Report of Superintendent of Schools

1 -

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the town of Rome:

I hereby present my first annual report of the financial and scholastic standing of the schools.

It is a matter of universal knowledge that the economic conditions existing during the past year have brought difficulties to every enterprize, and, needless to say, the schools have been no exception to the general statement. Viewed from the financial end, it has been a difficult year for the schools. Reductions in the budget have necessarily brought curtailments in the school activities. We have been obliged to work with fewer materials and text-books; the fiscal year has been shortened; and of course the school year must be shortened by two or even four weeks if funds are not available to permit the standard year of thirty-six weeks. This would be one of the most serious handicaps which could be placed on your schools. Unquestionably the amount of work demanded of them, an amount based on the thirty-six week standard, can not be completed in four weeks less time. Over a period of eight years, the extent of the elementary school grades, one complete year would be lost. This fact becomes serious when we consider that many of the pupils enter secondary schools, and that they are outclassed, frequently to the extent that they become discouraged and drop out if they do not have the background of a thorough elementary school training.

The Conveyance question has proved, throughout the past year, a source of considerable controversy. Your School Committee are agreed that small children should not be obliged to walk excessive distances, but if funds are not available they naturally hesitate to incur obligations which cannot be met. This should be borne in mind when the appropriations are made, and funds should be available for necessary conveyance.

We have included in this report, a statement of the distribution of the school dollar, which may be of interest. The expenditure for text-books and supplies as previously stated, has been insufficient to take care of the school needs. The best workmen fail to produce a satisfactory job if improperly equipped with tools. And so the best of teachers must be under a serious handicap when not provided with books and supplies.

The local Civil Works Project has been of great value to the schools. The buildings are now, or soon will be, in excellent condition. This means greater civic pride on the part of the pupil and teacher, and the effect is certain to be noticed in the general attitude.

We have not had the opportunity to compare the scholastic work of this term with that of past terms, but we are confident that it has been of a high grade.

The State law permits the entrance of pupils to the first grade at five years of age. Most parents seem anxious to have their children enter school as early as possible in order that they may keep up with other children of the same age. In a large percentage of cases, children who enter at this age find difficulty before they reach the middle grades. Much of this difficulty could be avoided if the children did not enter until six years of age. The percentage of failures in the grades would unquestionably be smaller if the mental and physical development of the child could be increased by one year in each grade. In our opinion, a Sub-Primary grade for the beginners, teaching only the very foundation work of the first grade, would be a very valuable addition to the school system, and would bring no added expense.

In closing this report I would take the opportunity to thank the School Committee for their interest and coöperation. I would also extend to the teachers my thanks for their loyalty and their sincere efforts. And to each and every citizen I would express my appreciation of their coöperation in making the work of the past term a success.
