TOWN WARRANT

Waldo, ss.

State of Maine.

To J. R. Davis, Constable of the Town of Searsport, in the said County. Greeting.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Searsport, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, said Town, Monday the 13th day of March, 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will accept the annual report of the muncipal officers.

Art. 4. To choose Town officers for the ensuing year, viz: Three selectmen, three assessors of Taxes, three Overseers of the Poor, a town treasurer, a member of the School Board to serve three years, a Budget Committee, Constables, Surveyors of sawed lumber, surveyors of wood and bark, surveyors of spars and timber, fence viewers, sealers of leather, viewers and cullers of hoops and staves, and a Fire Ward.

Art. 5. To see what commission the Town will vote to pay for collecting taxes for the ensuing year or act anything thereon. Art. 6. To elect a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of Taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deduct a certain part of money due any person and apply this amount on taxes due from said person. If so, to fix the amount to be deducted; also to have the foreman in charge of work to have all men to agree to same. The above applies to any and all kinds of work done for the Town also to any and all kinds of materials sold to the Town.

Art. 9. To see how much money the Town will raise for the support of the Free High School.

Art. 10. To see how much money the Town will raise for the support of the Common Schools.

Art. 11. To see how much money the Town will raise for the Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 12. To see how much money the Town will raise for Text Books and Supplies for the Schools.

Art. 13. To see how much money the Town will raise for the repairs of School-houses, insurance, lights, truancy, tuition, equipment and census.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will raise \$1,500.00 to pay \$1,000.00 on the principal and \$540.00 yearly interest on the \$12,000.00 of School house bonds outstanding or how much. Art. 15. To see how much the Town will raise for the support of the Carver Memorial Library.

Art. 16. To see how much the Town will raise for General Government and incidentals.

Art. 17. To see how much the Town will raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 18. To see how much the Town will raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges and how much to allow for labor.

Art. 19. To see how much the Town will raise for Patrol Maintenance.

Art. 20. To see how much the Town will raise for Winter Breaking.

Art. 21. To see what sum the Town will appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Highways and Bridges) under provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the Provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will raise \$970.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads as required under Sections 44 and 46, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 as amended by Sections 4 and 5, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to maintain the present Hose Company and if so, how much money it will raise therefor. Art. 24. To see how much money the Town will raise for the repairs and construction of Sewers.

Art. 25. To see how much money the Town will raise for the Decoration of the Soldiers Graves on Memorial Day and care for the Monument Lot.

Art. 26. To see how much money the Town will raise for the use of Hydrants.

Art. 27. To see how much money the Town will raise for Electric Street Lights.

Art. 28. To see how much money the Town will raise for the repair of Sidewalks.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and the School Board to employ residents of the Town, and to buy their goods from merchants of the Town when available. (By petition).

Art. 30. To see if the voters will grant the Schools free use of Town Hall, under Teachers supervision, for all school activities. (By petition).

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road leading from the termination of Trundy Road to Bangor and Aroostook Railroad Station, as now located. (Petition).

Art. 32. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for land damages levied if any, by Bangor Investment Company relative to acceptance of extension of Trundy Road.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for maintenance of extension of Trundy Road to Bangor and Aroostook Railroad Station or act anything thereon. Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to put a Street Light on Leach Street at the Captain Sweetser Road.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to repair and make the necessary changes on the Fire House to house the Fire Engine, Tractor, Road Machine, and Selectmen's Office, or act anything thereon.

Art. 36. To see if the sum of \$108.00 will be raised for School Nursing in the Town of Searsport, to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health and Welfare of the State Department of Health and Welfare.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$50.00 for the repair of the Harbor Hose House.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the repair of the Loop Road in North Searsport.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will raise \$100.00 for Publicity.

Art.40. To see if the Town will raise \$200.00 for construction of West Main Street Sidewalk or act anything thereon.

Art. 41. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Special Resolve maintenance.

Art. 42. To see how much money the Town will raise for the repair of the Wharf.

Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow, as tempory loans · or loan to and for the use of the Town of Searsport in anticipation of the Taxes of the current municipal year 1939, sums of money in the aggregate not exceeding twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00); and authorize the Treasurer of the Town to execute the negotiable note or notes of the Town therefor, payable within said municipal year from moneys rased by taxation therein and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to said Treasurer and the Selectmen of said Town.

Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Fire Truck with pump and Booster Tank, and how much money it will raise therefor, or act anything thereon. (By petition).

Art. 45. To see if the Town will vote to erect and maintain a street light at the head of Bay View Place. (By petition).

Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Turnpike, so called, from Percy Partridges to Bert Dunovers.

Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Black Road from the Pest House, so called, to the County Road, and from the Stairs Hill Road to the Harry P. Robie Place, or act anything thereon.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Selectmen's office on Thursday, the 9th day of March, 1939, at two o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

Feb. 13, 1939.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Searsport, Maine:

This is to certify that I have audited the accounts of your Selectmen, Treasurer, and Collector for the muncipal year ended February 5, 1939. The cash balance of your Treasurer was reconciled, as well as the uncollected balance of taxes.

The schedules submitted herewith are taken from your town records and to the best of my knowledge and belief reflect the true financial condition of your town. The schedule entitled "Payments," under "Items of Charity and Correction" you will note shows that the amount of \$6,293.18 was spent for relief, where the appropriation for this account was \$5,000.00, with receipts of \$10.00 only. While there is in this account items amounting to \$493.47 that ought to be paid by other towns or by the State, this shows a large overdraft and also a sum quite out of proportion to the size of the town expended upon this account. Some projects taking care of part of this relief should be started.

The Cemetery Association funds, namely the Cemetery Interest Reserve and the B. F. Pendleton Lot, should be transferred to the Associations themselves and not left in charge of the town, as I understand these are subject to the Associations' direction and not any town official.

More care should be exercised by the town officials in keeping proper records, as it was very difficult to make a true audit. It also should be understood by all town officials that the credit of the town cannot be loaned or extended to anyone, even though it may be for the betterment of the town.

It is good to note that the financial condition of the town is very good and the officials are to be commended in their showing of an increase in their surplus amounting to approximately \$2,600.00, even though their cash balance decreased about \$2,000.00. The method of appropriations for departmental expenditures is excellent and should be carried out likewise in the future, as it is never safe to draw on the surplus account.

I wish to take this opportunity of thanking your town officials for their fine cooperation during the audit.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Searsport:

You will note that the North Searsport School has an enrollment of only six at the present time. There are twoin the eighth grade and I have been informed there are no children to begin school next Fall; if the same condition remains this would leave only four pupils for next year. The average attendance, for the Fall Term was only 5.6 pupils; this being less than eight will make a vote at Town meeting necessary to continue the school. Another fact about attendance is that the enrollment for the Mt. Ephraim School has dropped from 19 last year to 10 this year. There are also two pupils in the eighth grade this year. With business conditions as they are it seems that living on small farms is almost impossible. Families are locating where there is a possibility of getting a few days of work. When the new road is completed to North Searsport it would seem advisable to transport the children from these two schools into town. Some might think that the distance is too great but from the report of the State Commissioner of Education, I notice that the State is doing more and more transportation; in some cases they are transporting seventeen miles daily. They also advocate that the cost of transportation is much less when the bus is owned by the town. This matter is worthy of careful consideration as the cost per pupil is very high for small schools, and the work accomplished much less.

The repair work for the last year has been in the main as follows: At the Park School two more windows have been added, new hardwood floors laid, the moving of a partition so that the wood can be stored in the school house, the two posts for support in the school room were removed and a truss was installed, the room was painted inside; the chimney at the High School was taken down to the floor of the second story and relaid; the top of the chimney at the Mt. Ephraim School was taken down and relaid; half of the grates for the boiler at the Central School were replaced.

Next year, we hope to put lights in the Park and Nichols School buildings, install drinking fountains at the High School and Central building; also replaced some of the old blackboards at the High School and the Nichols; the chimney at the Porter will have to be relaid, there are also a few other minor repairs to be made.

The report from the State Bureau of Health shows that the work in Searsport consists of the inspection of new entrants, 20 defects found, 5 corrections made, 26 visits in homes, 35 hours devoted to school work and 38 hours more to be made during the rest of the school year. The North Searsport School was given tuberculin tests and all were negative.

The State School bulletin gives the average school rate for the State as .01270, while the average of municipal rates is .05732. Searsport's school rate is given as .01341 and the municipal rate of .060. We did not receive any equalization money from the state although we were slightly above the average. The average costs of maintaining the schools are as follows: Rural schools \$46.70 per pupil enrollment; Graded Schools \$46.79; High School \$94.95 per student. Or \$55.44 per pupil if the total cost is divided by the number of pupils enrolled in all the schools. These figures include all departments.

I fully realize what it means to keep all things as we would like them but I hope that all feel how important the schools are and I wish to thank the people of Searsport for the interest and cooperation shown in this matter.

Report of High School Principal

To The Superintending School Committee and The Superintendent of Schools:

My annual report as Principal of Searsport High School will be but a summary of what has been accomplished in the past year and of what we are looking forward to in the future.

Even though our enrollment may be smaller than in some other years, the quality of work being done is as high now as then. The morale of the school is good. Verlie Smith, our only graduate of last year to attend college is making a fine record at The University of Tennessee.

This year we are trying to improve the use of the weekly assembly period by asking interested people to give short talks upon phases of life which may be of interest to them. Thus far we have hear Lincoln Colcord, Philip Annas, Principal of Crosby High School, Mrs. Ida Duncan, and Dr. Verne Rice. In the near future we hope to have the district health nurse, member of the state highway police department, the county agent, and others visit us. These assemblies are opened with devotional exercises, salute to the flag, and singing a patriotic song.

Last December, Colonel and Mrs. Frederic Black presented a piano to the school. The old one had been condemned as it was no longer fit for use. With this piano, assembly planning has been easier and the programs more attractive.

Lincoln Colcord has given to the school a set of eight books on nature study. These are proving to be useful as reference works. New equipment purchased this year include a new Webster's Unabridged Dictionary with a supporting rack, thirty-seven new books for the school library; these include works of fiction, travel, history, and biography; new laboratory equipment and supplies, as well as a new rotary Ditto machine. The old one had been giving unsatisfactory service; this fact made the purchase of a new machine necessary.

The School band which was conducted by Mr. Achorn, has been discontinued. Lack of student interest and parental support made this action advisable. Mr. Achorn plans to continue with individual instruction with the reed section however.

The district Health Nurse visited the school this winter and checked the health records of all pupils in the 7th and 8th grades. She also had individual conferences with several boys and girls in the High School.

Last June, the graduating class took a two day trip to Boston, visiting points of historical and current interest. The present senior class is looking forward to a similar trip. Plans are now being completed for a senior class play, the proceeds to be used for that purpose.

Plans for the annual interscholastic speaking contest are also progressing. This programme has become one of the high spots of the school year. We expect our graduation this year to take the form of a playlet. This will be an opportunity for nearly every boy and girl in school to take part.

The athletic program is practicaly as last year. Baseball and track will be participated in this spring.
