Report of the Superintendent of Schools

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF HEBRON:

It gives me great pleasure to submit my third report for your consideration.

Our schools have been in charge of earnest, faithful teachers and good and efficient work of a high order has been accomplished.

There has been a marked improvement in reading, spelling and history work in nearly every school. Drawing has been taught in four of our six schools and the work used to make the rooms more home-like. Our teachers have secured many exhibits of corn, wool, cotton, hemp, silk, rubber, wheat and oil products to stimulate the interest and help cultivate the spirit of investigation on the part of the pupils. The lessons in practical hygiene have been of great value. The Alders Academy and Sodom have been very active in this line of work.

LENGTH OF SCHOOL YEAR.

Our short year is due to the failure of the town to raise the sum for the support of schools recommended by our Committee and the loss of the Equalization fund from the State.

I trust the town will make it possible to have a school year of at least thirty-three weeks this year.

CONVEYANCE.

The cost of conveying the children from Dist. No. 8 to the Academy School has been one hundred fifty-five dollars, or five and 34-100 dollars per week, and the cost of a school in Dist. No. 8 would have been eight or nine dollars per week.

However, there are features of conveyance other than the mere cost to be considered and I hope that the town will vote to maintain a school and give the Committee permission to establish a school should they deem it wise to do so.

TEXT BOOKS.

We have introduced the Hick's Champion Speller and the Palmer Method in Penmanship. Both are giving excellent satisfaction and our text books are with the exception of our Arithmetics in good condition.

I think that an appropriation of one hundred fifty dollars will be sufficient to amply supply our pupils for next year.

REPAIRS.

A new shed was built in the Sodom District, containing two closets with concrete vaults and a fine woodshed. The Alders building has been painted two coats inside and out and a new flag and stove purchased.

The Brighton Hill building will need some repairs next year in addition to a coat of paint. The Center building should receive one coat of paint. The Nelson building needs shingling.

SECONDARY SCHOOL PUPILS.

It is a matter of pride to every citizen of Hebron that this town has twenty-seven pupils taking secondary school work. This number is over four per cent. of the town's population, one of the highest in Maine, the State average being about two per cent. The people of Hebron are to be congratulated upon this excellent condition of educational affairs.

REPORT TO THE UNION DISTRICT.

Our work has been carried on with a keen desire to make the most of resources at our command and to promote the welfare, advance the interest and secure the true education of our children.

This year we have had the opportunity of testing the efficiency of the new law for the certification of teachers. Under the provisions of the law all teachers must hold either temporary permits or regular certificates issued by the State.

Certificates are granted upon satisfactory examination to teachers who have graduated from an approved Secondary School or who have had an equivalent fitting and to teachers of two years' service and satisfactory fitness.

In the opinion of your Superintendent this law has had two effects in Districts like ours. It has made the experienced teacher more difficult to obtain at the salary formerly paid. Second, the small rural schools are obtaining a better class of teachers, as all must have a full four years of secondary school training and discipline and pass the State examination before receiving a certificate.

This is leading to a more careful consideration of the review of elementary school subjects in the secondary schools and many of our Senior class girls are coming to regard this as one of the best features of the fourth year's work.

Sometimes the efficiency of a school system is judged by the per cent. of pupils that try to secure a secondary school education.

I have found very gratifying conditions and submit them to you. The per cent. of secondary school attendance based on the census of 1910 and our pupils of 1915-16 is: Buckfield, 3 1-2 per cent.; Hartford, 2 1-2 per cent. and Hebron 4 1-2 per cent. The average of the State is about 2 per cent., of cities like Lewiston a little more than 1 per cent., like Portland, 2 1-2 per cent., showing that our present rural school system with all its faults and handicaps is still doing good work.

The condition of school property has been improved from year to year and the good work accomplished this year in the interior of the school building by the judicious use of paint, paper and pictures has been an inspiration to all who have come in contact with the work.

Many towns are now taking advantage of the aid offered by the State to secure a teacher of Domestic Science and Manual Training. The State offers to pay two-thirds of the salary of such teachers. Our towns are already partaking of State aid in the support of common and high schools and in the building of State roads.

The towns could readily meet the expense by a united movement employing a teacher for the District.

This would mean a small equipment in order to carry on the work, but this district is helping to pay for the privilege that many other towns are enjoying and I can see no good reason why our children should not partake of this offer and its advantages. I trust the citizens will consider this matter very carefully.

12th To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

13th To see if the town will vote to dissolve the union school district of Buckfield, Hartford and Hebron, and elect a superintendent of schools for Hebron.

14th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the salary of the superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

15th To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay for collecting its taxes for 1916.

16th To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

17th To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for free high schools according to the school laws of 1903.

18th To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of ten dollars for A. A. Dwinal Post for memorial expenses.

19th To see if the town will vote to provide door and window screens for all the schoolhouses in town and raise money for same.

20th To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor, town officers' bills, miscellaneous account, snow bills, summer work on roads and bridges, cutting bushes, and brown-tail moths.

21st To see if the town will vote to instruct its treasurer by the written consent of the selectmen to hire money for use of the town.

22nd To choose one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise money for same.

23rd To see if the town will vote to instruct the school committee to hold a school in Dist. No. 8 for 1916. The selectmen will be in session at the Grange Hall on the sixth day of March, 1916, at nine o'clock, A. M., for correcting the list of voters.
