WARRANT

*To Fred A. Small, a Constable of the Town of Searsport in the
County of Waldo,* GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required by law to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Searsport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town hall, in said town, Monday, the 7th day of March, 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will accept the report of the selectmen and assessors as printed.

Art. 4. To see if the town will accept the report of the superintendent of schools as printed.

Art. 5. To see if the town will accept the report of the auditor of town accounts as printed.

Art. 6. To choose three or more selectmen.

Art. 7. To choose assessors of taxes.

Art. 8. To choose overseers of the poor.

Art. 9. To choose a town treasurer.

Art. 10. To choose an auditor of town accounts, and budget committee.

Art. 11. To choose constables.

Art. 12. To choose surveyors of sawed lumber.

Art. 13. To choose surveyors of wood and bark.

Art. 14. To choose surveyors of spars and timber.

Art. 15. To choose a fire ward.

Art. 16. To choose fence viewers.

Art. 17. To choose sealers of leather.

Art. 18. To choose viewers and cullers of hoops and staves.

Art. 19. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the free high school.

Art. 20. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of common schools.

Art. 21. To see how much money the town will raise for the superintendent of schools.

Art. 22. To see how much money the town will raise for textbooks and supplies for schools.

Art. 23. To see how much money the town will raise for the repairs of schoolhouses.

Art. 24. To choose a member of the school committee to serve three years.

Art. 25. To see if the town will raise \$1855. to pay \$1000. on the principal and \$855. yearly interest on the \$20,000. borrowed to build the new schoolhouse, or how much.

Art. 26. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the Carver Memorial Library.

Art. 27. To see how much money the town will raise for general government and incidentals.

Art. 28. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 29. To see how much money the town will raise for the repairs of highways and bridges, and how much to allow per hour for labor.

Art. 30. To see how much money the town will raise for patrol maintenance.

Art. 31. To see how much money the town will raise for winter breaking, and how much to allow per hour for labor.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 33. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600. for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 34. To see if the town will raise \$672. for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads as required under Sections 43 to 47, inclusive, of Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, as amended by Chapter 151, Public Laws, 1931, or how much.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to maintain the present hose companies, and if so, how much to allow for labor per hour or year or both, and how much money it will raise therefor.

Art. 36. To see how much money the town will raise for the repairs and construction of sewers.

Art. 37. To see how much money the town will raise for a Memorial Service.

Art. 38. To see how much money the town will raise to gravel and maintain State aid roads.

Art. 39. To see how much money the town will raise for the use of hydrants.

Art. 40. To see if the town will take of the Central Maine Power Co. the incandescent electric street lights located, at a cost not to exceed fifteen dollars per light per year, and how much money it will raise therefor.

Art. 41. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to install and maintain an electric street light on the westerly end of West Main Street at a cost not to exceed \$12.00 a year.

.....t. 42. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to install and maintain an electric street light on Church Street, near Fred Smith's residence, at a cost not to exceed \$12.00 a year.

Art. 43. To vote whether the town will instruct the superintending school committee to continue the North Searsport School, as it will be otherwise closed according to Chapter 19, Section 2.

Art. 44. To see if the town will accept the list for jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.

Art. 45. To see how much money the town will raise for sidewalk repairs.

Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200. more or less to coöperate with the Maine Forest Service and Federal Government in the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town.

Art. 47. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow from the Merrill Trust Company of Bangor, Maine, as a temporary loan or temporary loans to and for the use of the Town of Searsport in anticipation of the taxes of the current municipal year of 1932, sums of money in the aggregate not exceeding twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00); and authorize the treasurer of the town to execute the negotiable note or notes of the town therefor, payable within said municipal year from moneys raised by taxation therein and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said treasurer and the selectment of said town.

Art. 48. To see if the town will authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to borrow money on temporary loans for current expenses.

Art. 49. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to pay no bills against the town to persons who owe the town for taxes.

Art. 50. To see if the town will allow discount for taxes and how much money it will raise therefor, or charge interest and how much.

Art. 51. To choose a tax collector.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the selectmen's office on Thursday, the 3rd day of March, 1932, at two o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters. Given under our hands at Searsport, A. D. 1932.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Searsport:

This year has been one of economy. There seemed to be many changes in the teaching force, due to various reasons, and therefore the total amount for teachers' salaries is less. These teachers have put forth their best efforts to do the work as it should be; however, another year will be an improvement as they will profit from their first year's experience.

The school at North Searsport has been maintained as by vote of the town. The enrollment was only eight. The attendance has been very good but the average attendance is less than eight, therefore the matter will have to be voted on at town meeting to see whether this school shall be kept open.

The basement floor in the new building was given an extra coat of cement. Mr. Partridge, the contractor, did the work for nothing and the town furnished the material. This, with the grading that was done, has kept the floor free from water. I hope that we can have enough money to finish the work of grading. This will be beneficial in more ways than one, as when it rains much mud is brought in and the children need the playground. These facts, together with the looks of the building, are sufficient to have the work done.

The Mt. Ephraim School building has been repaired. It was found that new floor timbers had to be laid and a new hardwood floor was installed. The inside of the building was painted and the building leveled up.

An oil burner has been tried out in the new building. We do not know what it cost to heat the same building with coal, but we can compare with the High School. You will see that the coal bill for the High School was \$440, while the oil bill for the new building was \$349. These buildings are not the same, but the cubical air content in one differs very little from the other; one is built of brick and the other of wood. There are 96 pupils in the new building and 109 in the High School. We have paid \$8 a month for the use of the new burner or \$96 for the year. This rent money can be applied toward the price of the burner and we continue to pay for it in rent money at the same rate, or we can purchase it outright, or it can be taken out and we lose the \$96 paid in rent. The heat in the new building has been very satisfactory. The budget allows us to continue paying for it in rent.

We have been able to save money in transportation, as the route to the Park School was discontinued as there were no pupils to transport. There has been a saving in other routes, as the contracts were let for less money in some cases.

The spelling books have been changed and brought up to date as well as the fifth grade geographies; some of the sixth grade geographies have been changed as the old ones were well worn out. Next year we hope to be able to continue this as well as upper grade reading material. The sixth grade histories are very old. Therefore, there is not much chance to get along with less money for textbooks.

New globes have been purchased, so that each rural school is so equipped as well as the Junior High and the sixth grade. These have been long needed.

The fire escape at the High School is not safe and should be replaced by an iron one, as a wooden fire escape will burn and therefore might not be any escape at all.

A piano was presented to the new building, which has been a very valuable asset to our school. Music plays a large part in our educational system and I hope that the time is not far off when it

can be included in all of our schools. I am sure that everyone joins me in expressing thanks to the party that was so interested in our schools to make the piano possible.

The average costs of maintaining the schools are as follows: Rural Schools, \$35.13 per pupil for the year; in the grades, \$43.02, and the High School was \$71.48 per student.

I fully realize the year has been a very trying one in every respect, but the education of our young is the most important task that we have. To make children pay in the future for our neglect is the one thing that must not happen. History always repeats itself and there must be better times ahead.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

*To the Superintendent of Schools, the School Committee, and the
Citizens of Searsport:*

I respectfully submit this report of the High School for the past year.

The present enrollment is 45 girls and 23 boys. The Junior High School has a registration of 16 girls and 19 boys.

The record of attendance this year has been exceptionally good. For this, the parents and pupils should be commended. Without such regular attendance, it is impossible to do satisfactory work. Our work is divided into three divisions.

In the Commercial Course, which has the largest enrollment, Mrs. McCaslin is giving practical instruction which will be of great value to the boy or girl after leaving High School. It is not necessary for anyone to attend school later on in order to profit by this work. The knowledge gained in this course can be applied to the everyday life. For instance, the work in Junior Business Training and Bookkeeping teaches the use of business forms, and the fundamental principles of debit and credit with which every citizen should be familiar.

The Classical Course is designed to meet College entrance requirements. This work is an essential part of our curriculum. It includes two years of Algebra, and one year of Plane Geometry; four years of Latin, and three years of French; one year of Chemistry, or Physics, preferably both; two years of History, and the four years of English, required of all students before graduating. Mrs. Wilson has been highly successful in developing the English work.

The Scientific Course is a modification of the Classical. It is designed to meet the needs of those who do not desire either of the others.

Last summer shelves were made in the little room on the stairs. This was done with the idea of placing some books and magazines there for the use of the boys and girls. Funds, however, were not available, so this has not been done yet. I hope that it will be possible to start this activity soon, however.

Last spring all of the boys and girls competed in a state-wide scholarship contest conducted by the Department of Education at the University of Maine. The interest was keen. Twenty-two from our school were chosen as our representatives to a district contest in May. Geneva Littlefield, Winifred Howard, Edith Porter, Frances Kuceland, Hope Williams and Katherine Scribner were listed among the winners in their respective groups.

Our Annual Interscholastic Speaking Contest was held last May. Both first prizes were won by the local school, Virginia Trundy winning for the girls and George Frame for the boys. Plans are now being perfected for another contest next spring.

For the past several years, we have felt the need of musical training in the schools. A group of interested citizens have now assumed the responsibility of raising the money to support and train the boys and girls on orchestral instruments. Already Mr. Lloyd McKeen of Belfast, the leader, has held five classes. About 30 are staying for this practice once a week, after the regular school work. This indicates that a great deal of interest is being shown.

Few parents avail themselves of the opportunity to visit school. The teachers in the High School wish that more might do so. Such visits serve to quicken the interests of both pupils and teachers.

Mr. Wright has aided me very much in maintaining discipline in the building. He has also been of inestimable help in our athletic work.

I wish to thank Mr. Read, the School Committee, and all of the citizens who are helping to make this year pleasant and profitable.
