Superintendent's Report.

REPORT OF SCHOOLS.

It is with regret that we are unable to report the progress made in our schools the past year. Mrs. J. C. Pratt resigned as superintendent of schools the first of October, and I was appointed to fill the vacancy. At that time the fall schools had been in session nearly six weeks, and we did not have the opportunity of visiting them but once. The summer schools were under the instructions of first class teachers, and as far as we know, were satisfactory.

SCHOOL NO. 2.

Summer term, Miss Mary Newman of Phillips, teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks. Wages of teacher, \$4.00 per week; board, \$1.75 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 14; average number, 12.

Fall term, Miss Sadie Smith of Dixfield, teacher. Length of term, 12 weeks. Wages of teacher, \$4.00 per week; board, \$1.75 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 16; average number, 15. Miss Smith's work in the school room is first class, and we consider her among the best of teachers.

SCHOOL NO. 3.

Summer term, Mrs. C. E. Ludden of Canton Point, teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks. Wages of teacher, \$4.50 per week; board, \$1.75 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 12; average number, 10.

Fall term, Miss Della Hildreth of Perkins Plantation, teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks. Wages of teacher, \$3.75 per week; board, \$1.75 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 10; average number, 9. This was Miss Hildreth's first school, and although young and inexperienced she taught an excellent school.

SCHOOL No. 4.

Summer term, Miss Linnie E. Brown of Berry Mills, teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks. Wages of teacher, including board, \$5.50 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 17; average number, 12.

Fall term, Miss Ella B. Walton of Dixfield, teacher. Length of term, 12 weeks. Wages of teacher, \$4.00 per week; board, \$1.75 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 18; average number, 15. Miss Walton is a fine scholar and an up to date teacher.

SCHOOL No. 5.

Summer term, Miss Lila A. Whiting of Turner, teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks. Wages of teacher, including board, \$5.00 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 18; average number, 16.

Fall term. This school was also under the instruction of Miss Whiting. Length of term, 12 weeks. Wages of teacher, including board, \$6.00 per week. Number of scholars attending school, 21; average number, 18. This being Miss Whiting's second term in the district speaks well for her success as a teacher.

 FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

On January 13th a special town meeting was held to raise money for a free High School, and your Superintendent was instructed by the superintending school committee to have school commence Jan. 22, and a male teacher was desired, but we found after several day's correspondence that the best teachers were all engaged, and we were not able to secure a teacher until Feb. 12. The school commences Feb. 20th, under the instruction of Ernest Holman of Jay. Mr. Holman furnished first-class recommendations, and we have no doubt but what the school will be profitable.

TEXT BOOKS.

The following text books have been purchased the past year :

It is evident that there has got to be a more rigid supervision over our text books. Year after year the town is called upon to raise money to purchase text books to replace those that have been destroyed. In some of our schools we find the books in good condition while in others we find them with the covers gone, leaves torn out, and the books badly worn. While the teachers are to blame for not doing their duty, we think that the parents and school officers are negligent of theirs. Parents should teach their children how to handle their books. Also teach them that if they destroy or damage one that they have got to pay for it. The teachers should be made to do their duty in regard to the books. The school board do theirs and we believe this evil will be checked.
