SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Gouldsboro:

In spite of wartime conditions your own school program thus far continues to move ahead rather than backward. This progress now is slow to be sure, and perhaps mostly on the material side. The number one national home front problem, namely, juvenile delinquency, has not yet become of serious consequence locally. It is true your boys and girls seem more restless than usual, but for the most part they are staying on in school. However, there are signs on the horizon, and it will behoove us as parents and teachers to bring the home and school closer together for the well-being of your own children. In line with this point of view your school asks for your complete cooperation on the following points:

- 1. Do not permit your child to be absent from school even a single half day unless excused by the school authorities by reason of sickness or some unavoidable emergency. This is important.
- 2. Provide time and place for quiet home study, preferably in the evening, not not exceeding one-half hour for elementary pupils and at least one hour for high school students. Pupils who stay "in" nights as a rule do the best work in school.
- 2. Your child should not become accustomed to the idea of getting something for nothing. Kindly accept the teacher's judgment in the matter of rank and promotions. We would prefer not to grant "A" rank unless it is deserved; we feel it unwise to promote a pupil with credit who knowingly and intentionally shirks responsibilities as a member of his group by reason of continued unexcused absenteeism; flagrant disregard for the regulations of the school or because of persistent lazy work habits.
- 4. Perhaps the biggest challenge of the moment is the failure of too many pupils to work up to the limits of

their individual capacities. The school must and shall insist upon better work attitudes and we desperately need the full backing of every parent. Not only are the standards of school at stake but the value each boy puts on his own worth is hanging in the balance.

- 5. Do not talk over the real or imagined shortcomings of his teacher in front of your child. Too many children today do not know the meaning of respect and courtesy. If you intentionally or unintentionally fester ill will and disrespect on the part of your son for his teacher, the effect will be lasting. He will soon come to have no regard for any adult of the community, business man or neighbor, and this attitude may even eventually include his own parents.
- 6. If a situation develops at school which causes you concern, kindly consult the teacher first and as soon as possible. If the matter is not cleared up to your satisfaction permit the superintendent of schools to arrange for a meeting of yourself and the teacher, preferably at the school. If this is not convenient, then at your home. If you are still dissatisfied, request a school committee hearing at which time all panties concerned will be present. If then not satisfied, you may properly present your problem to your State Commissioner of Education, Augusta, Maine. At no time should you "air" your differences among your neighbors. Your child's faith in his school has real meaning. Please do not destroy it.
- 7. The old adage that you get what you pay for applies in a pertinent way to the value you place on your boy's education. It costs money to keep good teachers, provide text-books, workbooks, paper supplies, globes, maps, reference books, and other modern teaching devices. Support the requested appropriations thereby placing the same high value on your boy's training that his teacher does. We know what an adequate program costs and will not suggest more than the community can reasonably afford.

We, your son's teacher and I, believe, too, that he is worth the investment of a sound training and a thorough education; that he is one of the real assets of the community. Someday,

somehow, more opportunities must be provided these different sons and daughters as they advance along the highroad of their respective careers. Perhaps a town sponsored scholarship annually awarded to a deserving boy or girl upon graduation from high school might lead the way. Whatever the solution, many an eager young ambition is being frustrated each year for lack of opportunity to prove itself. Can you afford not to provide the helping hand?

NURSE'S REPORT

To the Citizens and Town Officers of Gouldsboro:

I submit the report of the Nursing Service given your town from January 1, 1943, to December 31, 1943.

In January, 137 pupils were weighed in all the schools. At this time the nurse conferred with pupils regarding corrections. Cooperation was offered to those who needed assistance in securing corrections. It was also pointed out that Seven-Point Certificates would be awarded to those who could qualify. The towns included in the Flanders Bay Nursing Service had 175 Seven-Point pupils. Of this number 86 were from Gouldsboro. There were 13 of our 17 rooms that received 50 per cent. dental certificates, and one that was 100 per cent. Seven Point. The 100 per cent. Seven-Point room went to Gouldsboro again this year, to the Corea school, and also six of the 50 per cent. Seven-Point rooms.

The Early Diagnosis Campaign for the prevention of tuberculosis, and the cancer prevention program were conducted during March and April. Each home, represented at school, received a set of Early Diagnosis pamphlets. Posters were exhibited at schools and in public places.

The nurse cooperated with the District Health Service for immunization against typhoid fever offered in the school program this year. Seventy-five school children, five adults and one pre-school child received immunization. Fifty-eight were Schick tested, and eleven vaccinated against smallpox.

The mothers of pre-school children were invited to the clinic at Winter Harbor in July. Dr. Constance Hamilton of Grindstone Inn was the examining doctor, the nurse assisting.

With the opening of schools in September, the first week was devoted to special inspection for skin infections and sanitary inspection of school buildings as well as play ground equpment.

Annual school inspection was completed in all schools during October. Notices of defects were sent to the homes and home visits made. A full report was left with each teacher and the superintendent of schools. Routine visits and special classroom inspections were made and help given the teachers in solving health problems wherever needed.

Health Service to Schools

Pupils inspected, 137. Defects: Vision, four; hearing, one; nasal passages, four; glands, fifteen; throats, seventeen; skin, two; teeth, sixty-six; posture, three; speech, one.

Corrections made since last inspection: Vision, six; throats, one; teeth, twenty-two.

During the year 373 home visits to, and in behalf of, patients to give instructions of bedside care have been made to prenatal patients, babies, pre-school and school children, tuber-culosis patients and contacts. Transportation to secure medical or dental care has been furnished to twenty-seven pre-school and school children and twenty-two adults.

In closing this report I extend thanks to all who helped with the success of the health program and especially for the cooperation of Dr. Lumley, the selectmen, members of the school board, superintendent of schools, teachers and parents.

To Horace J. Myrick, Constable of the Town of Gouldsboro, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Gouldsboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house, West Gouldsboro, in said town, on March 6, 1944, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear the report of town officers and commissioners and act thereon.
- 4 To see if the town will vote to instruct and authorize the selectmen to employ a Town Manager.
- 5 To choose three members of the board of selectmen and assessors for the ensuing year.

- 8 To see if the town will vote to elect one member as overseer of the poor and raise a sum of money for salary.
- 9 To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of the collector and treasurer.

- 10 To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 11 To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 12 To choose a member, or members, of the superintending school committee.
- 13 To choose constables for the town.
- 14 To choose fence viewers for the town.
- 15 To choose surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark.
- 16 To choose a fire ward, or wards, for the ensuing year.
- 17 To see if the town will vote to have the selectmen serve as road commissioners.
- 18 To see if the town will elect one or more road commissioners or authorize the selectmen to appoint the road commissioner or commissioners.
- 19 To choose a budget committee for the ensuing year.
- 20 To choose all other necessary town officers.
- 21 To see if the town will vote that poll taxes shall be due and payable on the first day of May.
- 22 To see if the town will vote when all taxes shall be due and payable.
- 23 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make a temporary loan, or loans, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$12,000, in anticipation of and to be paid out of current taxes for the municipal year of 1944.
- To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds, not exceeding \$17,000, for the purpose of renewing, refunding or paying the certain indebtedness of the town, due during the municipal year 1944, to wit:

- To see if the town will vote to rescind article No. 24 of their 1942 meeting. The said article reading as follows: To see if the town will vote to have the street lights turned off for the duration of the present national emergency.
- 26 To see if the town will vote to have street lights for the ensuing year.
- 27 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the following accounts, to wit:

Administration. Fire Department. Civilian Defense. Street Lights. Health and Sanitation. Roads and Bridges. Third-Class Maintenance.

Snow Removal.

Cutting Bushes. Support of Poor.

Aid to Dependent Children.

Soldiers' Aid.

Schools.

- 28 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay its part of the State patrol and 50-50 maintenance.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for repair of State-aid highways, not under State patrol.
- 30 To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

- 31 To see if the town will vote to have the selectmen lay out and accept the road from the present town road to the F. H. Snow Canning Co. plant at South Gouldsboro.
