### Warrant for Town Meeting.

To W. Scott Bearce, Constable of the Town of Hebron, in the County of Oxford, Greeting.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hebron, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town house in said town, on Monday, the sixth day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2d. To see if the town will accept reports as printed.
- 3d. To choose a Clerk.
- 4th. To choose a Treasurer.
- 5th. To choose a Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.
- 6th. To choose a second Selectman.
- 7th. To choose a third Selectman.
- 8th. To choose a Road Commissioner.
- 9th. To choose a Supervisor of Schools.
- 10th. To choose a Superintending School Committee.
- 11th. To choose all other officers that may be necessary for the year ensuing.
- 12th. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools and repairs of

schoolhouses, the support of the poor, and the repairs of roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.

- 13th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a safe for the town house and raise money for the same.
- 14th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a piece of land and erect a building for the purpose of housing road machine and other tools belonging to the town, also for wood for town house, etc., and raise money for same.
- 15th. To see if the town will vote to exempt from paying further poll taxes all who have reached or may reach the age of 65 years.
- 16th. To see if the town will raise and give A. A. Dwinal Post the sum of ten dollars for Memorial day.
- 17th. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to erect guide boards where they may be necessary through town as required by law, and raise money for same.
- 18th. To see if the town will instruct its Superintending School Committee to hold sessions of school in districts where the number of scholars is less than the number required by law, whenever in their judgment it is thought advisable.
- 19th. To see if the town will vote and raise twenty-five dollars to pay room rent in the Academy for Dist. No. 5.
- 20th. To see what method the town will take to collect their taxes for the ensuing year.

The Selectmen will be in session at the town house on the sixth day of March at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

DISTRICT No. 2.—The spring, fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Daisy W. Cushman, who has had charge of the same school, satisfactorily, for several previous terms. The order was excellent, the pupils were studious, and all seemed ambitious to do their very best. The recitations all evidenced thoroughness, and I was especially pleased with the carefulness in reading. Miss Cushman is a faithful, competent, and conscientious teacher, who seeks to develop her pupils morally as well as mentally, and creates a spirit in the whole school which is admirable, and insures success. Especial attention was given to writing, and the teacher and scholars are to be congratulated for the good results achieved. The progress was excellent, and the parents may well feel proud of their children's penmanship. Writing is something altogether too much neglected in many schools. The pupils in this school did finely, also in composition and drawing, in which they seemed much interested. The appearance and progress of the school were satisfactory.

DISTRICT No. 3.—Only two terms were required in this district. Both the spring term of eight weeks, and the fall term of ten weeks, were taught by Miss Virginia R. Richmond. It was the smallest school in town, and most of the scholars were small, but the teacher did excellent work, adapting herself to the needs of her pupils. She possessed the necessary tact to keep them all busy and interested, and both terms were very profitable.

DISTRICT No. 4.—The spring term was taught by Miss Grace E. Bonney. She was an experienced teacher and well qualified to instruct. At both visits the scholars seemed interested in their studies, and I was pleased with the general appearance of the school. The pupils seemed well prepared in their recitations, and everything indicated a profitable term. She could have had the fall term, but preferred a school in Minot.

Miss Gertrude V. Bean had charge of the fall and winter terms. This was her first experience in teaching, but she was a good scholar, and entered upon her work with the purpose to succeed. She was faithful, ever ready to assist her pupils, and her efforts seemed to be appreciated and rewarded. I regard both terms as successful.

DISTRICT No. 5.—The school, as last year, was in the Academy building and under the same instructor, Miss Jennie W. Packard. She was reported last year, in connection with this school, as being an "excellent teacher." This reputation she still merits. We were very fortunate in securing her services for the entire school year. Everything moved along quietly, orderly and satisfactorily. Under her instruction the school was a success.

DISTRICT No. 6.—Miss Lila A. Whiting had charge of this school, spring, fall and winter, and as usual gave good satisfaction. She has been well and favorably known as a teacher in town for several years. One marked characteristic of her teaching seems to be thoroughness. I was glad to notice this, and the advancement that had been made. One little girl, hardly four years old, could read very nicely in the First Reader, and point out many states on the map.

DISTRICT No. 7.—Miss Edith A. Greenwood was the teacher of the spring and fall terms, and it was always a pleasure to visit this school. The teacher was not only well qualified for but well adapted to the school. She won the affection of her scholars, and in her quiet, easy way had complete control of the school. All were studious and seemed desirous to learn.

Miss Greenwood commenced the winter term and taught three weeks, when she was obliged to leave the school to care for a sick sister, who has since entered into rest. We were very sorry to lose so good a teacher but were very fortunate in finding so good a substitute as we did in Miss Ida W. Leslie. It was not her first experience in teaching, and she carried on the school wonderfully well.

When visited near the close there seemed to be the same interest as when under Miss Greenwood's care.

DISTRICT No. 8. Miss Agnes M. Bearce, one of our most competent and successful teachers, had charge of this school, and the work done was worthy of high commendation. We expected good, thorough work, and were not disappointed. The teacher worked hard, and the scholars well improved their time. This was evident by the promptness of their work, and the correctness of their answers in all their recitations. Satisfactory progress was made during each of the three terms.

While arithmetic, reading and grammar are considered of first importance by most teachers, writing, composition and spelling have not been neglected in the schools in this town. History and geography, too, have had a good share of attention.

It has been the purpose of your school committee and superintendent to give the schools the best of teachers, and we feel that in this we have been fortunate. All but one have had several years' experience in teaching, and have been successful. All but two were graduates of Hebron Academy, and all but one, during the fall and winter terms; most of whom, also, are residents in town.

The work of teachers is second to none in importance, and their pay is often much less than their deserts. We wish that all parents would be led to visit the schools oftener, then would they better understand what teachers have to meet, and better appreciate their efforts, and the results of such efforts. We have purposed to conduct the schools with the greatest desirable economy. We found it necessary to get quite a number of school books, writing books, and boxes of crayons, but have not exceeded the amount of money voted for that purpose.

More books will be needed at the opening of the spring terms and would recommend that not less than fifty dollars be raised for that purpose, and not less than six hundred dollars be raised for the support of schools. The two extra weeks of school, the past year, were appreciated and profitably improved.

We regard the 18 weeks school in Dist. No. 3, (Brighton Hill) as being more profitable than to have had those students transported to another district.

Twenty-five dollars being raised for insuring schoolhouses, three were insured in Wheeler's Agency, South Paris, for \$300, three years each, the cost of which was \$23.50. They are districts 2, 4 and 6.

I desire to acknowledge the kind and hearty co-operation of your Committee with the Superintendent, and as my name will not again be used for any office, I hope that my successor may be as fortunate.
