80 per cent., continued on No. 1.
- (5) The state, through Mr. Norbert Dowd of Bangor, showed much interest in the booth and supplied the booth with considerable literature.

To Horace J. Myrick, Constable of the Town of Gouldsboro, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Gouldsboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, West Gouldsboro, in said town, on March 2, 1942, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 20 To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable on the first day of May.
