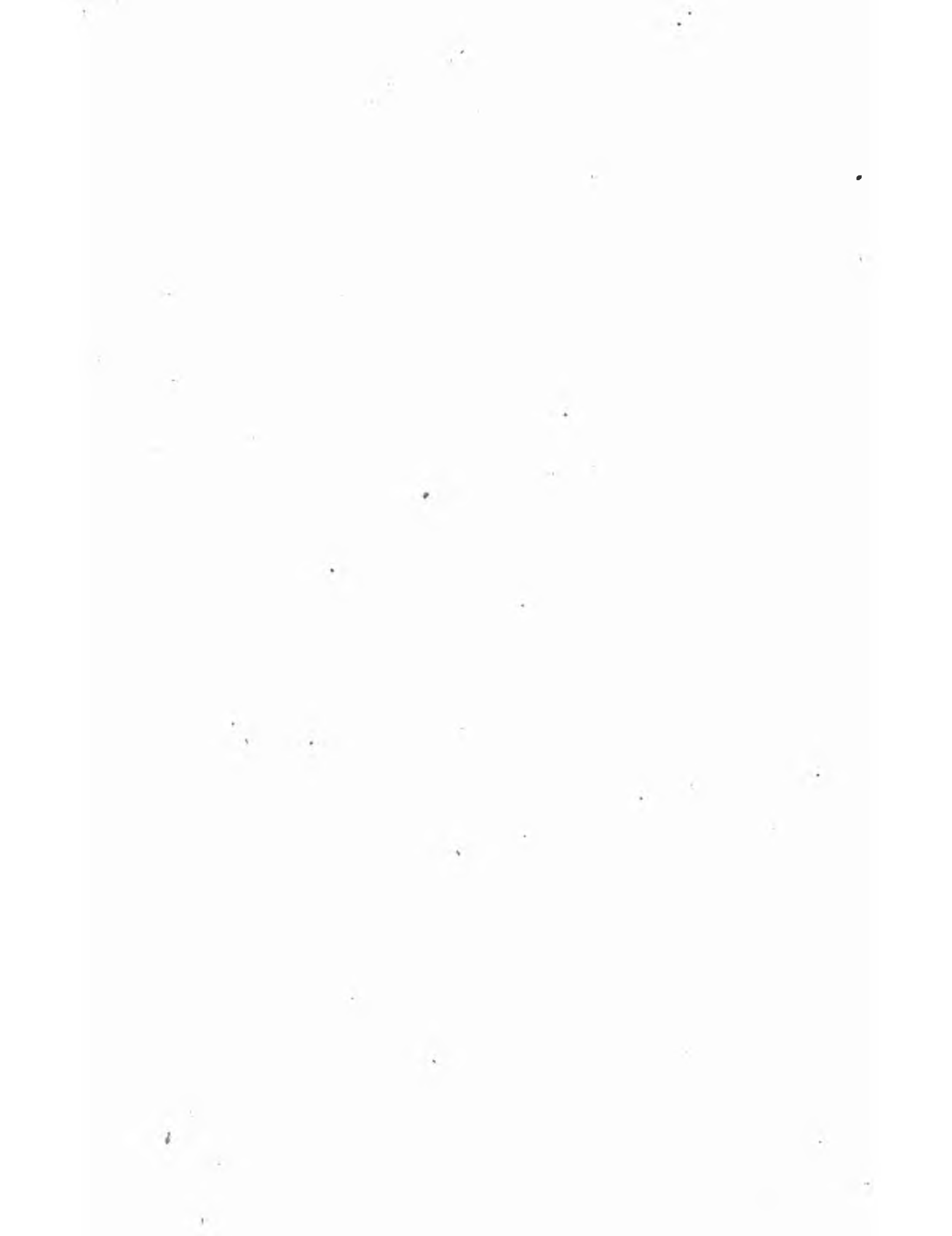

In district No 3, spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Pansy Emery of Sherman with good success. The winter term was taught by Miss Essie Sawyer of Linneus. The attendance at the winter term was small but those that attended school made good progress.

The spring term in No 4 was taught by Miss Effie Emery of Sherman. Miss Emery is well known as a successful teacher. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Alta Hunter of Houlton. Miss Hunter is a good teacher and worked faithfully in the school room, but the school was too small to bring out the best work of a teacher.

The school in district No 5 was taught in spring and fall by Miss Lillie Friend of Sedgwick. Miss Friend has had charge of this school for several terms and has brought it up to be one of the best schools in town. The winter term was taught by Mr Eddie Roberts of Sherman. Mr Roberts possesses good ability as a teacher and made the term a successful one.

In district No 6, the three terms were taught by Miss Bessie Kneeland of Sherman. Miss Kneeland labored faithfully in the school room and without doubt the scholars

made good progress.

In district No 7. the spring term was taught by Miss Lena Kneeland of Sherman. Miss Kneeland has been successful in her teaching. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Myrtle Connor of Silver Ridge. Miss Connor is a bright young teacher and with experience will rank well.
