FOR

TOWN MEETING

To W. Scott Bearce, constable of the town of Hebron, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Cobb schoolhouse, in said town, Monday, the 5th day of March, next at ten o'clock, A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2d. To see if the town will accept the reports as printed.
- 3d. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 4th. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5th. To choose a chairman for the board of selectmen.
- 6th. To choose a second selectman.
- 7th. To choose a third selectman.
- 8th. To choose one member to the superintending school committee for three years.
 - 9th. To choose a road commissioner.

- 10th. To choose all other officers that may be necessary for the ensuing year.
- 11th. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for support of schools, repairs of roads and bridges, the support of the poor, repairs of schoolhouses, and to defray all other charges for the year ensuing.
- 12th. To see if the town will vote to raise ten dollars for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day expenses.
- 13th. To see if the town will allow a discount of 5 per cent on all taxes assessed for 1906, paid before Sept. 15th, 1906, and to charge 5 per cent interest on all taxes not paid before Feb. 1st, 1907.
- 14th. To see what method the town will take in regard to collecting their taxes for the ensuing year.
- 15th. To see if the town will raise \$300 to repair the schoolhouse in district No. 7.
- 16th. To see if the town will vote to raise \$300 for free high school according to school law 1903.
- 17th. To see if the town will vote to give the school committee authority to open school in district No. 2.
- 18th. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to buy a road machine.
- 19th. To see if the town will vote to abate the tax of P. V. Everett for 1905.
- 20th. To see if the town will vote to raise \$10 to help build a sidewalk at Hebron Academy.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Cobb school house on the fifth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon for correcting the list of voters.

In reporting the work of the schools for the year 1905, I can say that the progress of the pupils has been very good, and although in one or two instances the advancement was not quite what I desired it to be, on the whole, pupils, teachers and parents have labored together to make our schools better, and I think they have reached a higher standard than last year.

The teachers have been active, wide awake and interested in their work, and with hardly an exception have worked in harmony with the pupils, thus securing the best results.

I am very glad to be able to say that the parents have evinced more interest this year than last. They have visited the schools more, and, although we should be glad to see them much oftener, we feel gratified at this change for the better, and I hope their interest will grow with each succeeding year, as this will greatly benefit our schools; and the better schools we have the better citizens there will be in the years to come.

This year Isabelle Benson, Henry Sturtevant, Walter Jasper, Gerald Saunders, Frank Bradford, Bennie Sturtevant, Louis Martin, John Carroll and Lennie Carroll have not been absent one-half day from school for the entire year, and the average attendance this year is much higher than last. We have been able this year to have twenty-eight instead of twenty-six weeks schooling, and I sincerely hope that next year it will be possible to have thirty.

There has been a noticeable improvement in reading in all the schools. This is due in a large part to the new readers which have been placed in every school in town. Give the children the best books there are, if you expect them to do the best work they are capable of. The work in arithmetic has especially pleased me, as it has been extra good. There are several schools in town that should feel proud of the work done in this branch, as I think it would be hard to find their equal, of the same age, in even a graded city school.

The school rooms are well cared for, warm, light and cheerful. The school property has been carefully looked after, and parents should impress it upon their children to take as good care of their school books, as of the ones in their own homes.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

At the spring term of Hebron Academy, fourteen high school pupils attended from town. In the summer term thirteen and in the fall term fourteen have availed themselves of the privilege of attending this institution, and judging from the classes I have visited I feel justified in saying that these pupils have received much more benefit than from an ordinary free high school, such as we could have provided.

TEXT BOOKS.

This year the following new books have been placed in our schools, 130 Jones Readers of the different grades, 24 Montgomery Histories, 6 Spellers to replace worn out ones, 6 Principle Agriculture, 10 dozen writing books, 2 dozen spelling blanks. As will be seen, I was obliged to overdraw the appropriation a little, but it will be remembered we have been behind on our books for two years. Parents must not expect their children to obtain as good results from poor books as from the best ones. A workman to do a good job must have good material to work with. The coming year there should be new Geographies, Spellers and Physiologies. The physiologies have been in use 15 years or more, and are far from being what is needed in our schools. Books, like garments, wear out, and must be replaced by new ones. I have carefully labelled and numbered all the books in town and made a record of them.

REPAIRS.

With the exception of outside painting and the house in the Nelson district, No. 7 all the school houses are in good repair. More black-boards are needed in two schools, and a little inside painting, district No. 6 needs a new stoye.

It seems advisable to your School Board and Superintendent to open a school in district No. 2, Sodom, next spring. Of course this will make it necessary to raise more money for support of schools if you wish to have 28 or 30 weeks schooling.

The school house in district No. 7 should be repaired thoroughly as it is in very poor condition.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In order to supply experienced teachers, buy necessary text books and make needful repairs, your School Board have voted to recommend the following appropriations:
