## TOWN WARRANT

Franklin, ss. To Josiah Clark, a constable in the Town of Carthage in said county, Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are requested to notify and warn inhabitants of the Town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town on the 6th day of March, A. D., 1967 at seven o'clock in the evening to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to elect all Town Officers by nomination from the floor.

Article 3. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to leave the care of all roads in the hands of the Selectmen.

Recommended Yes

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to arrange for the Plowing and Sanding of the Winter Roads to the best interest of the Town.

Recommended Yes

Article 7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Repair of Summer Roads and Bridges. Recommended \$1,000.00

Article 8. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Acquisition of Culverts.

Recommended None

Article 9. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the Care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Sections 44, 49 or 50, Chapter 23, R. S. 1954).

Recommended \$600.00

Article 10. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$57.20 for Snow Removal on Route U. S. 2 between Dixfield and Wilton Town Lines.

Recommended \$57.20

Article 11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of Plowing and Sanding Winter Roads on Routes 142, State Aid #3 and 4.

Recommended \$900.00

Article 12. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Roads.

Article 13. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of the Poor.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to fix a date when Taxes are due and payable.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to charge Interest beginning December the First, next, on all remaining and unpaid Taxes.

Article 21. To see what rate percent and final date to be allowed for Discount of Taxes on the 1967 Commitment, Poll Tax excepted.

Article 22. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Discount of Taxes.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to sell and assign Unmatured Tax Mortgage Liens for the amount unpaid and the Costs and Interest.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of Taxes thereon, any such terms as they deem advisable, and execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Article 32. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Interest on the Permanent School Fund. Recommended \$45.00

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the benefit of the Rumford Community Hospital.

Recommended \$200.00

Article 34. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the necessary Bonds for the Town Officers. Recommended \$40.00

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for Advertising the Natural Resources, Advantages, and Attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with provisions of Chapter 91, Section 108, R. S. 1954.

Recommended \$25.00

Article 36. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$115.50 in order to participate in the Franklin Area Family Counseling Service.

Recommended \$115.50

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185.00 toward the support of the Walking Blood Bank.

Recommended \$185.00

Article 38. To see if the Town will vote to permit any businesses not included with the exemptions listed in the Public Laws of 1961, Chapter 362, to remain open for business on the days set forth in said chapter.

Article 39. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Care of the Town Dump.

Article 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Town Treasurer's salary by \$50.00 a year.

Article 47. To see if the Town will vote (a) to enter into a street lighting contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of not less than ten (10) years covering the Town's existing street lighting system and such additional installations as may be installed in accordance with the provisions of the contract; the Town to pay to Central Maine Power Company for the street lighting service furnished and delivered to it under the provisions of the contract the sums prescribed by the Company's applicable rate schedule, which in no event shall be less than 90% of the maximum amount of the Company's monthly billing to the Town for the street lighting service contracted for under the Company's applicable rate schedule during any previous twelve month's period expiring on the anniversary date of the contract, and (b) to authorize the Selectmen or the Town Manager to execute and deliver to Central Maine Power Company said street lighting contract.

# Annual Report of Public Health Nursing Services

#### IN CARTHAGE FOR THE YEAR 1966

A summary of the public health nursing services given in Carthage is as follows:

An increase in home visits over last year indicates that more people are using the services of the public health nurse. The focus of service is on the family rather than the individual and includes the health needs of all age groups from the very young to the very old.

The nature and purpose of these visits were within the full range of health services—health promotion, including continuing health education; prevention of disease and disability including immunization, nutrition, and school health programs; care of the sick at home including teaching patient care to a member of the family and supervising or teaching procedures the patient must do for himself; and various types of rehabilitation services.

All students in the Kindergarten and Seventh Grades were given the opportunity to have the tuberculin skin test. Immunizations were also offered in the schools and for the most part your children are well protected against Diphtheria, Tetanus, Smallpox and Poliomyelitis.

Appreciation is expressed to all who have shown interest in the promotion of health in the community and have helped to make the program a successful one.

## **Blood Donor Service Program**

I wish to dedicate this report in memory of our former Medical Director, the late Dr. Garfield G. Defoe, whose untimely death brought a great deal of sadness to so many of us who knew him well. "Doc" was one of those who believed sincerely in this program and willingly gave numerous hours of his time to it, knowing that his contribution would save the people many hours of mental anguish in trying to find blood donors when members of their family needed them.

Since the inception of this program a total of more than 1500 FREE blood donations to date have been supplied to hospitals throughout the country for our people.

During the past two years, we have had to arrange for donors to go to hospitals throughout Maine and have furnished transportation and meals for them. This has not only been a great expense to the organization but has created a hardship on the donors because of the number of people in the area who are working shifts and the amount of time involved in completing these trips.

Through the cooperation of Dr. Jack Haladjian, Pathologist and Mr. Eugene Loubier, Administrator, Rumford Community Hospital, we shall resume the blood collecting clinics at the local hospital in the near future, and transport the blood to cooperating hospitals throughout Maine instead of the donors. This comes as the result of the dedication on the part of Miss Anita Badger, Medical Technologist and Dr. Haladjian, whose combined efforts enabled the Rumford Community Hospitals Blood Bank to become an accredited member of the American Association of Blood Banks, of which the Blood Donor Service Program has been an associate member since 1965.

I wish to thank the citizens of Carthage for your cooperation in this program and for your financial support of \$185.00 and hope the coming year will be the same.

#### To the citizens of School Administrative District #21:

Undoubtedly the most significant problem experienced during the past year was the extremely high change rate of personnel. This problem was not confined to the beginning of the school year in September, but has persisted with resignations and required hiring of replacements to the present time. From the foregoing, it is obvious that, in addition to the administrative problems resulting from these changes, the continuity of the academic programs is also disrupted.

Early in the year, procedures were undertaken to effect the dissolution of School Union #27, with intentions of School District #21 becoming an entity with exclusive administrative personnel. Considerations for alternative arrangements, including creation of a position of assistant superintendent, were eliminated as being economically unsound. The prime reason for these procedures resulted from the substantial increase in involvement in Federal programs as well as State requirements. Ultimately the Town of Peru went under the jurisdiction of the Superintendent of S. A. D. #39 in July and the Town of Weld joined S. A. D. #9 in November, thus completing the procedures.

The construction of the auditorium-gymnasium facility was undertaken with K. & H. Foster of Wilton as the prime contractor.

This followed the negotiations for bonds in the amount of \$250,000 through the H. M. Payson Company of Portland with the Casco Bank and Trust of Portland and the Rumford Bank and Trust of Rumford. Certain problems concerning deliveries of materials have extended the construction period beyond original estimates; however, it is anticipated that substantial completion of the facility with acceptance of ownership will be finalized in February or March of 1967.

During the past two (2) years, basic costs for additional and renovated facilities, including the auditorium-gymnasium, have amounted to approximately \$350,000. The incurred financial obligation, after discounting applicable subsidies, generally replaces certain current obligations which are being retired through maturity. The need for future capital investments will be largely dependent on school population factors; however, academic program requirements may also become significant. The latter item will gain in importance as the need for system accreditation increases. It should be noted that many institutions of higher learning have established preparation in an accredited system as an admission prerequisite. This practice is expected to increase rapidly; therefore, expansion and revision of programs are being undertaken to insure meeting requirements wherever possible with currently available funds.

Total costs for school operations have increased; however, due to greater amounts of state subsidy, the commitment to the Towns of Canton, Carthage, and Dixfield has not increased on the basis of direct taxation. Although this continues a trend of four (4) years duration, it cannot reasonably be expected to continue indefinitely. It must be recognized that increased costs are inevitable as concerns present and future necessities.
