WARRANT

To Thornton Curtis, a Constable of the Town of Searsport, in the County of Waldo Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Searsport, in said county qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday the 5th day of March, A. D. 1945 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will accept the Annual Report of the Municipal Officers as printed.
- Art. 4. To see what compensation the Town will vote to pay the various town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose and elect Town officers for the ensuing year and how many, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, a Town Treasurer, a member of the School Board to serve for three years, a Budget Committee, a Road Commissioner, Constables, Surveyors of Sawed Lumber, Surveyors of Wood & Bark, Surveyors of Spars and Timber, Fence Viewers, Sealers of Leather, Viewers and Cullers of Hoops and Staves, and a Fire Ward.

- Art. 6. To elect a Tax Collector.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for nonpayment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 8. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Free High School.
- Art. 9. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Common Schools.
- Art. 10. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 11. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for textbooks and supplies for the Schools.
- Art. 12. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for repairs, insurance, lights, truancy, tuition, equipment, and census for the Schools.
- Art. 13. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Carver Memorial Library.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for General Government and Incidentals.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

- Art. 16. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the use of Hydrants.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to maintain the present Fire Department and to make such changes, as may, in their opinion, become necessary due to present war conditions.
- Art. 18. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repairs of the Highways and Bridges, and how much to allow for labor.
- Art. 19. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for patrol maintenance.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate, for cutting bushes on improved and Town roads.
- Art. 21. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for winter breaking and snow removal.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$807 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, as required under Section 3. Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 23. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, for sewer repairs and maintenance or act anything thereon.

- Art. 25. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for decoration of Soldiers Graves and care of the Monument Lot.
- Art. 26. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
- Art. 27. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate, for sidewalk repairs and maintenance, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85 for Public Health Nursing to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health & Welfare for local service.
- Art. 29. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Resolve Road maintenance.
- Art. 30. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, for repair and maintenance of the Town Wharf, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 31. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Union Hall.
- Art. 32. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Dependent Children.
- Art. 33. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Mothers Aid.

- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow, as temporary loan or loans, to and for the use of the Town of Searsport, in anticipation of Taxes of the current Municipal Year, sums of money in the aggregate not exceeding twelve thousand dollars, (\$12,000); and to authorize the Town Treasurer to execute the negotiable bonds or notes of the Town therefor, payable within the said Municipal Year from moneys raised by taxation therein and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to the Selectmen of said Town, in accordance with provisions of R. S. Maine, Section 83, Chapter 5 as amended.
- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provision of Section 82, Chapter 5 of the revised statutes. Said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to relocate such street lights as may become necessary under present war time conditions.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the private road leading from No. 1 Highway to a stake near the corner of the Savage tennis court, (this road is 14 feet wide and 1705 feet long), as a town road or act anything thereon.
- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to purchase and erect an Honor Roll or Memorial to be dedicated to citizens of the Town of Searsport who have served or are now serving in the armed forces of the U. S., during World War II, and how much money they will raise and appropriate for same, or act anything thereon.

- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to establish a street light at the corner of Mosman and Howard Streets and raise and appropriate how much money for same, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a bulldozer, to attach to the Town Tractor, and how much money they will raise and appropriate for same, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to hire a night policeman, set the rate of pay, and how much money they will raise and appropriate for same or act anything thereon.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Selectmen's Office on Saturday, February 24, 1945, at two o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters.

In accordance with the request from your Board of Selectmen, we have audited the accounts and records of the Town of Searsport, Maine, for the Municipal Year ended January 31, 1945. We have reviewed the accounting system and tested or examined accounting records and supporting evidence of transactions for the Municipal Year, to the extent appropriate in view of the system of internal control. We performed all necessary work for the audit, but we did not perform a detailed audit of all transactions.

Based upon our examination, and subject to comments appearing in this report, we hereby certify that, in our opinion, the accompanying Balance Sheet and related Financial Statements present the financial condition of the Town of Searsport as of January 31, 1945, and the results of operations for the year ended that date.

Comments

Cash, which consists solely of a checking account, on deposit with The Merrill Trust Co., was verified by certificate obtained from the bank. All cash was reconciled as of the date of our examination.

We reconciled the 1944 assessment of taxes with the commitment and proved all outstanding balances of the uncollected taxes with the subsidiary records. We viewed the tax liens and all records pertaining to tax acquired town property. We tested by letter confirmation, several of the individual outstanding tax accounts.

We did not circularize the accounts receivable, but we did review the individual items as to collectibility and proved the various balances against the total.

We viewed the outstanding notes receivable, which are serial promissory notes and it is our opinion that the collectibility of this item is questionable and a reserve for the full amount has been set up.

The records of the amount withheld from the employees for Federal Taxes were examined by us and the liability as shown appears to be proper.

We examined all investments of trust funds and obtained from the various depository banks, certificates for the amounts on deposit. It is to be noted that at the time of our examination, there was in transit \$22,200.00 for purchase of United States bonds. We obtained confirmation of this item from the Merrill Trust Co.

During the year all schoolhouse bonds, which were to mature serially at the rate of \$1,000.00 a year, were paid. We examined all cancelled coupons as of that date.

The accounting procedures and principal, both of which are sound, have been consistently maintained during the past year in conformity with practices for preceding years.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Officers Commanded to Kill Dogs to Make Return

Section 163. Officers to make returns. Each police officer or constable to whom the warrants named in the 2nd paragraph of the preceding section are issued shall return the same at the time specified and shall state in his return on each warrant the number of dogs killed or otherwise disposed of and whether all unlicensed dogs within his precinct have been disposed of, and the names of persons against whom complaints have been made under the provisions of said section. Such officers shall receive from the city, town, or plantation the sum of \$2 for each dog killed or otherwise disposed of, and for other services rendered under the provisions of this chapter they shall receive such compensation as the municipal officers may determine.

Provided, however, that in the event the owner of a dog, that has been ordered to be killed, desires to conform with the law in regard to the dog at the time the officer calls to attend to his duty, he may pay the regular fees due, plus an extra fee of 85c to the officer. The officer shall make a return on the warrant to that effect, and pay over the regular fee to the city or town clerk, retaining the 85c.

Provided further, that in no case shall such officer be entitled to more than \$2 as a fee for disposing of any dog.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Searsport:

The employment of teachers and finding a place for them to live has been the major difficulty for this school year. It is very apparent that this same condition will continue for the coming year. The Porter School remained closed for the same reason as last year. The North Searsport School started late as it did not seem possible to find a teacher to take the position, but Mrs. Tripp finally decided to teach the school again. It is a question whether she will be able to continue next year because of her family. There have been three changes this year in our teaching force of eleven teachers from last year. The budget for next year allows for an increase of \$80 for each teaching position for next year.

To do the necessary repairs has been very difficult on account of the shortage of labor. The only major work that was done is the putting in of a new pipe line in the High School as the old pipe was so full of rust that sufficient water was not able to be provided. This was done by the High School boys and Mr. Carley at the cost of \$241.85.

The cost of texts is somewhat larger as we have completed the change in English books in the Junior High, changed the books in Arithmetic and added another Reading book in the Seventh and Eighth grades. We have also almost completed the changing of our basic reading system for the Primary grades to the Elson and Gray. It has been necessary to purchase a large number of books to fill in, as the enrollment in the Central School has increased 32 pupils this year over the Fall term enrollment of a year ago. There has been an expenditure of at least \$75 for both the Library and the Laboratory as required by the State law.

This year the average school rate for the State is .01620, while Searsport is reported as being .01575. The cost per pupil in average daily attendance for the State is \$60.87 in the Elementary Schools, \$92.49 for the Secondary Schools, \$87.09 for all pupils (total expenditure), while the average municipal tax rate for school purposes is .05807. Searsport has an average cost for elementary schools of \$51.07, for Secondary education of \$133.06. The total expenditure divided by the number of all pupils gives an average of \$69.29 per pupil. Teachers' salaries comprise 64.5% of the total amount expended for school purposes.

In closing I want to thank all who have cooperated in keeping the schools open and I assure you that this will need to be continued as long as war is robbing civilization in its advancement.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools and the Superintending School Committee:

The enrollment at the High School is now 43 as compared to 39 when school closed last June. The average attendance for the fall term has been 93.7% as compared to 82.4% for the corresponding period in the preceding year. This is encouraging as it indicates a tendency on the part of parents and students to realize the importance of regular attendance as a requisite to good school work. I do not anticipate any decrease in the enrollment in the near future. Those who were not particularly interested in school work have left us and those who are continuing their school work seem reasonably eager to do their best.

Boys become restless as they approach the age when most of them will enter the armed forces. This is a natural reaction. However, it has become one of our most serious problems. In these cases, I feel that the home and school should work together. Parents and teachers should get together for a better understanding of their common problems.

We renewed our annual speaking contest last spring on a somewhat smaller scale with but three schools competing. Both prizes went to Winterport High School. We are trying to continue the contest this year.

The magazine sale campaign has recently been completed yielding a net profit to the school of \$74.80. This amount represents a small increase over the profit of last year. The school voted to use this money for the purchases of a War Bond.

Last summer the school assisted by Mr. Sprague of the Curtis Publishing Company conducted a drive for scrap paper. Over five tons were collected and sold. Another such drive is anticipated during the spring months.

Last year, I referred to the fact that bottled gas as a source of heat was being installed in the science laboratory. This has not been done. The equipment has been purchased but we have been unable to obtain the services of anyone to install it.

The school joined the Film Library Association at the University of Maine again this year. This service allows us 60 educational films a year for our assembly programs.

An S. V. E. 35 mm strip film and slide projector has been added to our library and science equipment. A supply of strip films has been ordered and part of them received. These will be used in class room discussions and will follow the trend for more complete visual education.

The basketball teams have played a somewhat longer schedule than last year with a reasonable degree of success. The problem of transportation is difficult.

I am sure that the teachers are ready and willing to cooperate with the members of the school committee and the rest of the citizens for the welfare of the boys and girls. The schools are maintained for the best interests of youth rather than for the teachers. Any constructive suggestions will be welcomed.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

The following is a report of the Public Health Nursing Service carried in your town for the year 1944.

The nurse has made 34 visits to your town. During these visits the following nursing visits were made: 11 to expectant mothers, 49 to infants and 76 to pre-school children.

In school work, 21 nursing visits were made to school children and 137 hearing tests were given with the Audiometer.

As usual the crippled children have been kept under supervision with home nursing visits and attendance at Crippled Children's Clinics.

There is much work yet to be done in immunization.

It has been found that public health nursing is carried on much more efficiently in the communities where an active health committee has been organized.

Such a committee has not yet been organized in your community. If you are interested and would like to help in the organization of such a committee for your community, would you contact your Selectmen or your Public Health Nurse and plans for better co-operation among the official boards, the community citizens and the public health nursing service will be put into effect.

January 26th, has been designated as National Public Health Day. There will be a recognition of the day by a meeting in Augusta. All interested community leaders and committee members are invited to attend.

Let us improve the service to the community during 1945
