### Warrant for Town Meeting

Franklin, ss.

State of Maine

To Guy C. Robbins, constable of the town of Carthage, greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Carthage, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D. 1931, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the municipal officers for the year ending Feb. 11, 1931.
- Art. 4. To choose assessors, selectmen, overseers of poor, treasurer and all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 5. To see how much money the town will vote, raise and appropriate for the support of common schools, for tuition, text books and supplies, schoolhouse insurance, schoolhouse repairs, school office expense and interest on the school fund.
- Art. 6. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for the superintendence of schools.
- Art. 7. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for a patrol and 50-50 fund.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 10 To see if the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of state aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised, for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote and raise the sum of three hundred and thirty-four dollars (\$334.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of third class road, or to be used in connection with the third class apportionment made by the state for the improvement of third class roads.
- Art. 12. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for the maintenance of the state aid roads now built.
- Art. 13. To see how much money the town will vote and raise, to cut bushes, on the third class and state aid roads.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for winter roads.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for the purchase of snow fence.
- Art. 17. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for the purchase of state aid road tools.
- Art. 18. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for the care of the poor.
- Art. 19. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for current expenses.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the town will vote and raise to be paid by the treasurer, on warrant properly drawn to the treasurer of the State of Maine, for the purpose of developing the resources and attraction of the State of Maine.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to petition the State Highway Commission and Commissioners of Franklin County, for a new bridge at the Newman Bridge, so called.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, either by taxation or loan, to pay for the town's share in the Newman Bridge.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purchase of a snow plow.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the town will vote and raise to provide for a public health nurse.
- Art. 25. To see how much money the town will vote and raise to fight the white pine blister rust.
- Art. 26. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for discount on taxes.
- Art. 27. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for overdrawn accounts.

- Art. 28. To see if the town will buy the Coburn mill privilege and lot at Carthage, and raise the sum of fifty dollars for the purpose.
- Art. 29. To see how much money the town will vote and raise for Memorial Day and care of Potter or Storer and Ellis cemeteries.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to instruct the superintending school committee to arrange the number and place of schools for the ensuing year, to the best interests of the town.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to instruct the treasurer to enforce the collection of the back taxes and tax deeds due the town.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on all taxes of the 1931 commitment poll taxes excepted, paid on or before August 20, 1931.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid, December 1, 1931.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.
- Art. 35. To see how much money the town will vote and raise to cover abatements.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to instruct the treasurer to pay no money to any person until their back taxes are paid.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall, at nine thirty o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting. Given under our hands at Carthage this thirteenth day of February, A. D. 1931.

#### HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

During the past year, high school tuition has been paid for seven pupils in Dixfield High School and two in Wilton Academy. Last June, Randall Hammond was graduated from Dixfield High and Vera Smith from Wilton Academy. In September, Merna Hammond entered Dixfield High as a freshman. The other pupils in Dixfield the present school year are Lucille Berry and Alden Turner in the sophomore class; Arlene Berry and Avis Hammond in the junior; and Marguerite Hammond in the senior. Catherine Smith is a junior in Wilton Academy.

All the high school pupils are doing excellent work in their respective classes. Marguerite Hammond is doing the four years' work in three years and will be graduated next June. She is not only completing the full course in three years, but also is doing it in such a satisfactory manner that she ranks higher than any senior who is taking four years to do the requirements. The town of Carthage should feel very proud of these young people.

#### REPAIRS

The amount raised for repairs was \$300. After deducting the over-draft of last year, which was \$64.82, there remained \$235.18 for expenditures. The big expense has been for the annex to the schoolhouse at Berry Mills. This improvement was made in order to have a suit-

able place for fuel and I am glad to report that it is very satisfactory. The addition could have been made at the rear of the building at a smaller expense, but that was deemed unadvisable because it would have necessitated giving up one window of the school room and reducing the lighting facilities. By building at the front, it was necessary to do a more expensive job in the way of finish, on account of the conspicuous location and consequently an overdraft appears again this year. However, an increase in appropriation will not be required for next year because \$300 will take care of the amount overdrawn and pay for the repairs that will be made the coming summer.

A new door and blackboards were furnished for the Stickney Corner school. Because of the increase in enrollment of pupils, some more desks were needed at Berry Mills and the Newman school. This requisition was not anticipated a year ago and so no allowance was made for it in the budget. The expense of the same is responsible for a part of the overdraft. New doorsteps were built at Berry Mills. Minor repairs such as oiling floors, cleaning out toilets, and repairing windows were made at each school.

#### FINANCES

The only overdraft is the one in the repair account. The sum of the unexpended balances is \$426.92. This amount exceeds the overdraft by \$278.03.

The total budget is \$35 less than last year, because the item for insurance is omitted. It will not be necessary to raise money for this purpose as no premiums will become due during the year.

### Report of Public Health Nurse

To the Citizens of the town of Carthage, I hereby submit my first annual report as Health Nurse for the period beginning January, 1930 and ending January, 1931.

Health teaching, especially in the schools, with the aim of the prevention and cure of physical defects in children has constituted the greater part of the work. Each pupil has been twice inspected by the nurse and records kept of weight, vision, hearing, posture, condition of the teeth, throat, etc. Where symptoms of defects are found the parent is sent a slip telling just where the trouble seems to be, and referring the child to the dentist, physician or oculist as seems to be necessary. These slips have been followed when it seems necessary, by a visit by the nurse to the home, to particularly stress the importance of the needed corrections, also transportation has actually been provided so that many of those corrections could be and were done. A health program was featured by the children, followed by a box supper and dance and the proceeds of this have been used to pay for work done in needy families.

Provisions were made through the clinic department of the Maine Public Health Association so that one pupil received the tuberculosis test followed by free X-ray of chest. Another attended the clinic for diabetic patients, held at the Franklin Memorial Hospital at Farmington.

Concluding, the nurse and her committee wish to thank the teachers and pupils for their cooperation and assistance. Also we appreciate the willingness of physicians and dentists out of town who have contributed to the support of the health program.
