STATE OF MAINE

To Lee G. Hutchinson, a Constable in the Town of Carthage in said County,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Town on the 2nd day of March, A. D. 1953, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to elect all Town Officers by nominations from the floor.
 - Article 3. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Reports of the Municipal Officers for the year ending February 6, 1953.
- Article 5. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of Common Schools, including Tuition, School Office Expense, High School Tuition, Interest on School Funds, including Superintendent of Schools, Insurance and School House Repairs, Textbooks, Supplies and High School Conveyance.

Recommended \$7,144.77

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to close the Stickney Corner School for the School year of 1953 and 1954.

Article 8. To see what sum if any, the Town will vote to appropriate and raise toward the installation of a Water System and Flush Toilets at the Berry Mills Grammar School.

Recommended \$500.00

Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise \$500.00, the note and interest of \$80.00 to pay on the School Bus.

Article 10. To see what the Town will vote to do with money received for the use of the Town Truck and Plow.

Article 11. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the Repair of Summer Roads and Bridges.

Recommended \$600.00

Article 12. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944 as amended.

Recommended \$600.00

Article 13. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the Joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying Bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section L., 1935.

Article 14. To see what sum the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for Road Tools.

Recommended None

Article 15. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of Plowing and Sanding Winter Roads on Routes 2, 142 State Aid No. 3 and 4.

Recommended \$475.00

Article 16. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Winter Roads.

Recommended \$350.00

Article 17. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for care of the Poor.

Recommended None

Article 18. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of the South Franklin County Tuberculosis and Health Association.

Recommended \$125.00

Article 19. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$20.00, being dues in the Maine Municipal Association.

Recommended \$20.00

Article 20. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Discount on Taxes.

Recommended \$275.00

Article 21. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Over Drawn Accounts.

Recommended \$3,059.93

Article 22. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Abatements.

Recommended None

Article 23. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for Current Expenses.

Recommended \$1,600.00 To be taken from Surplus

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to hire sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town Charges and Town Debts, in anticipation of the collection of Taxes and to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the Town so borrowed to an amount not to exceed in the aggregate the total tax levy of the preceding municipal year, as temporary loans.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee to arrange the place and number of Schools for the ensuing year to the best interest of the Town.

Article 26. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to appropriate and raise for a parcel of land to be used for a Town Dump, to keep rubbish out of the river.

Article 27. To see whether or not the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the Natural Resources, Advantages and Attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, R. S., 1930.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain sum from the Estate of Flora Maxwell, the Interest from which amount shall be used for the Maintenance, Care and Upkeep of three-quarters of her Lot in the Newman Cemetery.

Article 29. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

Article 30. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the necessary Bonds for the Town Officers.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town, for non-payment of Taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$300.00, to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in control of white pine blister rust, in accordance with R. S., Chapter 32, Sec. 54.

Article 33. To see what rate per cent, and final date to be allowed on Discount of Taxes on the 1953 Commitment, Poll Tax excepted.

Article 34. To see what sum, if any, the Town will appropriate and raise for Medical and Dental Services for Children, to be spent under the direction of the local Health Committee.

Recommended None

- Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sell and assign unmatured Tax Mortgage Liens for the amount unpaid and Interest and Cost.
- Artice 36. To see if the Town will fix a date when Taxes are due and payable.
- Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest beginning December the first, next, on all remaining unpaid Taxes.
- Article 38. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the Fire Department and apportion same between the Berry Mills Company and the South Carthage Company.

- Article 39. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a Budget Committee, consisting of five citizens of the Town.
- Article 40. To see if the Town will vote to have printed in the Town Reports a true list of every Tax-Payers account.
- Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the benefit of the Rumford Community Hospital.

Article 42. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for cutting bushes on Town Roads.

Report of Selectmen and Assessors

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Carthage:

"We believe every citizen in the community would be interested to know what the Town Officers have done in their line of duty and therefore we call attention to some of our principal activities during this past year."

An appointment with the State Highway Department was kept and as a result the Town received \$500.00 from the Betterment Fund, by adding this to the \$300.00, or one unit, which the Town raised, an improvement was made on State Aid Road.

Four calls have been made, for the Town to give help, upon careful investigation it was discovered that the parties involved were not eligible for help from us, due to not having established Paupers residence, hence, our Town and State Poor Accounts have been very low.

Our Auditor discovered that the State Welfare Department owed the Town of Carthage \$159.42 on a 1948 and 1949 Poor Account, upon a suggestion from the Auditor that we inquire about this, we made a personal call and sent several communications with a check being received from our Treasurer for the above amount.

When it came time to meet bills on the State Aid Road construction, the sum of \$2,000.00 was needed, the usual procedure is to borrow amounts of this sort and pay 5% interest, upon consulting with one of our highest Tax payers, he felt it would be better business if he advanced this amount on his taxes thereby eliminating our paying interest.

Town owned property that has been sold is the Cora Barnett lot, the R. V. Martin lot, for what the Town had in them plus interest and costs. Also sold was the Quarter lot for \$1,700.00, amounting to \$42.50 per acre.

The several Tax Liens which have appeared in our Town Reports, for the past few years are very nearly cleared, plus taxes on these properties to date. With the money received from the sale of Town owned property and the Tax Liens, debts to the Rumford Bank and

Trust Company have been paid with the exception of the note on the School Bus, the balance has been returned to the Surplus Fund.

The marked increase in the Town's Surplus from \$510.77 a year ago to \$5,841 77 has come from the following sources:

The overall effect of increase in Surplus and substantial collections of back taxes and tax liens has been to provide sufficient cash to pay off \$5,000 in bank loans and leave the Town with a \$5,377.36 cash balance with which to start the coming year.

We have this year six pupils from that section attending the Dixfield Schools. As can be seen from the financial report this has been a savings to the town. Last Fall Owen Oliver of Starks was elected to replace Euclid St. Pierre at the Berry Mills Grammar School. This year under the direction of Mrs. Swett and Mr. Oliver the Berry Mills school pupils have made fine scholastic progress.

Of the students listed above four have left school and four will graduate from high school in June. We have nine students in the 8th grade so we can anticipate having twenty-four in high school next Fall. With the advancing costs of tuition, we can expect that High School tuition for the next fiscal year will be about \$3,800.00. Our high school students are doing well scholastically and their attendance is good.

REPAIRS AND EQUIPMENT

From this account during the past year new fluorescent lights were installed in both rooms at the Berry Mills School, also the wood stoves were replaced by pot type oil burners. This accounts for the overdraft in this account. The new stoves have kept both rooms very comfortable.

For the coming year we anticipate replacing the two front doors and steps, painting the grammar room and hall, and replacing some of the old and worn out seats.

FINANCES

When books closed for the fiscal year on February 9th, all school bills were in and paid. By examining the financial accounts it will be noted that there is a balance in Common Schools of \$1,268.79, High School Conveyance of \$38.00, Office of \$1.10, Insurance of \$3.79 and Dental Project of \$5.00; and overdrafts of \$574.12 in Repairs and Equipment and Superintendence of \$32.65. Subtracting the total overdrafts of \$606.77 from the total unexpended of \$1,316.68 leaves a total unexpended of \$709.91.

BUDGET

The budget as prepared by the Superintending School Committee shows a decrease from last year's budget by \$1,616.93. This is done mainly by closing the Stickney Corner school and because next year we will receive more State Subsidy.

The budget as prepared by the School Committee and recommended by the Town Budget Committee is presented here for your consideration.

To the School Committee, Town Officials and Citizens, I wish to express my thanks for your unending efforts to make the Carthage School better.

Progress Report on Mouth Health Project

CARTHAGE — SEPTEMBER 1952

To the Town of Carthage:

Your second annual mouth health project for the school children has recently been completed. It consisted of mouth health educational activities and sodium fluoride applications for the partial prevention of dental decay. Carthage children were transported to Weld for their applications but teaching was done in the Carthage classrooms, a total of three and one-half days being used on Carthage children.

Continuing the plan as started last year, sodium fluoride applications were offered to certain age groups. Because best results are obtained when fluorine applications are given to seven, ten and thirteen year old children, grades containing the pupils of these ages were chosen for treatment. Also following the principles of the accepted technique, the sodium fluoride treatment consisted of a series of four applications of the mild solution, spaced from 2 to 7 days apart, the first application being preceeded by a professional cleaning. At the time the children's teeth were being cleaned, individual instruction was given each child as to what he could do to improve his own mouth health. Also, at that same time, each child received a careful dental examination, made with mouth mirror and dental explorer.

In addition to the grades receiving sodium fluoride applications, the sub-primary and first grades were given mouth examinations and individual instruction too. To reach the children who did not receive these, discussions were held in each classroom. These discussions covered the various phases of mouth health; the use of the toothbrush, proper diet, construction of the tooth and the importance of regular dental care. Visual aids and educational materials were employed in each room.

The total number of children examined was 32, of whom only one child had no dental decay and not one said they visited the dentist regularly. However, 14 children, almost one-half of them, had really clean teeth. This latter fact indicates that the families have genuine interest in mouth health and do what they can toward it. The fact that 17 children had sodium fluoride applications is further support of this family interest.

It is true that the younger the child starts dental care, the better the mouth health in adult life. Child health studies have shown that it is important for a child to retain his first teeth until the normal age for their being replaced by permanent teeth. These first teeth are needed for proper chewing, for normal jaw development and to maintain space for permanent teeth. That is why sodium fluoride applications for decay prevention are recommended for the 3-year-old child as well as the school child. While working on the 3-year-old, the dental hygienist can talk with the accompanying parent to explain the important part the baby teeth play in mouth development and health. Making it possible for the 3-year-old children to also have sodium fluoride applications is recommended.

I would like at this time to thank everyone who helped to make my work with the Carthage children so enjoyable.

Report of the Music Supervisor

To whom it may concern:

I entered the Carthage school system as Music Supervisor in the fall of the year 1952. The program here this year has promoted instrumental study as well as vocal work.

Instrumental Music

Each Friday afternoon there is scheduled an instrumental program for one hour in which the study of many instruments is offered, including the Hawaiian guitar, trumpet and the tonet. This project is fused with the vocal program.

Vocal Music

Each class is voice tested and the students are grouped to form a chorus composed of three choirs, namely, choir 1, choir 2, and choir 3, according to their vocal range and ability.

The sub-primary and 1st grades are grouped together for choral work. The 2nd and 3rd grades are also grouped together.

The 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th grades have a formed chorus with three respective choirs. They have a developing repertoire.

Theory used in school music is taught along with singing in grades 5-8 as incidental work in correlation with a written program which helps to promote understanding of note reading.

The school union has an orchestra this year which will include members from the Carthage schools as they develop in ability to play orchestral music.

The aim here again this year is to increase the value of music to the student through a developing vocal and instrumental program.

I wish to express my appreciation and thanks to the superintendent, teachers and citizens of Carthage for their interest in school music.

South Franklin County Tuberculosis and Health Association

To the citizens of Carthage the twenty-fifth annual report of this association is respectfully submitted, and covers a period from January 1st, 1952 to January 1st, 1953.

In reviewing much that has been published on Community Organization we find that it continually stresses that active participation is the only sure means of holding interest in any undertaking.

We have a general over all interest in the health of the community but we realize that other groups have as their first concern a particular health project and are only secondarily interested in other problems at hand. It is our aim to coordinate the efforts and resources of existing agencies so that while working to improve conditions, each group will hold its own identity.

Schools are interested in the child's fitness to participate in such activities as that particular school affords, correction of defects such as vision and hearing which make his work easier, and emotional problems which make it difficult for him to adjust to the school day. The parents in any capacity are interested in any plan which affects their child.

The health officer by law is responsible for the protection of the public through control of communicable diseases and sanitation. The medical and dental profession are primarily concerned with individual curative procedures and more recently with preventative medical services.

Extension groups, 4-H clubs, Grange and clubs with varying interests and zeal, all make up our Public Relations Committee, and it is through them that we must work to bring about a healthier community.

Physically life has become much easier for us, but emotionally it is more difficult. The unrest of the past decade, from depression to war, has taken a toll from everyone. We are more aware that preventative measures may be taken to insure a serene outlook. At present a movement is underway to organize a Mental Hygiene Society in Maine.

Through our own Mental Health Committee we hope that it will bring more resources to us in dealing with emotional problems in our daily lives.

The transition of returning all administrative practices from state to local associations, except for Christmas Seal mailing, has been com-

pleted. It does make some changes in program planning.

We cooperated with the Maine Tuberculosis Association by assisting Dr. Ashley, Bureau of Health, with promotional features of the chest x-ray survey in North Franklin County. The regional Diagnostic Clinics have been held in Wilton in May and November. Two attended from Carthage. Each clinic discharges some contacts or suspects who have been followed for several years and not developed active disease. This decreases our case load although some are occasionally added. 13 were given Patch tests, none reacting.

The New England Tuberculosis Conference was held in Portland in September. It was a most interesting meeting with physicians, psychiatrists, nurses, medical social workers, nutritionists, health education consultants, vocational rehabilitation workers, and — patients, making up the panel each day. This gives you some idea of all that is behind finding the patient, getting him in the sanitorium, and back on the job.

We have been more fortunate this year in that Dr. Defoe gave us one day when he gave complete examinations to all of the school children, and 45 received immunizations against whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus. At least 32 of these were booster doses. We do appreciate the fact that Dr. Defoe is very thorough in his examinations and not just a brief check up as some school examinations are. There have been 15 consultations with teachers, five home visits, and 17 interviews with individuals.

Without an active committee to make decisions you do not get the benefit of all that is offered in a health program. In fact if you do not get together and discuss it you do not know what is offered.

With this report we close twenty-five years of public health work in Carthage. We should be grown up, and this is not an experiment any more. We should appraise our worth and decide what of the old is to be kept and what of the new should be added.
