NOTICE.

To A. E. GEORGE, Constable of the town of Hebron, in the County of Oxford, Greeting :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said town on Monday the fifth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act on the following articles, to wit :

- 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2d. To see if the town will accept the reports as printed.
- 3d. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 4th. To see if the town will vote to have their taxes collected within one year from time of commitment for the year ensuing, and what method the town will take to collect the same.
- 5th. To see what action the town will take in regard to collecting back taxes and abating a part of same.
- 6th. To see if the town will vote to repair the town house, and provide and furnish a comfortable and convenient office in same for use of town officers.
- 7th. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools and the poor and the repair of roads and bridges and to defray all other town charges for the year ensuing.

8th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen dollars for A. A. Dwinals Post to help defray expenses of Memorial day.

9th. To see if the town will vote to raise money for repairs on school-houses for year ensuing.

10th. To see what action the town will take in regard to building the new road around No. 4 Hill, so called, and raising money for same.

11th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for the purpose of making Hebron Academy a free high school to the scholars of Hebron.

12th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new road machine and plow and raise money to pay for same.

13th. To see if the town will vote to accept the settlement with R. J. Everett, executor of the estate of H. M. Everett, as made by the selectmen on February 7th, 1894.

14th. To see if the town will vote to purchase the store room of Hebron Grange adjoining town house, and fit the same for a tool house.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters at the town house at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

Your Supervisor of Schools respectfully submits for your observation the following report of the educational work of your town:

DISTRICT No. 2. Chas. Taylor, Agent.—Summer term, Mrs. Emily Keene, teacher. Mrs. Keene is among the very best of our teachers. She awakened an interest in this school which continued through the term. Excellent work was done.

Winter term, Miss Minnie Davee of Minot, teacher. Miss Davee is a successful and experienced teacher. The standard of the summer term was well maintained.

DISTRICT No. 3. R. Bradford, Agent.—This district united with an adjoining district in Turner. The summer term was held in Turner and winter term in this district. Both terms were under the charge of C. W. Skillings of Turner. Mr. Skillings is a teacher of successful experience, exact in method and discipline, and thorough in recitation.

DISTRICT No. 4. Addison Monk, Agent.—Both summer and winter terms were taught by A. C. Whitman of Buckfield. Mr. Whitman is a teacher of no little experience, as his register showed that this was his sixty-first term. His methods of discipline and instruction were somewhat different from most teachers. He makes use of many practical questions in all studies.

DISTRICT No. 5. P. Everett, Agent.—Miss Angie Jackson, who has had charge of this school for the last four terms, still continues to retain the love and good-will of her pupils, the confidence and respect of parents and friends. Manifesting that same interest and parental regard for all, Miss Jackson has reason to be proud of her pupils, as they are justly of their teacher. Those interested in the school are to be congratulated in having so devoted and accomplished a teacher.

DISTRICT No. 6. A. E. George, Agent.—Summer term was taught by Miss Rose Austin of Paris. Miss Austin is a good instructor and labors hard for her scholars but owing to the conduct of a few unruly boys she failed to exert sufficient governing influence.

Winter term, Miss Frances Crockett of Norway, teacher. This was Miss Crockett's first term. She opened the school with a firm determination to succeed. The pupils soon learned that she was to be mistress of the school. Very satisfactory work was done. The smaller ones in particular made rapid progress.

DISTRICT NO. 7.—Leon Whitman, Agent. Summer term, Miss Agnes Bearce, teacher. This is the smallest school in town but has in it some of the very best material. Both teacher and scholars seemed interested in their work and good progress was made.

Winter term, Miss Tinnie Chase of Buckfield, teacher. Miss Chase's kind and pleasing ways soon gained the favor of her scholars. At the first visit I was much pleased with the school. Owing to a misunderstanding about the length of term I did not visit it at its close.

DISTRICT NO. 8.—H. M. Bearce, agent. Summer term, Miss Abbie Hibbs, teacher. Miss Hibbs has taught several terms here with good success. She possesses the faculty of explanation and looks after the first principles in all branches. She makes special effort to keep her scholars at work, believing that a busy scholar can never find time to be mischievous.

The winter term was taught by Miss Annie Bearce, a graduate of Hebron Academy, '93. This was Miss Bearce's first experience in teaching. Some of the classes done very good work, but the order, the importance of which young teachers are apt to undervalue, was not up to the standard necessary to secure good results.
