#### WARRANT

# To Thornton Curtis, a Constable of the Town of Searsport, in the County of Waldo Greeting

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Searsport, in said county qualified by law to vote in Town, on Monday the 10th day of March, A. D. 1947 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will accept the Annual Report of the Municipal Officers as printed.
- Art. 4. To see what compensation the Town will vote to pay the various town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose and elect Town officers for the ensuing year and how many, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, a Town Treasurer, a member of the School Board to serve for three years, a Budget Committee, a Road Commissioner, Constables, Surveyors of Sawed Lumber, Surveyors of Wood and Bark, Surveyors of Spars and Timber, Fence Viewers, Sealers of Leather, Viewers and Cullers of Hoops and Staves, and a Fire Ward.
- Art. 6. To elect a Tax Collector.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

- Art. 8. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the High School.
- Art. 9. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Elementary Schools.
- Art. 10. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 11. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for repairs, insurance, truancy and equipment for the Schools.
- Art. 12. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Carver Memorial Library.
- Art. 13. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for General Government and Incidentals.
- Art. 14. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.
- Art. 15. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the use of Hydrants.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to maintain the present Fire Department and to make such changes, as may, in their opinion, become necessary.
- Art. 17. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repairs of the Town Roads, and how much to allow for labor.
- Art. 18. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate, for patrol maintenance.

- Art. 19. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate, for cutting bushes on improved and Town roads.
- Art. 20. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for winter breaking and snow removal.
- Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$807 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, as required under Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Art. 22. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Fire Department.
- Art. 23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for sewer repairs and maintenance or act anything thereon.
- Art. 24. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for decoration of Soldier's Graves and care of the Monument Lot.
- Art. 25. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
- Art. 26. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for sidewalk repairs and maintenance, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85 for Public Health Nursing to be expended under the auspices of the Bureau of Health and Welfare for local service.

- Art. 28. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Special Resolve Road maintenance.
- Art. 29. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair and maintenance of the Town Wharf, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 30. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Union Hall.
- Art. 31. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Dependent Children.
- Art. 32. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Mothers' Aid.
- Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow, as temporary loan or loans, to and for the use of the Town of Searsport, in anticipation of Taxes of the current Municipal Year, sums of money in the aggregate not exceeding twelve thousand dollars, (\$12,000); and to authorize the Town Treasurer to execute the negotiable bonds or notes of the Town therefore payable within the said Municipal Year from moneys raised by taxation therein and upon such terms as shall be satisfactory to the Selectmen of said Town, in accordance with provisions of R. S. Maine, Section 83, Chapter 5 as amended.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provision of Section 82, Chapter 5 of the revised statutes. Said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to designate the road from No. 1 highway to The Summers Fertilizer Plant as State Aid Road, or act anything thereon.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to take over and maintain in good condition the following roads, to wit:
  - 1. From the Atlantic highway to the Gordon cemetery so called.
  - 2. From the back road to Belfast to the Sargent cemetery so called.
  - 3. From the Mt. Ephraim Road to the Village Cemetery.
  - 4. From the Atlantic highway to the Elmwood Cemetery.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five citizens to work with the Superintending School Committee for the purpose of making a study of the educational facilities in the Town of Searsport. This committee to be instructed to submit a report of its findings at a special or the next regular Town Meeting in March 1948.
- Art. 38. To see whether or not the Town will vote to enter into a contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of ten (10) years, whereby, in consideration of the furnishing of street lighting service to the Town during the term of said contract, all as more fully set forth in the contract, copy of which has been presented to this meeting, the Town will pay for such street lighting service in accordance with the Company's municipal street lighting rate contract basis.

Art. 39. To see what action the Town will take with reference to authorizing the Selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceding Article.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Selectmen's Office on Saturday, March 8, 1947, at 9 o'clock in the morning for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters.

#### Gentlemen:

In accordance with the terms of our engagement, we have made an examination of the balance sheet of the Town of Searsport, as of January 31, 1947. Our audit has embraced the verification of the assets and liabilities of the Municipality and an analytical review by test of the departmental expenses and income records, transactions and supporting evidence, to the extent necessary in view of the system of internal control: however, we did not make a detailed audit of departmental expenses and income transactions.

#### Scope of Audit

Cash in the general and Civilian Defense funds was reconciled with certificates obtained from The Merrill Trust Co. for the amounts on deposit. Cash on hand at the close of the Municipal year, in the amount of \$1,316.30, was verified as having been deposited on February 3, 1947. It was necessary to make a detailed examination of all Treasurer's transactions; an overage of \$5.30 has been held in the Treasurer's account. All cash was reconciled to the date of our examination. No expenditures have been made from the Civilian Defense fund, and we would recommend transfer to the general operating fund.

We have proved the 1946 assessment of taxes and compared the amounts in detail with the list committeed to the collector. The assessment record, however, does not adequately describe the property assessed for the year 1946, as the 10 year book, in force, had not been completed. Prior year balances were proved and are in agreement with collector's records.

We have examined all tax liens for 1945 taxes and have proved the existence of the outstanding liens of prior years. Collections during the year have substantially reduced the outstanding balances. Further, adjustments, in the amount of \$368.40, were made for items considered uncollectible, adsorbed by a reserve for anticipated losses as previously established on the ledger. It is strongly recommended that even more strenuous efforts be made to enforce collection of all liens that have matured.

We have examined all transactions in accounts receivable; new accounts originate from use of town owned equipment and sale of gravel. During the year, there was charged to the uncollectible reserve a balance due from the State on pauper accounts.

We have made direct examination of transactions creating unpaid current payable obligations, which consist of unpaid commissions, due your tax collector, a treasurer's warrant not paid in full, and income received for the benefit of the Carver Memorial Library, but unpaid at the close of the year.

Notes payable consist of tax anticipation berrowing on January 16, 1947, due on January 31, 1947, but unpaid as of that date. The state subsidy for education had not been received, prior to negotiation of this loan.

We have examined the records of employee funds held for Federal Income tax, teachers' retirement and teachers' pension, and the liability as stated appears to be correct and in accord with proper requirements; however, a deduction has been made, by the State, from school funds, on the assumption that an error

had been made by the town, in payment of teachers' retirement and pension benefits, as school payrolls are based on a calendar year instead of a school year, thus deductions made during July and August were reported to the State as if retroactive to the close of the school year, and the town, therefore, as charged with deductions before payrolls had been received from which deductions were to be made. A detailed reconciliation of payrolls, now in process, will make available a refund to the town, probably to the amount of \$98.55. This anticipated refund is not reflected in your school balances at the close of the year, but since such revenue will be obligated for school expenditures, the status of your unencumbered surplus will not be affected.

We have examined investments and transactions, in detail, of all trust funds; have confirmed by bank certificate amounts on time deposit. At the close of the year, unexpended balances from income were co-mingled with town funds, in the amount of \$104.00, of which \$102.82 is reflected in trust fund detail, as due to certain trusts, and \$1.18 carried as a departmental balance forward, the latter being a refund and not an income from investment earnings. Dividend earnings in the Joanna C. Colcord Fund, of which two-seventh of the income therefrom is not to be expended during the life of the donor, was overdeposited to a segregated investment account, to the extent of \$ .28, being due to an error in allocation of increased earnings; proper adjustment, to specified conditions of this fund, should be made in the coming year.

#### Comments

We have examined, in detail, all transactions in the departmental accounts for the months of February and October, 1946. We have compared all checks issued for the entire year against warrants issued by the selectmen. We have further test checked payrolls and other items of income and expense for the other 10 months; traced all items of cash received and paid to general ledger.

We have added excise receipts No. 91 to 488 inclusive for 1946 and No. 1 to No. 72 inclusive for 1947 and found the total to be in agreement with receipts as issued by the Treasurer. The amount collected has been credited to your surplus account.

At the close of the year invoices for obligation due the State of Maine for the town's share in Aid to Dependent Children and for Board and Care had not been received. This is likely to create overdrafts in the coming year, unless provisions are made by vote of the Town at the next annual meeting to carry forward the unexpended balance in Aid to Dependent Children and to increase the appropriation for Board and Care to meet this extra requirement.

A part of road construction, during the year, was financed from special resolve allocation, combined with joint state Aid allotments. However, charges for state equipment had not been accounted for on the general ledger, and the State Aid construction balance had not been transferred to this account. These charges combined with gravel disallowances, exactly balances what was considered as a balance due from the State; however, depletion of the funds available for Special Resolve Construction, amounted to only \$500.19, leaving an excess of \$2,099.81, still available for future Special Resolve Construction. In order to secure \$1,050.00 more from the State, for State Aid Construction, from 1946 State apportionment, provisions must be made by town appropriation, on which action was taken at the 1946 annual meeting.

Departmental overdrafts exceeded unexpended balances by \$4,736.65. This occurred principally by reason of Highway overdrafts, improvements to Union Hall and Fire Station and in the construction of the Mill Dam. Increased costs of education caused overdrawn balances in school accounts, to the extent of \$1,486.83.

#### Certificate

Subject to the foregoing qualifications and based upon our examination, we hereby certify that, in our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and statement of departmental income and expenses fairly present the financial condition of the Town of Searsport, as at January 31, 1947, and the results of operation for the year ended that date.

#### NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

#### Officers Commanded to Kill Dogs to Make Return

Section 163. Officers to make returns. Each police officer or constable to whom the warrants named in the 2nd paragraph of the preceding section are issued shall return the same at the time specified and shall state in his return on each warrant the number of dogs killed or otherwise disposed of and whether all unlicensed dogs within his precinct have been disposed of, and the names of persons against whom complaints have been made under the provisions of said section. Such officers shall receive from the city, town, or plantation the sum of \$2 for each dog killed or otherwise disposed of, and for other services rendered under the provisions of this chapter they shall receive such compensation as the municipal officers may determine.

Provided, however, that in the event the owner of a dog, that has been ordered to be killed, desires to conform with the law in regard to the dog at the time the officer calls to attend to his duty, he may pay the regular fees due, plus an extra fee of 85 cents to the officer. The officer shall make a return on the warrant to that effect, and pay over the regular fee to the city or town clerk, retaining the 85 cents.

Provided further, that in no case shall such officer be entitled to more than \$2 as a fee for disposing of any dog.

#### To the School Committee and the Citizens of Searsport:

According to the Laws of Maine pertaining to Public Schools, I herewith submit the following report on the conditions and the progress of the schools of Searsport for the year ending February 1, 1947.

This year there have been three new teachers added to our teaching personnel and two changes within the system. The resignations of Mrs. Spier and Mrs. Curtis left two vacancies which were filled by Mr. and Mrs. Byron Meader. Mrs. Clements was promoted to the Principalship of the Central School and Mrs. Carter was transferred to Grades Four and Five. Mr. Meader is teacher of the Junior High and Mrs. Meader is teacher of Grades One and Two.

In order to open the North Searsport School it was necessary to open with a substitute. Mrs. Margaret Clements substituted until Wesley Shorey, a graduate of Lee Academy was secured for the position. He is teaching the school under a sanction from the State Department of Education.

Last Summer the exterior of the Central School was painted and the Nichols school was completely redecorated both inside and outside. The teachers and children of the Central school are deserving of much praise for their efforts to improve the grounds in front of the building. The gravel work was paid for from the proceeds of their operetta.

For new equipment this year it was possible to obtain new seating for the sixth grade at the Nichols school and a new teachers desk for the sub-primary room.

Textbooks have been slow in delivery, but the greater part of our needs were on hand when schools opened. Expenditures for texts have been largely for the elementary schools. New texts purchased this year have been: English Grade 3, Geographies Grades 4 and 6, Basic Readers Grade 5, Arithmetics Grades 3, 4, 5 plus number books for the Primary Grades.

In keeping with the educational trends of today, Science study demands greater attention than ever before. To meet this challenge the Primary Grades were partially equipped with books that are correlated with their basic reading series. In grades 5, 6, 7 and 8 a complete series of science textbooks have been installed.

The required amounts for meeting the State Standards have been spent on the maintenance of the High School library and laboratory.

A new roller-type hectograph machine was purchased this year for use at the Central School. The grades also were supplied with pressed crayons and an ample supply of construction paper in eight solid colors.

It is the firm conviction of your Superintending School Committee that the educational facilities and opportunities which are offered in the Town of Searsport are in need of careful study and appraisal.

Today, there are five separate buildings being operated and maintained. Elementary conveyance since the last Town Meeting has been expanded so that it now provides transportation for more than 49% of the pupils in the elementary schools. There is general overcrowding in the Central School and the Junior High. Enrollment figures show that the number of pupils per grade warrant a teacher for each grade instead of the present overlapping of grades. Present conditions make no provision for future growth of your town. By analysis, the average enrollment per grade in the High School does not coincide with the average enrollment in the elementary grades. Inequality of opportunity does exist at the present time within the school system. For illustration consider the North Searsport children who have had sanction teachers for two consecutive years.

These conditions lead us to believe that it is necessary and proper that there be a committee appointed to study and evaluate the present school structure. In several conversations with the members of the State Department of Education they have expressed a willingness to come to Searsport and work with us on such a project. For this purpose there has been an article placed in the Warrant for your consideration.

This year an active P.T.A. has been organized with Mrs. William Seaman serving as President. The support of this organization is welcomed in the solution of our common problem.

Appropriations for schools need to be much greater this year for several reasons. The appropriations requested last year were too small and resulted in our tax rate for schools dropping from .0162 to .01543 when the average for the state climbed to .01855. This occured at a time when all operating expenses were increasing. Teachers were raised 5% over last year and were also given a sick leave benefit of three days. Textbooks and supplies were up an average of 15 to 25 percent over a year ago and are expected to be up to a 40 percent increase by July 1, 1947. These are some of the contributing factors which, when added together, resulted in a net deficit of \$1,473.64.

The budget for the fiscal year 1947-1948 has been set up to allow for the \$1,500.00 minimum pay for teachers as provided for in the bills before the present legislature.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation and support of all, which can only mean better schools.

#### REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

# To the Superintendent of Schools and the Superintending School Committee:

May I begin my report this year by paying respect to the teachers and all the rest of you who have helped me this year. It has been an especially busy year for me and I appreciate all of the help I have received.

The school program is being maintained on much the same basis as last year. The enrollment has increased over the war years and is now about 20% above that of last year.

The Senior Class has eleven members: 5 boys and 6 girls. This is in contrast to the last two years during which time but one boy was graduated.

This year we joined the Audio Visual Service at the University of Maine. Thus we have the opportunity to make use of the projector in the classroom. The speaking contest was held last May at Searsport. Searsport was represented by Joan Marshall and Chester Walker. Joan received the second place award for the girls.

Last spring the school bought an electric Victrola and radio. It has been greatly enjoyed by the boys and girls. Several school dances have been held, thus far, the last one being sponsored by the Parent Teacher's Association and consisted of a trip to the Grange hall at North Searsport. It is probable that others will be held in the future.

Mr. Meader has maintained complete charge of the boys' athletic program with a marked degree of success.

Several games of baseball were played last fall, preceding our basketball season. Although beset by difficulties, the season from many angles has been a successful one. Baseball will take their attention this spring.

Complete basketball uniforms and warm-up jackets have been bought for the basketball teams. Mrs. Carter supervised the making of the girls' uniforms. The appreciation of the school is extended to her and to those who assisted her. The cost of these uniforms approximated \$350. Doris and Halton Smith generously donated \$100 for this purpose.

In several respects, our school system should be well planned for a long range program. It is my sincere belief that the town should authorize a complete study of our entire school program, in an endeavor to offer to the young people of this community the best educational facilities possible, consistent with the ability of the people to pay.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

The following is a report of the Public Health Nursing Service submitted for 1946.

The greater part of the Nurse's time was spent in home visiting, so that the parents might have the latest information available on standards of health and hygienic care, in order to maintain good family health.

The Nurse made 28 visits to your town during which the following Nursing visits were made:

5 to expectant mothers 8 to infants 45 to preschool children 16 to school children.

As heretofore, crippled children have been kept under supervision through home visits and attendance at Crippled Children's Clinics.

Tuberculin skin testing was done in the high school and an X-ray Clinic was held in July, giving reactors and contacts of active cases of tuberculosis the opportunity to have a chest X-ray.

80 children were vaccinated against Smallpox.

One of the highlights of the public health Nursing program for the year, was the conference held in Augusta for Lay Committee Members. We hope that next year your town—may be represented at such a meeting.

With Community Health Committees organized and participating in the program, more Child Health Conferences and Immunization Clinics can be held.

Will you help to improve the health of your community?
