THE WARRANT.

To Peter H. Monroe, a Constable of the Town of Searsport, in the County of Waldo,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Searsport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday the 10th day of March, next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting,
- 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the town will accept the report of the Selectmen and Assessors as printed.
- 4. To see if the town will accept the report of the Auditor of Town Accounts as printed.
- 5. To see if the town will accept the report of the Superintendent of Schools as printed.
- 6. To choose three or more Selectmen.
- 7. To choose Assessors of Taxes.
- 8. To choose Overseers of the Poor,
- 9. To choose a Town Agent.
- 10, To choose a Town Treasurer.
- 11. To choose an Auditor of Town Accounts,
- 12. To choose Constables,
- 13. To choose a Road Commissioner, and to see what compensation he shall be allowed; or to choose Highway Surveyors.
- 14. To choose surveyors of Sawed Lumber.
- 15. To choose Surveyors of Wood and Bark.
- 16. To choose Surveyors of Spars and Timber.
- 17. To choose Fire Wards,
- 18. To choose Fence Viewers.
- 19. To choose a Pound Keeper.
- 20. To choose Sealers of Weights and Measures.
- 21. To choose Sealers of Leather.
- 22. To choose Viewers and Cullers of Hoops and Staves.
- 23. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Town Clerk and Town Treasurer.

- 24 To see if the town will continue the Free High School, and how much money it will raise therefor.
- 25 To see how much money the town will raise for the support of schools.
- 26 To see how much money the town will raise for text-books for town schools.
- 27 To see how much money the town will raise to repair school houses.
- 28 To choose a member of the School Committee to serve 3 years.
- 29 To choose a Superintendent of Schools,
- 30 To choose a Truant Officer.
- 31 To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor and other town expenses.
- 32 To see how much the town will raise to repair highways and bridges, and whether in labor or money; and if in labor, how much per hour for men, oxen and horses.
- 33 To see how much money the town will raise to repair side walks.
- 34 To see how much money the town will raise to pay for road breaking the past winter.
- 35 To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to pay no bills against the town to people who owe the town for taxes.
- 36 To see how much money the town will raise to buy books for the Sears Library,
- 37 To see if the town will vote to raise \$50 for a Memorial service.
- 38 To hear the report of the Fire Department.
- 39 To see if the town will vote to pay members of Phineas Pendleton Engine Company and Fire Wards \$3 each, not to exceed sixty-three members; said money being payable to the Clerk of the Engine Company in a gross sum on or before Jan. 1, 1903.
- 40 To see what discount the town will allow to those who pay their taxes on or before the first day of July next, and how much to those who pay on or before the first day of Jan. 1903.
- 41 To see how much discount the town will allow those who pay their highway taxes on or before the first day of June next, in cash to the Highway Surveyors or Town Treasurer.
- 42 To see how much money the town will raise to pay discount on taxes.
- 43 To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- 44 To see if the town will vote to raise \$50 to pay indebtedness of Union Hall to the estate of John H. Lane.
- To see if the town will vote to avail itself of the offer of the State, and expend a certain sum, not to exceed \$200, for permanently improving some definite section of the highways, and how much it will raise therefor.
- 46 To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen, or such a Committee as it may choose, to purchase an alms house, or build

an addition to the Pest house, to accommodate the town's poor, and how much money it will raise therefor.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at their office on Saturday the 8th day of March next, at one o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, OF THE TOWN OF SEARSPORT, For the year ending, March, 1902.

To the Inhabitants of Searsport:

I herewith submit a report of the public schools of Searsport for the past year.

Statistics of the financial expenditures for transportation, fuel, janitor services, repairs, text books and school supplies will be found in another part of this town report.

I have made eighty-one visits to the schools; made up an enumeration and enrollment of pupils of the legal age to draw school money; made all statistical returns to the State Superintendent of Public Schools for the common and high schools; secured transportation of pupils to such schools as have been ordered by your Superintending School Committee and attended to the purchase and distribution of text books for the several schools.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The Spring term was under the instruction of Mr. Milton P. Dutton who had charge of the school the preceding year.

Mr. Dutton is a fine scholar, a courteous and agreeable gentleman, as well as a good instructor.

At the close of the term a class of six were graduated; they showed careful training and preparation and reflected great credit upon teacher, parents and scholars.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES.

During the Summer vacation the School Committee decided that it would be advisable to add another year to the Course of Study for the High School; the change to go into effect at the beginning of the school year in September. By this arrangement scholars will be prepared for either an academical or college course.

The Fall Term was taught by Prof. A. L. Dennison who came to the Committee with the very highest recommendations.

Prof. Dennison was a graduate of Bowdoin College and had been largely engaged in academical work, also in fitting scholars for college.

He labored hard to make his school a success and those who tried to learn did well in their recitations.

The Winter Term was taught by Mr. Irving F. Burton, a graduate of Colby College and a thorough scholar and disciplinarian.

Mr. Burton took the school under difficult circumstances, but by his firmness and good judgment succeeded in winning the respect and obedience of his pupils.

In the several visits which I made to the school I noticed with pleasure the fact that the scholars were not only learning to apply themselves to their studies, but to recite in a clearer and more decided tone of voice. I would earnestly suggest that Mr. Burton's services be retained the coming year.

Grammar School—Miss Fastnet Erskine, teacher. Miss Erskine has taught this school for several terms with good success. She carries to the school-room a refined, agreeable manner, which does much toward making the routine of school-work a pleasure to her pupils. As her school has been small in numbers she has, during the entire year, heard two classes from the High School recite each day, for which she deserves the sincere thanks of your School Committee and Superintendent.

Intermediate School—Mrs. Orrie E. Randell, teacher. Mrs. Randell is a teacher of experience and one whose zeal and interest in behalf of those she teaches can not be surpassed. She had quite a large and somewhat difficult school, yet when I visited it I always found the most perfect order and the scholars ready to answer any questions that might be asked in their line of study. It would be interesting to the parents, if they would visit this school, and hear the children recite, especially in history and geography, as the amount of information which they possess on these subjects is surprising. It was a pleasure to listen to them.

Primary School—Miss Katherine Kneeland, teacher. This school registers a large number of pupils, and all of an age that requires a great amount of tact and discretion in their teacher. As Miss Kneeland possesses both of these qualifications, it is, perhaps, needless to say that her school is highly successful.

The scholars seem to love and respect their teacher, and it is interesting to watch their bright earnest faces as they do their work with surprising accuracy.

No. 1. Harbor—Miss Eva Griffin, teacher. This was Miss Griffin's first experience in teaching, but she seems to possess all the attributes of a teacher; and. I believe that she is likely to rank among our very best teachers, should she decide to follow teaching as an occupation,

I was extremely pleased with the appearance of thi school and with the progress which the pupils made in their studies. Both teacher and pupils deserve a good report.

No. 7. Porter—Mrs. Mabel Matthews, teacher. Mrs. Matthews did excellent work in this school. She met the same difficulty which so many teachers find in the ungraded schools, that of hearing a large number of recitations in a short space of time; but she readily grasped the situation, planned to have each scholar think and work for himself and so saved much valuable time. I could see that the scholars improved under instruction.

No. 8—Matthews. Mrs. Abbie M. Nickels, teacher. Mrs. Nickels has taught this school in previous years and her ability and success as an instructor have long been established.

The scholars, too, seemed to understand the object for which they attended school, and tried to improve their time. The work done in this school was thorough and satsfactory.

No. 9—No. Searsport. Miss Addie B. Crockett, teacher. My visits to this school have been one of the chief pleasures of my work in the schools during the past two years.

The pupils are gentlemanly and lady-like in manner and strive to make the most of the advantages offered to them for obtaining an education.

In addition to the more common branches taught in this school, there have been classes in Geometry, Rhetoric, Algebra and Book-Keeping, in all of which the recitations compared favorably with those in the High School.

The younger pupils also did well in their work. This school merits a good report.

TEXT BOOKS.

The added year to the course of study in the High School necessitated the purchase of a large supply of new text-books, which are very expensive. I have endeavored to select the books best suited to the needs of the school and to secure the lowest possible rates.

The chief difficulty in this text-book system seems to be that the scholars are not as careful of the books as though they were their

own; they seem to think the books are entirely without cost to any one. The schools are at present well supplied and quite a large number of books on hand.

TRANSPORTATION.

The matter of transportation has been a difficult one to solve. The number of pupils to whom transportation must be furnished is large, and the distance to be traveled in most cases is so great that the expense absorbs a large part of the school money. I think some other arrangement will have to be made in the near future.

REPAIRS.

The Committee have, I think, looked carefully after the various school buildings, and made such repairs as they thought necessary and in accordance with the sum appropriated.

The janitors which they have employed have done their work thoroughly, and deserve special mention.

The school house at No. 8, Matthews, will need repairs the coming year. The sills are rotten and the floor has settled very badly. Several other repairs are necessary, and a new desk for the teacher is an absolute necessity.

APPROPRIATIONS.

I would recommend the following appropriations: For Common Schools, \$1,400; for Free High School, \$300; for Text-Books, \$200; for repairs, \$200.
