Fo Lee G. Hutchinson, a Constable in the Town of Carthage in said County.

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Town on the 5th day of March, A. D. 1951, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Article 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Reports of the Municipal Officers for the year ending February 10, 1951.
- Article 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of the Common Schools, including Tuition, School Office Expenses, High School Tuition, and Interest on School Funds, including Superintendent of Schools, Insurance and School House Repairs, Textbooks, Supplies and High School Conveyance.
- Article 6. To see what the Town will do with money received for the use of the Town Truck and Plow.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise \$1,000. and Interest of \$100.00 to pay on the Town Truck and Snow Plow for the year 1951.

- Article 8. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the repair of the Summer Roads and Bridges.
- Article 9. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the State Aid Road Construction, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and under the provisions of Section 25 & 29, Chap. 20 R. S. 1944 as amended.
- Article 10. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying Bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section L. 1935.
- Article 11. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Road Tools.
- Article 12. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of Plowing and Sanding Winter Roads on Routes 2, 142, State Aid No. 3 and 4.
- Article 13. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Winter Roads.
- Article 14. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for care of Poor.
- Article 15. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of the South Franklin County Tuberculosis and Health association.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$20.00, being dues for the Maine Municipal Association.
- Article 17. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Discount on Taxes.
- Article 18. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Over Drawn Accounts.
- Article 19. To see what the Town will appropriate and raise for Abatements.

Article 20. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Current Expenses.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, to hire sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town Charges and Town Debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes and to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the Town so borrowed to an amount not to exceed in the aggregate the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year, as temporary loans.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the S.S. Committee to arrange the place and number of Schools for the ensuing year to the best interests of the Town.

Article 23. To see what sum, if any the Town will vote to raise for advertising our Natural Resources, Advantages and Attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 80, S. 95, R. S. 1930, said sum to be expended under direction of the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

Article 24. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

Article 25. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the necessary Bonds for Town Officers.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town, for non-payment of Taxes thereon, on such terms—as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such Property.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Pine Blister Rust, in accordance with the R.S.C.H. 32, Sec. 54.

Article 28. To see what rate per cent, and final date to be allowed on Discount of Taxes on the 1951 Commitment, Poll Taxes excepted.

Article 29. To see what sum, if any, the Town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of hiring a Doctor to inspect the Carthage School Children.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sell and assign unmatured Tax Mortgage Liens for the amount unpaid and Interest and Cost.

Article 31. To see if the Town will fix a date when the Taxes shall be due and payable.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to pay and refund its indebtedness to the Rumford Falls Trust Co. by authorizing the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the Town to the amount of said notes to be determined by the Selectmen.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest beginning December the first, next, on all Taxes remaining unpaid.

Article 34. To see what sum of money the Town of Carthage will appropriate and raise for the Fire Protection and apportion the same between Berry Mills and South Carthage.

Article 35. (A)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.) Dollars to pay to the Rumford Bank and Trust Company the notes given by the Town to said Rumford Bank and Trust Company dated April 17, 1950 for (\$2,000.) and Interest Dollars, note dated June 3, 1950 for (\$2,000.) and Interest Dollars, note dated August 17, 1950 for (\$2,000.) and Interest Dollars, and to see how the same shall be raised.

(C)

Moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.) Dollars to pay the Rumford Bank and Trust Company its notes given by the Town to said Rumford Bank and Trust Company, as follows:

Note dated April 17, 1950 for Two Thousand (\$2,000.) Dollars Note dated June 3, 1950 for Two Thousand (\$2,000.) Dollars Note dated August 17, 1950 for Two Thousand (\$2,000.) Dollars (With Interest) and the same be raised by giving a series of notes to said Rumford Bank and Trust Company, and the Selectmen and Treasurer of the Town be authorized to issue those series of notes.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a Budget Committee consisting of five Citizens of the Town.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Deed of the Land for the South Carthage Fire Department House.

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to use a part of the Summer Road money, for permanent covering for some portion of the Town Road.

Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain sum from the Estate of Ada Murch Smith, the Interest from which amount shall be used for the Maintenance, Care and Upkeep of her Lot in Newman Cemetery.

Article 40.

(A)To see if the Town will vote to Plow All drive-ways or No driveways.

- (B) To see if the Town will vote to push or tow all Cars and Trucks, or none.
- (C) To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen do all bookkeeping and clerical work at the Town Office.
- (D) To see if the Town will vote to have printed in the Town Reports all Receipts and Disbursements, also a true list of each and every Tax-payers Account.

Article 41. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for the purpose of participating in the Area Dental Hygiene Program, for the School Children and how money for same shall be raised.

Article 42. To see if the Town will raise \$100.00, for the benefit of the Rumford Community Hospital.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Town, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, on said day of said meeting, for revising and correcting the list of voters.

To supplement our teaching staff we have the service of a music teacher and supervisor, Doris Grieve, for the first time this year. One of the above students has left school and two will graduate next June. We anticipate that next fall we will have approximately nineteen in High School. This will make our high school tuition for the next fiscal year about \$2,400.00. Our high school students are doing commendable scholastic work and deserve praise for their determination to succeed in high school.

REPAIRS

Last summer we put an insulation cap over the upper room at Berry Mills, replaced the front steps, refinished some of the desk tops and bought material for a new fire escape. At the Stickney Corner School the chimney was torn down and rebuilt.

The School Committee has recommended for this coming year that we replace the shingles on the other side of the roof at Berry Mills, paint the classrooms at both schools and replace some of the double seats.

FINANCES

When the books closed on February 10th, all the school bills were in and paid. In examining the financial accounts it will be noted that there is a balance in Repairs and Equipment of \$26.71 and in Insurance of \$1.16. There are overdrafts in Common Schools of \$46.63, High School Conveyance, \$56.00; Superintendence, \$13.50 and Office Expenses, \$13.28. Subtracting the total balance of \$27.87 from the total overdraft of \$129.41 leaves \$101.54, the amount our school account is overdrawn.

BUDGET

The budget presented here shows an increase of \$774.90 over the budget of last year. The increases are to take care of the commitments already made and the anticipated costs of High School Tuition for another year. We can anticipate receiving approximately the same subsidy from the State next year as we did this.

The budget as prepared by the Superintending School Committee is presented here for your consideration.

At the completion of the repairs that we anticipate making next summer our Berry Mills Schoolhouse will be in fairly good condition. If school is to be kept many more years at Stickney Corner some thought should be given to major renovations or rebuilding of the school building.

To the school committee, Selectmen and citizens of the town, I wish to express my appreciation for their cooperation.

Music Supervisor's Report

I hereby submit my first annual report as Music Supervisor for the Carthage schools.

Our music program has three aims:

- 1. To make music a part of the curriculum with a period scheduled for music daily.
 - 2. To provide every child with an opportunity to sing, and
 - 3. To cultivate a taste for good music through listening.

In the primary room, we spend several minutes of each music period in individual work training the non-singers to match tones and eventually to sing. We sing familiar songs and learn many new songs chosen for these grades specifically. There are no books in this room for the use of the children. Listening just for the joy of listening and listening and responding to the rhythm whether by rhythm instruments or bodily movement is a very important part of our program.

In the grammar room, we purchased "The New American Song-Book," a community song book, to supplement the few copies of the Music Hour Book which we have. Here we do little individual work but sing a greater part of the time. Little emphasis is placed on reading music. Listening is an important part of the program in this room, also.

Once a month, I spend a half day at the Stickney Corner School. Mrs. Weld does a fine job of carrying out a regular music program for the balance of the time. We spend some time learning the fundamentals of music but most of the time singing old and new songs and listening to records.

Both schools presented Christmas programs which were well-attended and very well done. Mrs. Weld, Mrs. Stone and Mrs. Swett have done a fine job.

We have very recently purchased a piano for the Carthage grammar room and are eagerly looking forward to having it for daily use in our music periods.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank the School Committee, and teachers and parents for their splendid cooperation—this makes my work a genuine pleasure.

South Franklin County Tuberculosis and Health Association

The twenty-third annual report of this association is hereby submitted to the citizens of the town of Carthage, covering a period from January 1, 1950 to January 1, 1951.

Facing the uncertainty of war times again within such a short time is indeed trying, but it is here, and face it we must. We are again talking civilian defense and probably each one is wondering what they can do. We are told, over and over, that the one thing we can all do is to keep our own physical, emotional and spiritual selves in the best possible state. The balanced diet, the well ordered routine of rest, exercise and regular hours, accepting our limitations, and to be at peace with God and our fellow men is the best possible defense we, individually, can offer.

The next step is community planning, that is, facing things together. We may have thought that while working on committees we were merely serving others. Now we are told it is a kind of insurance for good mental health. Through group activity we learn to change our ideas, develop new ways of behaving and new interests in life. We achieve emotional maturity by learning to work with others and gain knowledge that one cannot live for one's self alone. There will be many opportunities ahead for everyone to participate in some group activity.

The White House Conference on Children and Youth held in Washington in December, had accepted as its purpose the consideration of "how we can develop in children the mental, emotional and spiritual qualities that make for happy childhood and responsible citizenship, and what physical, economic and social conditions are deemed necessary to this development."

Studies will be made of how groups work alone and cooperatively. The family is recognized as a basic unit and heads the list of institutions to be studied. Health has been placed first in human needs because it is fundamental to other needs. Possessing it we are able to increase production, maintain a high standard of living, and develop individual and family happiness and contentment.

Children are naturally better cared for when their parents take the major responsibility for their health. This does not mean lessening of the service of social agencies, but emphasis on teaching the family rather than giving individual assistance. The health problems of the child reflect the family problems, and give a general all over view of the status of community health. We have no staff to survey community needs, but a visit to school and conference with teachers reveals many deficiencies in our community and family life. How groups work individually and cooperatively to improve these conditions is interesting. One instance is your Mother's Club. Other groups with more ulterior motives could well start here and work towards a general purpose of community betterment.

Emphasis in our health program varies from year to year as conditions vary. The cut in our appropriation from \$125 to \$50 presented a problem. We wanted to continue the most essential things. Dr. Defoe completed the examinations at Berry's Mills school. We tuberculin tested the lower grades there. There were no reactors this time. The Division of Dental Health had a dentist for a few weeks, and as you were on the list it could have been managed, but there was lack of interest.

Nine visits were made to crippled children and the polio cases referred to clinics. Why Carthage has polio and not Weld is a mystery. However, you had diphtheria and scarlet fever through contacts made in Oxford County, and this may explain polio. Sixteen other visits were made to children, 14 conferences with teachers, and six interviews for miscellaneous reasons.

Our health histories have not always been complete and to remedy this we have prepared a booklet which we hope you will record faithfully through the pre-school years, so when we ask for information you can give it to us. You, too, may find it useful.

We again offered a scholarship in Health Education at the Workshop held at the U. of M. last summer. This teacher reports a most profitable session.

The date for the X-ray survey will probably be sometime this summer. We hope everyone over 15 will take advantage of the opportunity to have a free chest X-ray. Many of you will be asked to serve on committees arranging these.

Of the over 30 meetings attended by your worker this year, the two most profitable were the New England Conference on Rural Life and Education at Gorham Teachers College, and the Board Members' meeting at Portland. More people from our small towns should attend these. The cost is not great, and many were delegates from Farm Bureaus, PTA, Granges, school committees, etc.

In closing, the Executive Committee wish to thank the individuals and organizations for their cooperation and interest in the health work of their community.
