





# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

### Gentlemen : ---

In accordance with the laws of our State, it becomes necessary for me to submit the following report:

There were enrolled April 1st, 1900, one hundred and seven (107) pupils. The source and expenditure of the school fund you have already before you in the report of the Selectmen, and it needs no recapitulation here.

#### TEXT-BOOKS.

The following new text-books have been purchased and placed in the several schools during the past year:

31 Metcalf's English Grammars.

25 Metcalf's Elem. Grammars.

5 Webster's Academic Dictionaries (indexed).

6 Milne Standard Arithmetics.

6 Meservey's Book-Keeping (single and double entry).

8 dozen Barnes' Vertical Copy-books.

School in No. 2 has been suspended during the past year, as this school lacked the necessary number of pupils required by law to maintain the same.

With these few lines of introduction, we will now pass to the individual report of our schools in their order.

#### SPRING SCHOOLS.

#### SCHOOL NO. I.

Miss Minnie E. Maxwell of South Carthage, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks; number of pupils registered, 8; average, 6.45. (This school was maintained by vote of town.) Wages of teacher, including board, \$5.00 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, I; dismissal, I. Order good and work satisfactory.

#### SCHOOL NO. 3.

Miss Virgie Rowell of Wilton, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks; number of pupils registered, 17; average, 16 1-44. Wages of teacher, excluding board, \$3.50 per week; price of board, \$1.75 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 78; dismissal, none. This was Miss Rowell's first term. Although young and inexperienced, she taught a very good school, much better than many of more experience and riper years.

#### SCHOOL NO. 4.

Miss Lilla A. Whiting of Turner, Maine, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks; number of pupils registered, 16; average, 13. Wages of teacher, including board, \$5.55 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 13; dismissal, 10. Order and advancement good.

#### SCHOOL NO. 5.

Mr. Arch L. Coburn of Carthage, teacher. Length of term, 9 weeks; number of pupils registered, 14; average, 10. Wages of teacher, including board, \$5.55 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 83; dismissal, 9. This was Mr. Coburn's second term in his home school. We think Arch did his best. His school passed a good examination.

#### SCHOOL NO. I.

Miss Minnie E. Maxwell of South Carthage, teacher. Length of term, 11 weeks; number of pupils registered, 9; average, 8 21-55. Wages of teacher, including board, \$5.00 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 4; dismissal, none. On account of sickness this school was visited but once, but we have heard no murmur of complaint, and feel safe to say that Miss Maxwell sustained her former reputation in this school.

#### SCHOOL NO. 3.

Mr. N. M. Hammond of Carthage, teacher. Length of term, 11 weeks. Wages of teacher, excluding board, \$4.25 per week; price of board, \$2.00 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 21; dismissal, 5. Order very good; advancement good; we think Mr. Hammond tried to do his whole duty in this school.

### SCHOOL NO. 4.

Miss Linnie E. Brown of Berry Mills, teacher. Length of term, 11 weeks. Number of pupils registered, 21; average, 18.3. Wages of teacher, including board, \$6.00 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 46; dismissal, 9. Miss Brown is one of our best teachers. All work done in a thorough and satisfactory manner.

#### SCHOOL NO. 5.

Miss Marilla M. Houle of New Floss, Ontario, teacher. Length of term, 11 weeks; number of pupils registered, 17; average, 13. Wages of teacher including board, \$5.00 per week. Number of instances of tardiness, 176; dismissal, 90. Miss Houle is a fine scholar and her methods of teaching excellent. We are satisfied she did her whole duty in this school. Tardiness and irregularity in attendance in this school are great evils. These done away with, much different results would be manifested.

# SCHOOL NO. 6.

## (Bowley Hill School)

This school your Superintendent has failed to manage to his own satisfaction. He has sought the aid and advice of the S. S. Committee, but with no better success. As there is no school-house in this school, and as this part of our town is contiguous to the town of Weld, we have paid tuition and transportation to the Weld schools. But we have been unable to do this without using much more than their proportional part of the school fund. Nor could we maintain a school without the same results. If any of our townsmen can solve this problem we would be very grateful. Your attention will be called to this matter by an article in the Warrant at our next annual meeting. The following statement shows the expense of this school:

#### FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

## (Berry Mills.)

Mr. C. E. Michels of Brunswick, Maine, teacher; whole number of pupils registered, 27. Wages of teacher, \$30.00 per month; price of board, \$2.25 per week. Mr. Michels came to this school with very strong recommendations from the Faculty at Bowdoin College, also several Superintendents, under whose supervision he has taught previously. He has proved to be what he was recommended to be, a first-class, up-to-date teacher, and a very strong disciplinarian. This school is now in session, and a profitable term's work is assured.

#### CONCLUSION.

In the summary of the results of the past year it is a pleasure to be able to say that we have had some excellent schools; but

we must bear in mind that all does not depend upon the teacher alone. Our very best teacher, to be perfectly successful, must have the co-operation of both parents and pupils. Irregularity of attendance, and tardiness, are very prominent among the causes which retard the advancement and progress of our schools. You will see by the individual report of our several schools, that these evils have been brought to your attention, thinking perhaps many were not aware of the extent of these two great evils which go so far towards retarding the progress of our pupils, and causing so much dissatisfaction with our teachers and school officers. Let us all try-parents, pupils, teachers, and school officers-to remedy these evils, and see if different results are not apparent at once, and thus raise the standard of our schools to the height we all wish to see them attain.
