WARRANT

To F. L. Whitcomb, a Constable of the Town of Searsport, in the County of Waldo, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Searsport, in said county, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the 9th day of March, A. D. 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will accept the Annual Report of the Municipal Officers as printed.
- Art. 4. To see what compensation the Town will vote to pay the various town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose and elect Town Officers for the ensuing year, viz: Three Selectmen, three Assessors of Taxes, three Overseers of the Poor, a Town Treasurer, to elect a Member of the School Board to serve for three years, a Budget Committee, a Road Commissioner, Constables, Surveyors of Sawed Lumber, Surveyors of Wood and Bark, Surveyors of Spars and Timber, Fence Viewers, Sealers of Leather, Viewers and Cullers of Hoops and Staves, and a Fire Ward.

- Art. 6. To elect a Tax Collector.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 8. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Free High School.
- Art. 9. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Common Schools.
- Art. 10. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 11. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for textbooks and supplies, for the schools.
- Art. 12. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for repairs, insurance, lights, truancy, tuition, equipment, and census for the schools.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,405.00; to pay \$1,000.00 on the principal and \$405.00 yearly interest on School House bonds.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Carver Memorial Library.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for General Government and Incidentials.
- Art. 16. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Poor.

- Art. 17. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the use of the Hydrants.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to maintain the present Fire Department and to make such changes as may, in their opinion, become necessary due to present war conditions.
- Art. 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate from surplus for the support of the Fire Department, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the repairs of Highways and Bridges, and how much to allow for labor.
- Art. 21. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the cutting of bushes on the improved and Town Roads.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Patrol maintenance.
- Art. 23. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Winter Breaking.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges), under provisions of Section 19, Chapter 229, Public Laws 1937.
- Art. 25. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for repairs of Sewers.

- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$807.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads as required under Sections 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 27. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Resolve Road maintenance.
- Art. 28. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of sidewalks, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 for Public Health Nursing to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health and Welfare for local service.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for decoration of Soldiers Graves on Memorial Day and the care of the Monument Lot.
- Art. 31. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Town Wharf, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 32. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Union Hall.
- Art. 33. To see how much money the Town will vote to appropriate from surplus to purchase seats for Union Hall, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 34. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Mother's Aid.

- Art. 35. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Dependent Children.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow, as temporary loan or loans, to and for the use of the Town of Searsport in anticipation of Taxes of the current Municipal Year, sums of money in aggregate not exceeding twelve thousand dollars, (\$12,000.00); and authorize the Town Treasurer to execute the negotiable bonds or notes of the Town therefor, payable within the said Municipal year from moneys raised by taxation therein and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to the Selectmen of said Town, in accordance with provisions of R. S. Maine, Section 83, Chapter 5, as amended.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Hydrant at the junction of Norris Street and Jackson Ave. or act anything thereon.
- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to set up a fund of \$2,000.00, to be appropriated from surplus, for the exclusive use of Civilian Defense, to be known as the Civilian Defense Fund, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to build an addition to the Town Office to house the Tractor and Town equipment, a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to be appropriated from surplus, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate, from surplus, the sum of \$1,156.18 to abate the uncollected taxes for the years 1934- 1935- 1936, or act anything thereon.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to relocate such street lights as may become necessary due to change in highways.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Selectmen's Office on Thursday, March 5, 1942, at two o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Searsport:

In accordance with instructions from your Board of Selectmen I examined the books and accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, and Tax Collector for the municipal year ended January 31, 1942. The results of this audit are shown in the following exhibits and schedules:

Exhibits—Comparative Balance Sheet, Report of Treasurer, Report of Tax Collector, and Statement of Appropriation Accounts.

Schedules—Accounts Receivable, Trust Funds, Accounts Payable, and Analysis of Change in Surplus.

Cash balance amounting to \$11,631.57 consists of a checking account in the Merrill Trust Company of \$10,-706.43 which was reconciled with the bank statement and cash on hand of \$925.14 proven by actual count.

The uncollected balances of taxes and tax liens amount to \$9,258.48 as compared with \$10,537.97 a year ago. This is due primarily to better tax collections in the 1940 and 1941 accounts. It is to be noted that for the years 1934 to 1937 inclusive only slight changes have been made in the uncollected balances and undoubtedly there will be considerable shrinkage in the collection of these accounts.

The Accounts Receivable as appear in Schedule 1 amount to \$638.81 as compared with \$2,857.26 January 31, 1941. The individual amounts were verified only with the subsidiary ledgers.

During the year the Trust Funds as appear in Schedule 2 have increased by addition and interest \$512.56. Two new Trust Funds were set up for the Town; namely Olive Jennie Lawrence Fund and Charles F. Gordon Fund. These two funds are with the National Bank of Commerce Portland and the Maine Savings Bank respectively with the Maine Charity Foundation as Trustees and the income from same given to the Town as specified above.

Accounts Payable amount to \$212.10 and were set up from vouchers submitted by the Town Officials. These appear in Schedule 3.

During the year there has been paid on the School Bonds \$1,000.00, leaving a balance due of \$9,000.00.

The Food Stamps as shown in the Overdrafts is not actually an Overdraft account and consists of stamps amounting to this value.

The Surplus Account as shown in detail in Schedule 5 has decreased during the year \$4,410.57 which is due primarily from unexpended balances in the various appropriation accounts, resulting from proper management and control by the Town Officials.

With the above mentioned exceptions the balance sheet, to the best of my knowledge and belief, reflects the true financial condition of the Town as at January 31, 1942.

With an average attendance of 8.2 for the fall term; it will be hardly possible for the school to have an average for the year of over eight. Therefore it would seem that the town meeting should act whether this school is to be kept open another year.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Searsport:

Searsport has been very fortunate in the fact that there have been but three changes in the personnel of the teaching force this year. Last Fall the State experienced a shortage of teachers and this has become more acute as the year went on. The reason for this is that other walks of life have provided better salaries. Mr. Peirce in the High School was taken by the draft and was given a leave of absence for the year. Miss Shirley Maddocks, a graduate of Colby was engaged to fill the vacancy. Mr. Perkins left school to enlist and Miss Grace Brown was engaged as teacher at the Porter School. Mr. Hinckley left us to take another position and Mrs. Alice Carter was elected as teacher of the Junior High.

There has been no changes in texts for the elementary schools and the only complete change in High School was in the class of Junior Business Training. We have exchanged three typewriters and added thirty-nine books to the High School Library. Seventy-one dollars was spent for the Science Laboratory.

You will notice that the repair account has been over-drawn as the Porter School was found to be in worse shape than we estimated. The foundation walls had to be straightened and some new sills put in; also the clapboards in front of the building were in bad condition and they were taken off and new ones were used to replace them. The building was also painted. A new chimney was also needed. Running water was installed at the Park School.

The windows at the Central School were weatherstripped. Outside screens were placed on the basement windows at the Central School. We did not have enough money to paint the Central School or to install electric lights at the Porter. The repair work for the coming year will no doubt be held up because of the shortage in material.

The teachers have all signed a petition and presented the same to the Board for a raise in salary of 10%. This to become effective Feb. 2, 1942. There is a decided rise in the cost of living and salaries have been increased in so many occupations that the schools will have to do the The Commissioner of Education feels this very keenly and there doubtless will be a Bill in the next legislature to make twenty dollars a week the minimum salary that can be paid. Commissioner Gilson states that living expenses have gone up eleven per cent since the summer of 1939. Food prices have soared to nineteen per cent above normal. Comparing the avarege wage of from ten to twelve million factory workers, covering the period of the last two years, statistics show an increase of thirty percent in weekly earnings. In several places there have been increases made and if the schools are to continue it will necessitate substantial increases for the entire needs of the school program. This is also true in regard to supplies for schools. One kind of paper, that we use, was bought for 28c last spring and the price at present is 42c. There is a shortage of paper and for that reason one can not estimate what the cost of running the schools for next year will be.

The State School bulletin shows the average school rate to be .01301, while the average of municipal rates is .05910. Searsport is shown as having .01252 for school rate and .053 for municipal rate.

The average costs of maintaining the schools for the last year are as follows: Rural schools \$49.51; Graded Schools \$49.80 and the High School \$83.76 per student. If the total cost is divided by the enrollment of all schools the average cost is \$57.47 per pupil enrolled.

Report of High School Principal

To the Superintendent of Schools and the Superintending School Committee:

Our enrollment of 56 for this school year is smaller than that of last year. The entering class is the smallest in recent years, numbering only nine.

During these days of unusual activity and employment resulting in higher wages for relatively unskilled labor, boys and girls of high school age should not be lured into a false sense of values and thus be tempted to forego a high school education. If abandoned temporarily it may be lost forever.

We are trying to maintain as high a scholastic standard as possible and at the same time to provide a stimulating interest both in the class room and in the extra curricula program. We are carrying on the same activities as in past years.

Assemblies are held nearly every week, at which, different citizens speak to the school and occasionally educational films are shown.

New books have been obtained for the school library and additional equipment has been purchased for the laboratory as required by the State Department of Education.

I wish to acknowledge three gifts to the school. The Senior Class last June gave \$20.08. The Girl Scouts, also, gave \$18.50. These two gifts have been added to the school fund with which we hope to purchase equipment for visual education.

More recently, we have received two boxes of athletic equipment from the men on the USS Arkansas.

On Wednesday of each week, United States Saving Stamps are sold at school. This is a worth-while project for it stimulates the habit of saving as well as encouraging the boys and girls to take a slight part in the war effort.

The basketball teams have had a successful season. The girls' team has won nine of the thirteen games played while the boys' team has earned undisputed possession of the Waldo County League Championship.

A hall heated for practice sessions has helped the teams greatly. I hope the town will feel that it can continue providing this heat.

At the present time it appears doubtful that the Interscholastic Track Meet will be held next spring. This curtailment may be due to restrictions placed upon nonessential traveling, restrictions by the Maine Principals' Association, and an already crowded spring program.

Miss Maddocks and Mrs. Carter are both doing good work in their respective rooms. They show a fine professional attitude and willingness to cooperate.

Annual Report of Public Health Nursing—1941

1941 has been an interesting and challenging year. So much has occurred throughout the world, as well as in our own country.

Standing on the threshold of 1942, the door has been suddenly opened before us and we are shocked at what we behold.

As we stand here and get our bearings, we know we are faced with grave responsibilities, responsibilities we may have to carry for a long time, and only as we are physically and mentally fit to contend with these problems, will we be able to carry on. It has been said that our first line of defense is in our homes. The bulwarks of our Nation are forged in the homes of our people. Thus we, as a Nation, can withstand the rigors of the fight ahead only to the extent that our men and women, boys and girls, are willing and able to take up the torch, stand firm and carry on.

The responsibility for the health of our people lies in our public health programs that are being carried on in our communities and homes. For a successful and effective health program, we must look to the cooperation of everyone in the community.

The following is the report of the public health program carried on in your community for 1941, the local officials and the Bureau of Health cooperating.

ACTIVITIES

Supervision through home visiting was given to antepartums, postpartums, infants, preschool children, school children and adults. The parents were given instructions in personal hygiene, the importance of medical care or supervision, nutrition, infant and child care and training and immunization.

A Child Health Conference was held in cooperation with the health committee and local physician; the attendance was very good.

The local health officer and physician have been very helpful in the health program.

The tuberculin test was given in the high school. There was a good response and reactors to the test and any contacts will have arrangements made for them to have a chest x-ray early in the new year.

A total of 106 home visits were made, the nurse contacting 31 individual homes and giving supervision to the following:

- 4 Antepartums
- 6 Postpartums
- 17 Infants
- 20 Preschool children
 - 5 Crippled children

Interviews were held with interested individuals regarding the program. Plans for next year include organization of a community health committee around the nucleus already formed, in order to extend the program activities.
