TOWN OF ROME FOR YEAR 1945

Greetings:

1945, Victory in war, and we ask ourselves, have we been as faithful in our duties on the home front? Have we given sufficient thought to developing a stronger generation by building healthier bodies, cleaner minds, and better morals? Have we protected our children from communicable diseases? The State Bureau of Health through its Public Health Nursing Service has endeavored to help your community to do these things; by teaching the principles of good health, physically, mentally and morally. Our Staff is still depleted but we are trying to maintain these principles.

Some scheduled health work has been postponed due to communicable diseases in the community. Nevertheless, it gives me pleasure to report the following for the year 1945:

14 days of Public Health Nursing Service were given to your town. This was divided into home visits to expectant mothers, infants and preschools.

1 Child Health Conference was held with 7 attending, all receiving physical examinations and immunizations against whooping cough, diphtheria, and smallpox. The Child Health Conferences plan was discontinued for the year due to the prevalent communicable disease as mentioned above.

All 5 schools were visited and 59 tuberculin tests given. The positive reactors were x-rayed with no active tuberculosis cases found.

The following activities are suggested for Health work in 1946:

1. Child Health Conferences, at least 3 during the year.

2. Routine tuberculin testing of all children and adults if desired.

3. Audiometer testing for hearing loss in all schools.

In accordance with Chapter 16, Section 3, Revised Statutes of 1944 and at your request, the records of the town of Rome have been audited by Auditor Carl G. Hawes for the period February 18, 1944 to February 19, 1945 inclusive.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which were considered necessary. In the accompanying comments, you will find an exception noted as relates to this examination. This is briefly as follows:

The Tax Collector and Excise Tax Collector have not deposited their collections monthly with the Treasurer as required by Chapter 81, Section 105, Revised Statutes of 1944.

This should have your attention so that subsequent audits will not reveal the same condition.

Exhibits and schedules incorporated in this report impartially present the financical position of the town of Rome and the result of its operation for the period designated.

Comments and other data incorporated in this report may prove of interest to you. All of which is respectfully submitted.

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of the town of Rome February 18, 1944 to February 19, 1945

All receipts as issued were examined and found correctly recorded. Deposits as entered on the bank statements were compared with the receipts.

Cash on deposit and subject to check as of February 19, 1945 reconciled with the bank statement.

Expenditures were made by check from warrants drawn by the Selectmen.

Payments received on tax liens appeared to have been applied against the proper accounts. Those remaining unpaid were checked.

The trust fund investments were examined and it appeared that the income received had been properly accounted for.

The tax commitment was compared with the records of the Assessors. It was ascertained that this commitment was accounted for by cash paid the Treasurer and abatements, or unpaid taxes as reflected on the records of the Collector.

It was necessary to check all payments as recorded on the Tax Collector's cash sheets.

The 1944 Excise tax collections were checked from the copies of the receipts and \$21.48 was found due from the Collector. The 1945 excise taxes collected to February 19, 1945 amounting to \$97.60 had not been deposited with the Treasurer. We would recommend that the Tax Collector and Excise Tax Collector deposit all collections with the Treasurer monthly.

The records of the Selectmen were examined and approximately sixty warrants were checked to the distribution book.

Payrolls were test checked.

EQUALIZATION

In December 1946, the Town of Rome will not receive any equalization money from the State. This is because the law states the school tax rate for a town must be above the average for the State if the town is to receive equalization; and the school tax rate for the Town of Rome is .01126, while the average tax rate of the several towns for school maintenance in the State is .01800.

Our school tax rate of .01126 is arrived at by dividing our local school maintenance appropriation, which is \$5,600, by the State valuation of the town, which is \$497,413.

During the month of November, the superintendents of schools in the State were called to Augusta for a week to listen to lectures by, and consult with, Dr. William H. Burton of Harvard University, consultant for the State Department of Education in the building of a new Elementary School Curriculum.

Much is being done to provide better educational opportunities for the children of the State of Maine, by requiring better training and preparation of teachers, planning a richer curriculum, and securing better materials with which to work.

Along with higher standards for teachers comes their demand for higher salaries. This has brought about a serious teacher shortage in the State of Maine. Many teachers have gone to other states which pay salaries more in keeping with the demands made upon them. Dr. Harry V. Gilson, State Commissioner of Education, advises us that he expects an even greater shortage for the coming school year. In Rome we have been fortunate to secure teachers who live locally.

All grades from the pre-reading level through the eighth grade have now been equipped with the Scott Foresman basic reading series. This provides excellent material for a strong reading program.

The financial statement included in this report shows the total receipts and disbursements of the school department for the year ending February 9, 1946. The total receipts for the year in the common school fund account \$6,042.57, high school tuition account \$2,820.50, books and supplies account \$236.28, repairs account \$247.22, administration account \$287.51. The total disbursements in the common school account were \$4,692.95, in high school tuition account \$1,777.83, in books and supplies account \$225.29, in repairs account \$211.87, in administration account \$307.54. The unexpended balance in each account is as follows: common school account \$1,349.62, high school tuition account \$1,042.67, books and supplies account \$10.99, repairs account \$211.87. There is a deficit of \$20.03 in the administration account.

In conclusion I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to the school committee, town officers, teachers and citizens for their helpfulness and support.

ARTICLE 1

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for support of Common Schools.

ARTICLE 4

ARTICLE 5

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Repairs of School Buildings.

ARTICLE 6

To see if the Town will vote to transport the High School Scholars for the ensuing year if the parents will pay one-half of transportation expense.

ARTICLE 7

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Tuition of High School Scholars.

ARTICLE 8

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Superintendent of Schools.

ARTICLE 9

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Support of Poor.

ARTICLE 10

To see if the Town will vote and raise Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) for Public Health Nursing in Rome, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local service.

ARTICLE 11

To see if the Town will vote and raise the sum of \$50.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

ARTICLE 12

To see if the Town will vote and raise the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 11, Sections 62-3-4.

ARTICLE 13

To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid for State Aid Highways for the ensuing year.

Article 14

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for State Aid Road. One and one-half units or \$800 is the limit.

ARTICLE 15

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for maintenance of State Aid Roads.

Article 16

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Patrolled Roads.

ARTICLE 17

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for breaking Snow Roads.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote and raise the sum of \$150.00 for use of the Belgrade Fire Truck.

Article 19

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Repair of Roads and Bridges.

ARTICLE 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of not less than \$230.00 required by law for the maintenance of Third Class Roads.

ARTICLE 21

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise. for Payment of Miscellaneous Orders.

ARTICLE 22

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 23

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for the care of Cemeteries.

ARTICLE 24

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise to cut Bushes on the Highways.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate on the part of the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, or any other real estate now owned by the Town not used for town purposes, and all equipment connected with the Air Warden System including building used for observation post, bells and locomotive rims used for warnings, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute Quit Claim Deeds or Bills of Sale, as the case may be, for such property.

Article 26

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a Temporary Loan or Loans, in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the Town. Such notes to be paid during the current municipal year, out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

ARTICLE 27

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay Interest on short time notes.

ARTICLE 28

To see what compensation the Town will vote to give for Collecting Taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 29

To see what sum of money the Town will vote and raise for Dependent Children.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote and raise a sum of money to pay for Electric Lights for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 31

To see if the Town will vote and raise the sum of \$225.00 to be expended on the black road for Breaking Snow, erecting Snow Fence, and Sanding Roads.

ARTICLE 32

To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 from Mert Dudley's Estate, interest to be used to keep his cemetery lot in repair.

ARTICLE 33

To see if the Town will vote to pay the School Committee \$15.00 each for 1945 and each year thereafter.

ARTICLE 34

To see if the Town will vote and raise a sum of money for payment of Outstanding Bills.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to establish any school or schools, that run short of the average attendance, which said School Committee deem profitable to run.

Vote to adjourn without date.
