Warrant for Town Meeting

Franklin, ss.

To Guy C. Robbins, a constable in the town of Carthage, in said county, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Carthage, on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the support of common schools, including tuition, textbooks and supplies, schoolhouse repairs, insurance, school office expense, high school tuition and interest on school fund, including superintendence of schools.
- Art. 4. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the repair of summer roads and bridges.
- Art. 5. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for a patrol and 50-50 fund.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of state aid roads as outlined in report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of three hundred and twenty-nine dollars (\$329.00) for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third class roads.
- Art. 9. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purchase of State Aid road tools.
- Art. 10. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of plowing and sanding winter roads on routes 2 and 142.
- Art. 11. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for maintaining winter roads.

- Art. 12. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purchase of snow fence.
- Art. 13. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for cutting bushes on Routes 2 and 142.
- Art. 14. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the care of the poor.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the services of the county nurse.
- Art. 16. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for blister rust control.
- Art. 17. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for discount on taxes.
- Art. 18. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for overdrawn accounts.
- Art. 19. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for abatements.
- Art. 20. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for current expenses.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue winter road from residence of Fred Hammond over Winter Hill, so called, to the residence of C. W. Maxwell.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue winter road from Jesse Stiles' turn to the Dixfield town line.
- Art 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer with the approval of the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town charges and town debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, and to issue and negotiate the notes of the town for the money so borrowed, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate to the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year, as temporary loans to be paid during the year 1935 out of money raised during said year 1935, by taxes.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to charge interest, beginning Dec. 1 next, on all taxes remaining unpaid at time of settlement in the February following.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to instruct the superintending school committee to arrange the place and number of schools for the ensuing year, to the best interest of the town.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 3% on the 1935 commitment, poll taxes excepted, paid on or before August 20th next.

- Art. 27. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to rebuild the bridge near the Stickney Corner schoolhouse and to raise the grade of the road from said schoolhouse to the tar road.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the service of the Cooperative Health Union health officer.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the county road from Jesse H. Stiles' turn to the Dixfield town line, and instruct the selectmen to petition the county commissioners for the purpose.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to petition the county commissioners to discontinue the county road from the residence of the late D. D. Berry to the tar road, Route 142, near the Staples landing, so-called.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to petition the county commissioners to discontinue the county road from the Potter schoolhouse to Pease Corner, so-called.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

Annual Report of the South Franklin County Nursing Service

To the citizens of the Town of Carthage, I hereby submit the seventh annual report of the Nursing program rendered by the South Franklin County Nursing Service. This report covers the work done from January 1934 to January 1935.

The greater part of the work done has been in the schools, and is as follows: 46 children were given full inspection by the nurse. Of this number 34 were found with the following defects: 6 children had eye defects, 18 had dental defects and 10 throats were abnormal. 23 children had dental work done this past year, 1 child had glasses fitted and 1 child had tonsils and adenoids removed.

44 home visits were made to stress the need of correction of defects and to teach mothers the treatment of scabies and impetigo.

17 special inspections were made to the three schools for Scabies, Pedicui, and Impetigo, and in nearly all cases home visits were made.

17 children from the three schools were taken to Dental Clinic at Farmington with the following work done—60 extractions, 8 fillings and 12 cleanings.

The seven point work done in the schools consisted of 6 visits to three schools, room talks to pupils, re-inspecting underweight children, checking over Health cards for possible "7 pointers." 24 children were 7 point children this year. May we all cooperate and increase this number as much as is possible next year.

Through the cooperation of Dr. Arns of the Cooperative Health Union and the Selectmen of the town, 26 children were vaccinated and 9 children and 1 adult received the toxoid for Diphtheria prevention. At the same time 49 throats were examined and those found to be abnormal sent to their own family physician for examination.

The work outside of the schools is as follows: 1 expectant mother was visited 4 times and these visits were advisory; 6 pre-school children had 8 instructive visits for habit training and diets and daily routine; 1 baby was visited once and attended Baby Clinic; 2 Social Service patients had 5 visits—miscellaneous calls were made to Selectmen, Doctors, on behalf of patients, Board of Health and members of the School Board, and Nursing Service.

During the Summer a Pre-school and Infant Welfare Clinic was held at Berry's Mills with Dr. Sturtevant of Dixfield in attendance. 4 pre-school and 1 baby were examined by the doctor, 5 other children were weighed, measured and inspected by the nurse, but did not remain to see the doctor.

A total number of 19 trips were made to the Town at various times during the year.

The nurse expresses her appreciation to all of you who have helped to make the program so valuable to the community, may we continue and have a better service every year.
