## COMMENTS

Re: Audit of the Town of Gouldsboro  
January 15, 1949 to January 15, 1950

*Cash*

Warrant and Treasurer's Receipts were checked in detail to the cash account. The check book balances were reconciled with the latest bank statements and found to be in agreement. Cash on hand was verified by physical count. Unidentified deposits in the amount of \$250.92 were credited to the surplus account.

*Accounts Receivable*

The accounts receivable, except for an item of \$96.12 due from the Town of Mt. Desert, are due from the State for various highway accounts. The State Aid Road account which has been listed as a receivable since 1941 was adjusted to the amount specified in a letter from the State Highway Commission under date of March 30, 1949. Apparently this account is to be liquidated from the annual matching funds raised by the State.

*Taxes Receivable*

The records of the Tax Collector were examined and the warrant of commitment was in agreement with the Assessor's records. The commitment was accounted for by cash collections of \$41,020.28, discount of \$368.49, abatements \$230.45 and uncollected 1949 taxes amounting to \$4,451.58. Uncollected taxes for prior years amount to \$3,920.52.

*Accounts Payable*

This liability represents an overpayment by the Town of Jonesport on a pauper account and should be refunded.

*Due Governmental Agencies*

Deductions from wages and salaries on account of withholding taxes and teachers' pensions are held in the general fund pending the appropriate dates of settlement with the proper agencies.

*Due Trust Funds*

Unexpended income from cemetery trust funds remains in the general fund until expended according to the terms of the trust.

*Deferred Revenue*

Prepaid 1950 excise taxes were received prior to the closing of the books and this credit is carried forward to the 1950 municipal year for proper application.

*Surplus*

At the close of the municipal year, the town had a net surplus of \$3,402.61 as compared with a deficit of \$4,512.02 the previous year. The principal factors influencing this change were the town debt appropriation of \$4,000.00 and the revenue from 1949 excise taxes. Of the \$3,402.61 mentioned above, \$1,259.12 consists of the appropriation balances forward and this amount is earmarked for specific purposes, leaving \$2,143.49 unappropriated for any definite use. The detail of the appropriation balances are shown on Exhibit D of this report and an analysis of change in unappropriated surplus is presented on Exhibit E.

*TRUST FUNDS*

The records of the various trust funds were examined and all funds were found properly invested. Income has been expended in accordance with the terms of the trusts with the exception of \$3.75 which is held in the general fund.

*General*

The fidelity bonds of the various town officials were examined and found to be in order.

Revenue obtained from excise taxes was checked and the total of the collector's receipts issued agreed with the amount deposited with the treasurer.

Vouchers and payrolls were examined in part and those examined appeared to be proper charges to the accounts involved.

All unexpended balances required by law to be carried forward have been carried to 1950.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE AREA SCHOOL

To the citizens of the Town of Gouldsboro:

In 1948 you voted to join the neighboring towns in creating the Consolidated Area School District No. 2. The money for this project was to be raised on or before March 1, 1950. This report is to acquaint you with what has been done in regard to the Area School up to the present time.

The Town Selectmen appointed Charles G. Small, William B. Cole, and Earle B. Tracy, Sr. as Trustees from Gouldsboro.

The trustees met with the trustees of the neighboring towns at Sullivan High School and incorporated themselves into Area School District No. 2. Earle B. Tracy, Sr. was elected chairman of the Board of Trustees, William Blaisdell, trustee from Franklin was elected treasurer, Superintendent R. H. Haskins was elected Recording Secretary. The trustees then divided themselves into three groups.

Group one was to study Transportations Problems, find the geographical center of the area and look for suitable sites for the School Project.

Group two was to make a study of the type of building needed in our area and to estimate the probable cost.

Group three was to find sources of revenue to finance the project.

Group one found the geographical center of the area to be approximately the Town House in West Gouldsboro. They looked over two possible building sites in West Gouldsboro, one in Ashville and one in East Sullivan. Charles Small, trustee from Gouldsboro, offered to donate to the Area 35 acres of land in Ashville for the new School Building. The other building sites were found not to be available.

Group two contacted Mr. Bailey of the State Department of Education, found out the type of building the State would approve and then contacted several building Architects to appear before the Board of Trustees to outline plans and give estimations of cost. The estimated cost of the building was approximately \$350,000. By further study it was thought that this figure might be reduced somewhat.

Group three contacted various people who float Bond issues to find out where the District Bonds could be sold to the best advantage. Dr. Averill, a summer resident of Sorrento, offered to take the entire Bond Issue at  $2\frac{1}{2}$  %. This would give our trustees approximately \$100,000. toward their new building. It was then decided to ask for pledges throughout the area to ascertain what the residents of the area would contribute. Approximately \$8,000. was pledged. This was far short of the amount needed. A Special Resolve to the State Legislature to raise the borrowing power of the District from 5% to 12% as the City of Ellsworth was doing was considered, but decided against because it would greatly increase the financial burden on the various Towns. There was favorable talk that the Maine Legislature was going to pass a bill favoring the Consolidated Area School and help with the building program.

President Truman was also urging an Educational Bill in Congress. It was decided to wait and see what money would be available, if any, from the State or Federal Government. Our State Legislature did pass a Bill favorable to the Area School but made no appropriation to aid in the building program. The Federal Government has not as yet passed any Educational Bill. However, if they do so, it is probable that no more than \$10,000. would be available to this area.

With no new revenue in sight, Group three informed the trustees that they would have to make changes

in their plans as to all probability \$125,000. was all the money available for their School Building Program.

Recently one of the Trustees conferred with Mr. William Bailey of the State Department of Education and was informed that if we would change our plans from a six-year High School to a four-year High School, thus reducing the number of pupils, build a one-story wooden building to accommodate 200 pupils and for the time being forget about a Gymnasium, it was well within reasonable thinking that such a building could be built with the present funds available, namely, a bond issue in the amount of 5% of the combined local assessed valuation of the Towns in the Area School District. Mr. Bailey's expressed opinion has been confirmed by a telephone conversation with one of the most prominent School Building Architects in the State.

This brings us up to date on the activities of the Trustees. Believing that the arguments for the Area School are as valid to-day as they were two years ago, the Trustees have caused to be inserted into the Warrants of the various Towns articles which if passed will allow the continuation of efforts to bring to this area a Consolidated District High School.

We have not as yet had the time to study Mr. Bailey's last recommendations, however, if the Trustees' efforts in the last two years have brought the Area School from a visionary ideal to a possibility, may not more time bring us from a possibility to a reality?

## SCHOOL REPORT

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The seven-town area school approved by the voters of Gouldsboro two years ago failed of realization. Sufficient funds did not materialize to build and equip a six-year 400 pupil secondary school plant complete with gymnasium, and only five of the seven towns voted approval of the plan.

While popular interest has not waned, if anything has increased, it is generally agreed that this whole matter of an Area School should be settled one way or the other for at least the immediate future. More and more people concede that educational changes are coming anyway, but that it is a matter of timing, depending for the most part upon local needs. Because of this feeling, another effort is being made now in the form of a smaller proposition, involving fewer towns and less capital outlay. Actually, it reduces itself down to a plan of consolidating Sullivan and Winter Harbor high schools into a joint Community School, built and operated by four adjoining towns.

It is well to observe here, however, that the plan considers only the building of the classroom unit at first with the gymnasium to come at some unforeseen future. This is necessary since the area is limited by law to borrowing only 5% of its combined state valuation which amounts right now to \$100,500.00, the estimated cost of the classroom unit. The gymnasium, with its use as an auditorium, must be financed from another source. This additional \$100,000.00 will either come from private gifts or through federal and/or state school construction subsidies.

The big question then is "When shall we begin?" Should it be now, and take a chance that the second unit will follow within a reasonable period, perhaps



from 1 to 3 years, or, would it be better judgement to wait until the federal and state agencies set up a program guaranteeing definite grants under a fund matching program as has been used in the past, or again, enough pledges are made from friends of the project to insure its success? On the other hand, you may feel that a centralized academic unit without a gymnasium is better than what is now available and any improvement, no matter how limited, warrants the extra effort now.

If you feel that Gouldsboro can afford to enter into this common educational enterprise, that it means an improved high school program over what is now at hand, that now is the time to move ahead, then vote YES at town meeting.

If you are satisfied with the present set-up, or feel that this educational change will mean an unnecessary extra tax burden, or that more thought and planning be given the entire problem, especially in the light of the need for a complete unit to start with, or even other possibilities be considered, then vote NO.

Whatever your opinion, your vote will probably help settle the issue for some time to come. And, in a sense you are deciding also a problem even bigger than that of improved schools. It has to do with the basic idea of neighboring small towns pooling their resources along certain lines instead of trying to go it alone. If there is any merit to this concept of unity and common purpose, then a Community School might well serve as a symbol of further such progress while meeting the current need of boys and girls who continue to grow up, notwithstanding the economics of the times.

## NURSE'S REPORT

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I herewith submit a brief report of the service rendered the Town of Gouldsboro by the Flanders Bay Nursing Service for the period beginning January 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.

As usual, the winter weighing of 175 pupils was completed in January and conferences were held with the teachers and pupils regarding corrections necessary for a health promotion certificate offered each year to pupils who qualify. 62 pupils received them, also 5 received five year certificates, given if the children have five health certificates in succession.

The Patch Test for Tuberculosis, to be followed by chest x-ray of reactors, was offered the entering class and new pupils moving to town, where permission was given by the parent. 36 were tested, all negative.

All Tuberculosis contacts were taken to Ellsworth to the x-ray clinic conducted by the Division of T. B. Control. Also all school personnel, as required by law every 2 years, x-rayed. 16. No defects found at that time.

Routine vaccination against Small Pox, Diphtheria immunization and Whooping Cough, also Schick testing was offered the entering class and new pupils. The response to these immunizations has been very gratifying. Small Pox, 14; Diphtheria, 15; Whooping Cough, 12; Schicked, 14.

The July infant and pre-school clinic was omitted this year, on account of the Whooping Cough epidemic.

With the opening of school in September, special head and skin inspection was completed during the first week of school, sanitary inspection of school buildings and playground equipment was also checked at this time.

Annual school inspection was completed in November. Notices of defects were sent to the home or a visit made. A full report was left with each teacher. Routine school room visits have been made and help given teachers with their health problems whenever needed.

112 pupils received the sodium fluoride dental treatment offered free by the United States Public Health Service.

Home visits made during the year, 451. Visits of instruction and investigation were made on prenatal patients, babies, preschool, school children, Tuberculosis contacts. Transportation has been furnished 9 adults, 3 schoolchildren, one preschool, to doctor's offices, dentists, hospital, oculist and clinic.

I extend thanks to all who have helped with the Nursing Program, with special mention of the cooperation of Dr. William Lumley, the Selectmen, Members

of the School Board, Superintendent of Schools, teachers and parents.
