STATE OF MAINE

To Guy C. Robbins, a constable in the town of Carthage, in said county, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Carthage, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said Carthage, on the second day of March, A D. 1936 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the support of common schools, including tuition, textooks and supplies, schoolhouse repairs, insurance, school office expense, high school tuition and interest on school fund including superintendence of schools.
- Art. 4. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the repair of summer roads and bridges.
- Art. 5. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for a patrol fund.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of state aid roads as outlined in report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1935.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of two hundred and seventy-six dollars, (\$276) for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third class roads.

- Art. 9. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purchase of State Aid road tools.
- Art. 10 To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of plowing and sanding winter road on route, 142.
- Art. 11. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for maintaining winter roads.
- Art. 12. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for cutting bushes on routes 2 and 142.
- Art. 13. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the care of the poor.
- Art. 14. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the services of the county nurse.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for blister rust control.
- Art. 16. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for discount on taxes.
- Art. 17. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for overdrawn accounts.
- Art. 18. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for abatements.
- Art. 19. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for current expenses.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to discontinue winter road from residence of Fred Hammond over Winter Hill, so called, to the residence of C. W. Maxwell.
- Art. 21. To see if town will vote to discontinue winter road from the residence of John L. Hammond over Storer Hill to Potter school house, so called.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue town road from the Alden Fuller turn to the Pettengill farm, so called.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to pay and refund its indebtedness to the Rumford Falls Trust Company, by authorizing the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen to issue and negotiate the note or notes of the town to the amount of said indebtedness,

the number, terms and conditions of said note or notes, to be determined by the selectmen.

- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town charges and town debts, in anticipation of the collection of taxes, and to issue and negotiate the notes of the town for the money so borrowed, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate to the total tax levy for the preceding municipal year, as temporary loans to be paid during the year 1936 out of money raised during said year 1936, by taxes.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to charge interest, beginning Dec. 1 next, on all taxes remaining unpaid at time of settlement in the February following.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the superintending school committee to arrange the place and number of schools for the ensuing year, to the best interest of the town.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 3% on the 1936 commitment, poll taxes excepted, paid on or before August 20th. next.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to raise the grade of the road from Stickney Corner schoolhouse to the tar road.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the service of the Cooperative Health Union health officer.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the Grange Hall, Berry Mills, in said town, at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

There has been no school in the Newman District since the end of the fourth week of the spring term because all the pupils with the exception of Chanel Cormier and Arthur Packard moved away. These boys have been attending school at Berry Mills since the suspension of the Newman School.

Miss Sharko resigned during the summer to accept a position in the Mexico School Union. The present school year we are maintaining two schools in the Berry Mills building. Mrs. Swett has the primary grades on the first floor and Mrs. Kennard the higher grades in the upper room. This arrangement is far more satisfactory than trying to accommodate all the grades in one room with one teacher. Under present conditions the teachers have time enough for individual instruction and the pupils are showing much improvement in their work.

HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

During the past year, high school tuition has been paid for one pupils in Wilton Academy, one in Mexico High School and eight in Dixfield High School. Edward Smith was graduated from Wilton Academy last June. Hubert Johnson and Clayton Swett were graduated from Dixfield High School. Alston Robbins and Vivian Robbins moved to Dixfield so it was not necessary to pay tuition for them for the full year. Louise Jepson withdrew from Mexico High School at the close of the spring term. The present school year the following pupils are registered in Dixfield High: Colby Hammond and Hersey Hammond in the sophomore class, Marion Turner in the junior, and Dorothy Berry in the senior.

REPAIRS AND EQUIPMENT

The expenditures at Stickney Corner were for book-case and repairs made on the windows. A steel book-case and window shades were purchased for the Berry Mills Schools. A fire escape from the grammar school room was built at the rear of the building. The top of the chimney at the Mills was rebuilt.

Annual Report of the South Franklin County Nursing Service

To the citizens of the Town of Carthage:

I hereby submit the eighth annual report of the Nursing Program rendered by the South Franklin County Nursing Service from January 1, 1935 to December 15, 1935.

The greater part of the work done has been for school children, either at school or at home. The work done at the school is as follows: 44 children were given full inspection by the nurse. Of this number 35 were defective. Defects were: 4 children had eye defects, 22 had dental defects; and 5 were underweight; 7 had abnormal throats. Corrections secured since last inspection were: 18 children had teeth correction, 1 child had glasses fitted, and two children gained weight under medical supervision.

The seven point work in the schools consisted of 9 visits to schools, school room talks, re-inspection of under weight children, checking over Health cards for possible "7 Pointers." One school, the Newman School, was 100 per cent Seven Point. A slight decrease in the number of "7 Pointers" over the preceding year was noted.

Six children were taken to the School Dental Clinic at Farmington with the following work done: 14 extractions; 10 fillings; 4 cleanings.

Thirty-eight home visits were made for correction of defects, and follow-up of Impetigo and Scabes.

Ten special inspections were made to the three schools for Impetigo and home visits made.

Through the cooperation of Dr. Arms of the Cooperation Health Union thirty-eight children had throat inspections and those found defective were advised to visit their own family physician for examinations. Two children were given Tuberculin Tests.

During the Summer a Pre-school and Well Baby Clinic was held at the schoolhouse at Berry's Mills with Dr. Sturtevant of Dixfield in attendance. One baby and three Preschools were weighed and measured by the nurse and given an examination by the Doctor. Nine school children had Throat examinations by Dr. Sturtevant.

The work done outside of the schools is as follows; 1 case given 3 instructive visits; 4 school children given 10 nursing visits for Impetigo, one other case one nursing visit; 4 babies had 11 Instructive visits; 5 Preschools had 12 Instructive Visits. 15 Miscellaneous calls were made to Selectmen, interested citizens, School Board and Doctors on behalf of the Service. The Nurse cooperated with the State Social Worker who was interested in two families.

A total of eighteen trips were made to the town at various times during the year.

It was with regret that the Service had to be discontinued before the year was up. This was due to lack of funds.

May we plan on an uninterrupted program this coming year?

The Nurse wishes to take this opportunity to express her appreciation to those who have helped to make her work valuable to the community.
