To Josiah Clark, a constable in the Town of Carthage in said County, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are requested to notify and warn inhabitants of the Town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town on the 7th day of March, A. S. 1954.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for Advertising the Natural Resources, Advantages, and Attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with provisions of Chapter 91, Section 108, R. S. 1954.

Article 37. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$115.50 in order to participate in the Franklin Area Family Counseling Service.

Article 46. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition the County Commissioners to reopen as a town road the old road beginning at the Roger Thomas Campsite, so-called, on Route #142 and extending southerly to Elliots Pines Corner, so called.

Article 47. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 from Elliot Brown for F. W. Brown lot. Int. to be used for permanent care of his lot in Newman Cemetery.

Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Services

IN CARTHAGE FOR THE YEAR 1965

A summary of the public health nursing services given in Carthage for this year is as follows:

The nature and purpose of home visits made in Carthage varied according to the need; teaching nursing care of the sick in the home as well as reassuring the patient and his family, health teaching and counseling to assist the individual or family to make and carry out plans for the prevention of disease; and follow-up home visiting to an individual or family under the care of a physician or clinic to help them carry out the doctor's instructions.

All beginners and seventh grade pupils were given the opportunity to have the tuberculin skin test. Immunizations were again offered in school for protection against diphtheria, tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis. Most of the children took advantage of this service. Regular visits were made in the school to confer with the teachers regarding the health problems of the students, and visits were made to the homes to help the parents seek adequate medical advice.

As youngsters reach their third birthday, kits for testing their eyes are sent to their parents from the State Department of Health and Town of Carthage.

These are used to check the child's vision to detect if amblyopia, an eye condition, is present. In some instances when the parents were unable to check the vision the public health nurse visited and re-checked the child's eyes.

Appreciation is extended to all in the community who have helped in the progress and success of the program.

Blood Donor Service Program

It gives me great pleasure to once again report to the citizens of Carthage the progress of the Blood Donor Service Program.

At the beginning of 1965, there were rumors that the patient was being charged for blood by this organization. This rumor was false! No patient has ever had to pay for this service, however an attempt was made to collect insurance benefits which paid specifically for blood, from those patients who were insured and who came from towns not contributing to the support of this program.

We realize that at no other time in ones life is a person more vulnerable to being financially wiped out than during a time of sickness therefore, there are no charges to the patient for this service. Hospitals make necessary laboratory charges to the patient which are not in any way related to the financial support of this program.

In January 1965, I was invited to attend a meeting to determine whether this organization should be allowed to receive insurance benefits. This meeting was attended by two members of the hospital board of directors, the administrator, a doctor, a laboratory supervisor and myself. This program received a great deal of praise from the chairman of the board and the hospital administrator. The doctor present felt that patients should pay the donors for their blood. The board member suggested that his company would not go along with this program receiving insurance benefits as it would deduct from insurance dividends to the company.

The lab supervisor was then quite insistant on forming her own type of a blood program which would place upon the patients family the responsibility of finding the necessary donors. She also suggested that we take this program and go elsewhere with it.

I decided not to go elsewhere with it, but to try to have the towns stay with us, which they did, with the exception of Peru, which was an oversight of the budget committee I am sure. The meeting resolved nothing, only widened the existing gap between the hospital and this program, and those donors who feel an allegiance to the Blood Donor Service Program because it is a better program and has proven itself by its deeds.

Perhaps the time is near where doctors and hospital directors should take a closer look and compare this service to that of the hospital.

In closing, I wish again to thank the citizens of the supporting towns, the donors, who are "very special people" and Edith Brown for her dedication to this project because without her, there would have been no program.

We have been operating with an annual budget of less than \$1600 when we should have had at least \$3000. In the past, I have managed to come up with the additional amount from personal funds and have been reluctant to ask communities for any more, however, there is a time when it is impossible to do this any longer and we have gone beyond that limit. You will notice that we are asking for an additional amount from each of the communities which have been members of this organization.

Blood Donor Service Program

Franklin County Area Counseling Service

I am pleased to submit my fifth annual report for The Franklin County Area Family Counseling Services. It is a difficult task this year because I am separating from a work which has been one of the most challenging and rewarding of any that I have done. Starting in September of 1961, the psychological services offered from this office, have been welcomed and well used by every town. Citizens of all ages and with all manner of problems have come to ask for help ranging from short-term evaluations to long-range weekly contacts that might go as long as several months or years.

Our Board of Directors was fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Marcel Tyrrel who replaces me. She is a certified psychologist with an impressive background of study and experience.

As in the past year, we have continued to have Reuben Leitman, M. D. as our consultant psychiatrist. Dr. Leitman comes for three hours a week and has added much depth and quality to our efforts to understand and help troubled people.

There are plans in the making for an additional psychologist to be added here this coming year; paid for by Federal Funds. While this will help, it is not as much growth as I had hoped to see. We also need a Social Worker and more funds for extended Psychiatric Services. At this point, there is ample evidence that we must have an increase in staff if people are to get the time they really need.

I would like to express my personal thanks to all those in the many towns who have contributed to the success of this service. I should especially mention our loyal, dedicated Board of Directors; my friend and secretary, Mrs. Marcia Prentiss; and Dr. William E. Schumacher (Director of Mental Health Services for the State) whose quiet work behind the scenes has been the backbone of the whole organization.

In your town in our fiscal year of July 1, 1964 to July 1, 1965 0 adults and 9 children were seen for a total of 11 conferences. In addition, Dr. Leitman consulted with 0 adults and 0 children 0 times.
