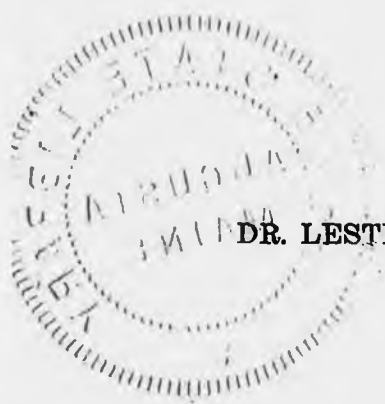

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Hebron:

I herewith submit my second annual report of the schools of your town for the municipal school year ending Feb. 1, 1924.

During the spring term six schools were maintained. At the opening of the fall term one of these schools, the one at No. 8, was discontinued because the pupils in this neighborhood were so few that it was unprofitable to continue this school any longer. They were conveyed to the village school where the larger classes made their work more interesting and at the same time more profitable to the pupils themselves.

The new year brought about the usual number of changes in the teaching staff. Only one of our old teachers remained with us to give us the benefit of her wisdom and experience. It is a regrettable fact that the changing about of teachers is one of the greatest evils of our present school system. The teachers themselves are often to blame for this. They fail to realize that a long tenure in one teaching position adds much to their usefulness and will count for promotion in the years to come. That a drifter never grows is an old adage that is as true in the teaching profession as in any other occupations of life. We offer our teachers all the inducements to remain that are in our power, inducements fully as great as other communities of our size can offer them and if they fail to respond we feel that we have done our duty.

The fall term opened with experienced teachers in all the schools but one. The quality of instruction has been fully equal to the standard of last year and in at least two instances it has been better. All teachers have worked faithfully and conscientiously and the work accomplished by the pupils reflects the efforts put forth by their instructors. There is a remarkably fine school spirit among the children in all the schools. They cooperate well with their teachers. They are attractive, intelligent, quick to grasp new subjects and new meth-

ods of presentation. They are easy to discipline and they are good workers. With such children, school work becomes a pleasure on the part of the teachers and, as a result, very few complaints of lack of attention or of indifference reach the ears of the superintendent.

The Stanford Achievement Tests were given at the Alders school during the fall term. Owing to the cost of the material of these tests they have not been given as yet in any of the other schools but it is my purpose to give them in all the schools near the close of the spring term. These tests cover all the grades from the second to the ninth inclusive and include such subjects as Reading, Arithmetic, Nature Study and Science, History and Literature, Language and Spelling. The standards obtained from these tests have been derived from hundreds of the best elementary schools of this country and the age equivalent tables give the rating scores of children at the different ages of their elementary school life. These tests are difficult and require no little skill in the person who gives them and the child who takes them. Wherever I have given them the results have been very satisfactory indeed.

Repairs of a minor nature have been made on two of the school buildings during the year. It was the intention of the board of education to enlarge the Academy building but it was found that the work contemplated by the board would involve an expenditure of nearly \$1700 which was considerably in excess of the repair funds available for that purpose. After careful consideration it was deemed inexpedient to overdraw this fund at that time. However, to relieve in part the effects of overcrowding at this building the walls enclosing the two entry ways were removed and the platform at the teacher's desk was taken away. This gave more floor space. Also the old box stove was removed and a furnace of the one-pipe type was installed.

Two ventilating shafts were constructed in opposite corners of the room to give a better supply of fresh air. Something will have to be done next year to improve the toilet facilities of this building. Whether flush closets shall be installed or dirt closets of the type accepted by the state shall be constructed is a matter for the board of education to determine. All our school buildings lack proper play grounds but this fact is not more in evidence in the town of Hebron than in any other rural town in Maine. It is unfortunate that the needs of proper play grounds for the children did not dawn upon the minds of our builders until in these very recent times. Certainly child nature was not consulted in the location and erection of our school buildings of the past.

The following attendance statistics are taken from the registers and monthly reports of the teachers.

Four children who attended the Nelson school the first two weeks of the fall term moved from that neighborhood to some other town. This accounts for the difference between the registration and the average attendance in that school. A case of diphtheria in the Sodom neighborhood caused that school to be closed for one week in the fall term while a few mild cases of chicken-pox at the Alders at the beginning of the winter term caused that school to be closed for a short period of time. Later a case of this same disease appeared at the Academy school and it seemed wise to close that school one week:

The town has nineteen students attending approved secondary schools: ten at Hebron Academy; one at Buckfield High; one at Edward Little High; two at Leavitt Institute; and five at Gould's Academy. This is a record of which the town must be proud. It is costing the town something to educate these one hundred and eleven children but money cannot be expended in a better cause. It is to the principle of universal education that all nations look as the one great power that can bring peace on earth and good will to men.

The financial statement with which this report closes opens with an overdraft in common school account of \$621.63. \$318.18 of this overdraft appears in the town report for the year 1922-'23. The other \$303.45 is a sort of a posthumous exhibit from the town report of the year 1921-'22. This last item came as a surprise but the evidence of its existence seems too clear to dispute.
