#### COUNTY OF FRANKLIN, ss.

To Albert Jamison, a constable in the Town of Carthage in said County, Greetings:

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to leave the care of all roads in the hands of the Selectmen.

There was a complaint brought to me about a sewer, which was taken care of, in a nice manner.

I hope next year there will be more cooperation by the Townspeople with your Health Officer in reporting diseases to me.

### Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Services

#### **IN CARTHAGE IN THE YEAR 1968**

Medical research and changing social and economic patterns are bringing rapid and ever-broadening changes to the field of Public Health. The concept of the right of each individual to "optimal health" is now generally accepted and new resources and programs are constantly being developed to aid in the progress toward this goal.

Your public health nurse, a member of the Division of Public Health Nursing, made many nursing visits to and in behalf of patients and their families. All available resources and programs, new and old, local and state wide were used in working toward correction of defects, treatment of disease, rehabilitation and return of the patient and his family to self care and independence.

In the school health program, 15 students and school personnel received a Tuberculin skin test. This program has been expanded this year in an effort to offer testing and recommended follow-up care to the subprimary, seventh, twelfth grades and to all school personnel desiring it.

Many clinics were held in the schools this past year in an effort to raise a low immunization level and to give protection to many school enterers who had no previous immunizations. This large percentage of unimmunized school enterers would, perhaps, point up a need for community clinics for the preschool child. The following immunizations were completed, in series if necessary: Diphtheria and Tetanus, 11; Poliomyelitis, 11; and Smallpox, 4.

Vision and hearing checks were done throughout the year as requested by school personnel. Many home visits, needed referrals and conferences with school personnel were made in behalf of individual students.

Appreciation is expressed to all individuals and groups whose interest and efforts made an expanded Public Health Program possible.

### Franklin County Soil Conservation District

#### 78 Main Street

#### Farmington, Maine

January 14, 1969

At present the District has two Soil Scientists doing soils mapping in Franklin County. To date the towns of New Sharon, Jay and the built-up and open areas of Kingfield have been soil mapped. The town of Farmington was about 1/3 completed this past season. This soils mapping is done by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. It is a part of the National Soil Survey. The District Board of Supervisors assigns priorities for this work based on needs requests. Soils interpretation and suitability information is very valuable to land use planners such as community and town planning boards, local organizations and individuals.

In addition the District makes available professional Soil & Water Conservationists, Foresters and Biologists to assist District Cooperators in land resource planning, and establishment, of soil and water conservation practices. This includes technical help on working up plans, engineering surveys, designs, cost estimates etc. consultive services along these lines is also available.

The District, as you know, is an agency of the State. It is charged with carrying out a Program of Soil, Water and Land resources conservation within its Boundaries. The services of the District are available to all land owners and users.

New aerial photography was flown in 1965 and 1966. This photo flight covers the entire county. One set of these maps is on hand at the District office. This flight is owned by the Soil Conservation Service. The individual towns have been purchasing aerial photos for their own use. The coverage for the average size township costs from \$50-\$75.00. Information on how to order these maps is available at the District office.

Moneys donated to the District by the towns is used to help defray clerical expenses, purchase stationery and other clerical needs etc. Also, the District is assisting towns and communities by interpreting the Soil Survey information into complete sets of Soil Suitability maps on some 33 different land uses. These are under the major headings of Urban-Industrial, Agriculture, Forestry, Wildlife and Recreation. This information is very valuable for community planning boards, organizations and individuals. Town moneys are used in the preparation of these suitability maps also.

#### **ANNUAL REPORT FOR TOWN REPORTS 1969**

We wish to thank the towns who have demonstrated their confidence in the Counseling Service at Town Meetings. To this list of friends we add the G. H. Bass & Co., the International Paper Company, the Forster Foundation, the Wilton Congregational Church Women's Fellowship, the North Jay United Methodist Church, the Wilton United Methodist Church, St. Mary's Guild, the Skowhegan Women's Club and those private individuals who have sent generous contributions. We hope to merit your continued support.

Our Seminars with Dr. Leitman continue to be well attended and we have received commendations from our area professional personnel on their usefulness. We intend to maintain this service.

We are also pleased to report an increased number of multiagency conferences on multi-problem clients in an effort to coordinate and streamline services.

Our "new look" as seen on the letterheads is one result of our computerized world! The incorporated name remains, of course – but in order to fit into the computers and also in order to fit in with our Core and Sister Satellite, whose agency names both include Mental Health – we will be known as "Franklin Area Mental Health" henceforth, offering counseling and mental health services in our area.

We are happy to report that Dr. Reuben Leitman is now our Medical Director and we have his services all through the year. The monthly Psychiatric Clinic at the Franklin County Memorial Hospital is expected to relieve clients from Northern areas.

In order to facilitate psychiatric consultation for families in our southern-most towns, we have arranged to utilize Murray Hall in Livermore Falls for a monthly psychiatric clinic. We would like to express our thanks to the International Paper Company for making the conference room at Murray Hall available to us for this extra time.

Rev. Russell M. Chase, Chairman of our Board of Directors, and Dr. Reuben Leitman met in his Portland office with Robert Cash, Coordinator, Medicare Health Insurance to clarify our eligibility under Medicare. This followed a meeting in Augusta with Dr. Niles Perkins, Director Bureau of Medical Care (Health & Welfare) and John Fickett, Medical Social Administrator, which discussed Medicaid. A central requirement is that all cases under these programs must be directly under qualified psychiatric control — that diagnosis and treatment must take place under direct medical supervision. The Bureau will send review teams to the mental health agencies for specific check on psychiatric supervision. Interest was expressed by the Franklin Area Mental Health Board of Directors. It is with pleasure and pride that we announce that we are now a qualified agency under Medicaid and that we can offer the benefits of Medicare to eligible clients.

Dr. William Schumacher, Director of Mental Health, joined us at the Franklin County Memorial Hospital for a special meeting. Dr. Schumacher expressed hopefulness for the future of the Franklin Area Service. He praised the citizenry of this area for its support of "one of the oldest community mental health agencies in Maine" and discussed in detail financial resources available to our Service. Dr. Schumacher assured us that the State hopes to be able to increase our Community Grant-In-Aid Funds and bring them up to at least the 50% mark and even hold out hope of additional funds in the near future. We hope Dr. Schumacher's plans can be translated into concrete financial support.

We have attended professional meetings during the year and have brought material back to our Service which included more practical help for the families of the retarded; more practical help for the future growth and funding of this agency with emphasis upon the need to bring better service to our member towns; and increased understanding of problems of addiction in our area.

The Board voted to send our application — which your Director-Psychologist had prepared — to the Comprehensive Mental Health Center at Lewiston so that it can be integrated into an Application for Federal Funds for Area IV.

The application for a Federal Staffing Grant has been brought up to date. Rev. Chase and I have met with our Area Coordinator, Tom Kane, who reports that we appear to be on our way. We were pleased with the recommendations of the Subcommittee of the Area IV Mental Health Advisory Board – (Chaired by Clinton Conant, and attended by Rev. Chase, Stephen Myers, Jr. of the Wilton Times, Ross Fearon of the Farmington State College) – "that a permanent liaison committee between the Farmington State College Clinic and this service be established; that there be full-time staffing and that a Psychiatric Social Worker be added to our staff." These are among our goals.

As your psychologist scanned the statistical part of the customary monthly reports, the figures would seem to require further explanation. The number of clients and interviews was added without regard to group or individual status. (A group of 11 seen weekly might, in a given calendar month, appear as 11 (55). A client in individual therapy would add 1 (4) to the total.) This service has averaged 6 adults and 2 adolescent groups weekly, as well as several family groups. School classes are added during the School Year. It is only because of our intensive group programs that our totals are so high. Statistics on professional people should be understood in the light of our regular group seminars as well as of individual contacts. This seemed unnecessarily complex so we have changed our monthly statistical report. At present, we list the number of children seen, the number of adults seen for each town, as well as the number of interviews with other town citizens. It is only in the Annual Report that we will continue to send each town both the numbers of individuals seen and the total number of interviews.

During the fiscal year of July 1, 1967 to June 30, 1968, in the town of Carthage, 19 clients were seen for 111 interviews by Dr. Leitman or your psychologist.

We wish to thank the agencies, industries, and individuals who have cooperated with us so heartily. We hope to have the opportunity to serve you better in the future.
