Warrant for Town Meeting

To W. Scott Bearce, Constable of the town of Hebron, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town, Monday, the 6th day of March, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m., then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2d. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.
- 3d. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 4th. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5th. To choose a chairman for the board of selectmen.
- 6th. To choose a second selectman.
- 7th. To choose a third selectman.
- 8th. To choose a board of assessors for the ensuing year.
- 9th. To choose a board of overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.
 - 10th. To choose a truant officer for the ensuing year.
- 11th. To see if the town will choose a road commissioner for the term of one or three years.
- 12th. To choose one member of the superintending school committee for three years.
- 13th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909,

relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1911.

- 14th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400.00, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.
- 15th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of town schools for the ensuing year.
- 16th. To see if the town will vote to raise \$75.00 for free High school according to the school laws of 1903.
- 17th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Poor for the ensuing year.
- 18th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay Town Officers' salaries.
- 19th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer roads and bridges.
- 20th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for winter roads.
- 21st. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10 for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day expenses.
- 22d. To see what method the town will take in regard to collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
- 23d. To see what action the town will take to authorize its Superintending School Committee to contract with and pay the trustees of Hebron Academy for the tuition of its high school scholars at said Academy for the academic year beginning September 1911, in accordance with the provision of Section 62, Chapter 15, Revised Statutes of 1903.
- 24th. To see if the town will vote to instruct its treasurer by the consent of the Selectmen to hire money.
- 25th. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Superintending School Committee to join with either or any of the following towns, to wit: Buckfield and Hartford, for the purpose of employing a Superintendent of Schools in accordance with the provisions of Sections 40 to 45, inclusive, of Chapter 15, of the Revised Statutes.

26th. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing year.

27th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$232.50 to pay for new road machine bought last June.

28th. To see if the town will vote that hereafter the retiring School Committee shall engage the teachers for the spring term.

29th. To see what money the town will raise to exterminate the brown-tail moth.

30th. To see if the town will vote to elect a revaluation committee 31st. To see what disposal the town will make of the \$200.00 now in treasury raised last year to pay the valuation committee.

32d. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Grange Hall on the sixth day of March 1911, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for correcting the list of voters.

The town does not raise money enough to fix the roads as they ought to be, for it costs more to keep the roads up in shape now than it did ten years ago,—help being higher and more power vehicles to tear the roads up after they are fixed, and especially in a dry season.

Now I would recommend raising \$1,100.00 for roads and bridges and \$200,00 for bushes.

I have given the Selectmen itemized bills of all work done in town the past year so they know what it has cost.

Report of

Superintendent of Schools

In spite of many handicaps your schools are now in better condition than they were a year ago. There were several weak teachers during the spring term and their pupils did not make satisfactory progress. But in September the No. 4 school which was in very poor condition was taken in hand by Mrs. Ramsdell who gave the kind of service which Hebron would be fortunate to secure con-She made an excellent school out of it and her work has been ably continued by Miss Tibbetts. Miss Pugsley did the same service in the fall term for No. 3, and succeeded herself in the winter. The school made excellent progress under her instruction. was a very weak school in the spring term, but Miss Sturtevant gave excellent service there in the fall term and did much to make it a better school. The other schools were all in better condition during the spring term, but have without exception developed during the other terms. It is to be hoped that the teachers now in service will in most cases be retained for the sake of continuity, even though the spring term be made thereby more expensive than the corresponding term of last year.

Your pupils have had two weeks more of schooling than previously—namely 30 weeks. This is a full month more than the State law requires, and compares very favorably with what other towns are doing.

At the opening of the year the schools were in need of new books and of more books. Another defect was that the books in use were not uniform, but many different primers and readers were in use. Much has been done toward putting the same line of supplementary readers into all the schools, and efficiency and economy will result if this principle of uniformity of text books can be carried farther.

Much has been accomplished, especially in No. 4 and No. 3, toward grading the pupils more effectively. There is need, however, of more and continued efforts in this direction.

There is a fundamental weakness in your school system which should be eradicated as soon as possible. It has probably never been more completely illustrated than this year when your Superintendent's hours of activity in following his own profession at Hebron Academy have been the identical hours needed for the effective performance of his duties as your Superintendent. It is not always true to that degree, but it is always inevitable that there shall be a conflict of interests which seriously handicaps your Superintendent and lessens much his usefulness so long as he accepts the duties of your office in addition to his own. The only way to avoid this is to join with other towns in securing a man of ability to give his entire time to the schools of the towns making the arrangement. Your retiring Superintendent most strongly urges this action.
