# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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To the School Board and Citizens of Hebron:

I herewith submit my third annual report of the schools of the town for the municipal school year ending Feb. 1, 1925.

It gives me pleasure to state that I can conscientiously report a very profitable school year. We were exceptionally fortunate in the selection of our teachers. At the Alders school we have a teacher who has held that position for years and her work is always good. She is a good worker, thorough in her methods, conscientious, with a fine realization of the importance of the work she is called upon to do, and with a professional spirit that is always searching for new methods and new things to teach her pupils. At Brighton Hill we have another teacher of just about the same type. She is a resident of the town and has had a long and successful teaching experience in the schools of neighboring towns. From her experience and reputation as a teacher in other towns, it was to be expected that her work in this school would be highly successful and in this expectation we have not been deceived. At Sodom we have another experienced teacher, one who has had a considerable normal training. She, too, is a resident of the town and has the best interests of the town's children at heart. Her work is very satisfactory and she is especially adapted to the training of young children. At the Academy school we have another excellent teacher. More mature in years, of the type that holds to the traditions of the old school where they are sound and is always searching for new methods that seem to promise successful results, sane, conservative and painstaking, here is teacher who is living up to our expectations when we placed her in this school.

During the Spring term I gave the Stanford Achievement Tests in this school. The results were surprisingly good; many of the children grading far above the standard averages for children of their age and grade. During the Spring term the children in No. 8 school were conveyed to the village. In the Fall this school was re-opened and an out-of-town teacher was engaged. She had had one year's

experience and one year at Castine Normal School and came highly recommended. Her work was very methodical, clean-cut and well arranged, her discipline was excellent. She had all the indications of a successful teacher. At the close of the Fall term, marriage deprived us of her services and her place was taken by a young high school graduate from a near by town. Owing to an outbreak of Whooping Cough among the children in the Nelson neighborhood this school was not opened until very late in the Fall. We engaged for this school a young lady who is a resident of the town, a recent high school graduate. She is doing fine work for a beginner and with training and added experience will make a fine teacher.

Taking the schools collectively it can be said that the standard of teaching has been higher than it has at any time during the past three years. There are well grounded reasons for this statement. Fewer inexperienced teachers have been engaged. The accumulative experience of our old teachers and the longer tenure of position in their schools are the two chief factors that have led up to this end. Some of our teachers have held their positions so long that they have become thoroughly acquainted with their pupils and the parents and the conditions under which their work is carried on. This I hold to be the main reason for their greater efficiency. They are worthy of, and I feel that they are receiving, the whole hearted support of the people whom they are serving.

During the Fall term the work of the Modern Health Crusade was introduced into the schools. This work grew out of our experiences during the World War. Its inception was mandatory on our part and it forms a conjoined part of that system of physical training under which the law of the State of Maine requires of all towns under its jurisdiction. I feel that this work has been a benefit to the children as it inculcates principles that if followed ought to lead to permanent good.

This year the board of education has built an addition to the Academy school building large enough to furnish separate cloak rooms for the children and to furnish ample space for toilet facilities. While this new construction does not meet the requirements of those who wanted a new school building in this section of the town, I feel that it has added greatly to the comforts of the children. They now have warm cloak rooms and toilets that can be reached without wading through the snow. The work was done in a thorough manner, no expense being spared to build it as it ought to be built. The Nelson school building was shingled and other repairs were made there. The roof of the building at Brighton Hill was patched and a few slight repairs were made at the Alders school.

If we are to continue to maintain a school at No. 8 new toilets will have to be constructed for this building. The school room at this place has the best arrangement of any in town. It is ventilated and lighted according to modern standards of ventilating and lighting. I would recommend that next year new toilets be constructed at this school.

In regard to toilet arrangement, the Nelson, Brighton Hill, Alders and Sodom buildings ought to pass State inspection. I made an effort to have these buildings state-inspected last Spring by an agent of the State Department of Education but as they were very busy at the State office at that time I was not able to secure a visit from the department.

As the Nelson school had been in session just a few weeks no survey was made.

To one unfamiliar with the circumstances of the case this would seem an unusually low percentage attendance. I am sorry to say that in every school community in the town there is an unusually large, drifting population that is not of American stock. We have at least

one community where some years there will not be enough children to profitably maintain a school. The very next year there may be sufficient children in this very same community to maintain a profitable school. These families come and go with surprising frequency. The results of these frequent migrations creep into the school registers and cut down the average attendance. The children of the settled population of the town attend school as regularly as the children of any other town.

Hebron has at the present time fourteen students attending approved secondary schools. They are distributed as follows: one at Leavitt Institute; four at Hebron Academy; two at Gould's Academy; four at Buckfield High; two at Paris High; one at Edward Little. Still another student is attending Lee Academy but no bill for tuition has come in from that school.

The financial statement with which this report closes covers the period of time between the opening of the town books last spring and the time when they will have been closed for settlement this current year. In it will be given all the expenditures of the various departments of school affairs.

# Warrant for Town Meeting

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State of Maine.

County of Oxford, ss.

To L. E. Whitman, a constable in the Town of Hebron, in said County:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town on the second day of March, 1925, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.
- Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To choose a chairman of board of Selectmen.
- Art. 6. To choose a second Selectman.
- Art. 7. To choose a third Selectman.
- Art. 8. To choose a Board of Assessors.
- Art. 9. To choose one member of Board of Overseers of Poor for three years.
- Art. 10. To choose a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- Art. 11. To choose one member of school board for three years.
- Art. 12. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.
- Art. 13. To choose a Fire Ward and fix his compensation.
- Art. 14. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for summer work on roads and bridges and patrol labor.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter work.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes.
- Art. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to snow rollers for winter roads and raise money for same.

Art. 20. To see what action the town will take in regard to enlarging the tool house, making a suitable place for tools and machinery and raise money for same.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for town officers' bills.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous accounts.

Art. 23. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of ten dollars for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School according to the School Laws of 1903.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for superintendent's salary for 1925.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for common schools.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school committee, office expense account, for text books, and for repairs.

Art. 28. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for purchasing flags for school buildings.

Art. 29. To see if the town will instruct the superintending school committee, as required by law to maintain any school, the average attendance of which for the school year is less than eight pupils, if in the opinion of the committee such maintenance seems advisable.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Aid road work according to Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 33. To hear report from the librarian's committee and act on same.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to instruct its treasurer by written consent of the selectmen, to hire money for use of town.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year.



Art. 36. To see if the town will grant and raise one hundred and fifty dollars to surface the road beginning at the hill beyond the C. H. George place to the Paris line.

Art. 37. To see if the town will grant and raise \$150.00 to surface the road beginning at bridge near Austin road and leading toward Wallingford cattle pass until money is expended.

Art. 38. To see if the town will grant and raise \$300.00 to cut top of Bearce Hill, leading from Agnes Bearce's to E. E. Hutchinson place and make fill at bottom of same.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to be used in grading, straightening and fencing Cushman Hill so called.

Art. 40. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Moody Public Library.

Art. 41. To see if the town will exempt Hebron Grange Hall from taxation and pay a yearly rental of thirty-five dollars.

Art. 42. To see if the Town of Hebron will vote to lengthen the school year for our grade schools, from 32 weeks to the standard 36 weeks per year, appropriating \$475.00 for the same.

Art. 43. To see if the town of Hebron will appropriate \$50.00 for the 40-gallon chemical extinguisher at the Academy, and assume an interest in the same for the protection of property beyond our water mains.

Art. 44. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not and have you there this warrant with your doings thereon.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
