## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Hebron:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report of the schools of this town for the municipal school year ending February 1, 1926.

The year has witnessed the usual changes in the personnel of our teaching staff. While we lost some good teachers who were with us last year we were very fortunate in those whom we selected to take their places. When out-of-town teachers are employed in our schools, and this condition exists altogether too frequently in many rural communities, every June finds school officials face to face with the perplexing problem of replacing some of their old, experienced teachers with teachers who are untried and unfamiliar with local school conditions. In such cases it is the duty of the school management to see to it that, in this inevitable ebb and flow of rural teachers, the schools do not suffer thereby; and it taxes their ability to the limit to successfully cope with such a situation.

The ideal school system, as I conceive it, is a resident corps of teachers, well educated, well trained, well paid, in school buildings that are modern, with ample equipment, and with well kept grounds. A resident board of teachers, all things being equal, will do better work because they will naturally take greater interest in their work. This is their home town, their school, their community. The children come from the homes of their neighbors and their friends; they understand their home life and they can do better work for them because they know their needs, their capacities, and their limitations.

I have said above that we were fortunate in selecting teachers to fill the vacancies that occurred at the close of the last spring term. At the Alders school we lost Mrs. Bradford, who had been in this school for the past five years. Her resignation came as a surprise and was much regretted by everybody. She had been in this school so long that she was thoroughly acquainted with all the children; she knew the kind of school work that each and every one of them could do; she knew just what kind of instruction each one needed most and she was always willing and ready to help them. When the fall term opened Mrs. Eastman took up the work and with rare skill and ability she is still carrying it on. As the citizens of this

community well know, Mrs. Eastman is a fine teacher. She is well trained for her work and her methods of instruction are excellent and her pupils are making good progress.

As the time drew near for the opening of the fall term it became apparent to the school board that it would not be expedient to open the Sodom school for the fall term at least. The pupils in that neighborhood were so few that the school could not be maintained without too great a financial loss to the town. So they were conveyed to the Brighton Hill school. These two schools thus united were under the instruction of Miss Helen Maxim. Miss Maxim is a young teacher, progressive in her ideas, sound in her methods, and a good worker. She grows with experience and her work is commendable.

At the Academy school Mrs. Conant is still directing the work. This is her third year at this school. Her work is worthy of careful consideration. If you visit her various classes you are impressed with the stress that is placed upon accuracy in the work of the pupils. No slipshod methods or half performed work are allowed to pass the rigid censorship. In such subjects as arithmetic and English grammar too much emphasis cannot be placed upon accuracy. It has been the tendency for the past few years to sugar-coat these subjects. Not so in this school. They are receiving the emphasis that is their due.

At No. 8 we lost a good teacher when Mrs. Rawson moved out of town. We were fortunate when Miss Conant decided to accept the position thus made vacant and the good work started during the fall term, is being continued this winter. This school is having a very profitable year.

At the Nelson Miss Drake is meeting with good success. She has fine methods acquired from our normal schools and in her school one can see how much help a young teacher with little previous teaching experience, can receive from one or two summer terms of normal training. It is unthinkable that any young teacher who intends to follow teaching as a profession should neglect the excellent training that our normal schools are now offering during the summer vacations at so little cost. A trained teacher in every school in Maine by 1930 is the goal towards which we are striving. What an opportunity is opened up to every young man or woman who is ambitious to forge ahead in this world!

A retrospect of the schools of Hebron: What will it reveal? Is the teaching standard up to that of past years? Is it any better?

Human judgement is not infallible. The Roman Pontiff is the only man I know who claims infallibility and many of us are not willing to concede it even to him. Are our schools standing still or retrograding when all other human endeavors are stamped with ear-marks of progress? I do not believe it. I believe we are making progress as rapidly in our schools as we are in any other line of human effort.

New toilets were constructed at No. 8 this summer and this school building is now in fine condition. According to the standards of construction adopted by our State Dept. of Education this is a perfect school building. The lighting, heating, ventilation and toilet arrangements are in harmony with accepted standards. All the school buildings in town are in very fair condition and they are good representatives of the type of building that was in vogue when these buildings were constructed. They have been kept in good repair and are comfortable. Some minor repairs on the desks are needed.

The school at Sodom is in session this winter. It was not deemed advisable to convey the pupils such a distance at this time of the year. Doubtless in a few years this school will have to be closed for good.

At the last annual town meeting sufficient money was raised to maintain a school year of 36 weeks. This gives a school year of the same length as that maintained by our cities and large towns. I am very glad that the people saw fit to do this. It shows a very fine public spirit in behalf of the schools.

There are at present fifteen Hebron students engaged in secondary school work; seven in Buckfield High, six in Hebron Academy, and two in Lee Academy. These represent a class of students who value the worth of an education and they are willing to undergo sacrifices to obtain one. While I do not know the kind of work they are doing at the two Academies mentioned above as they are not under my supervision I do know that those at the Buckfield High are making good.

The following attendance statistics are taken from the teachers' registers and from the records of my regular visits to the schools:

It will be observed from the above tables that the attendance was much better during the fall term than it was during the spring term. This may have resulted from several causes,—better service on the part of attendance officers, better attitude towards the schools on the part of the pupils, or less moving about on the part of the parents. Whatever may have been the cause the fact is evident and it may well give satisfaction to those who have the interest of the schools at heart. One surprising fact is the evidence of improvement in the attendance at the Nelson school. Here for several past years we have had more or less trouble with some of the children about attending school. These children have left town and their place is taken by other children who give us no trouble about attending school.

It is always customary in rural sections of Maine to close a report of this nature by a financial statement covering all expenditures in the various departments of school affairs. This report is no exception to the general rule and below will be given what I believe to be a faithful account of all expenditures.

# Warrant for Town Meeting

State of Maine

County of Oxford, ss.

To L. E. Whitman, a constable in the town of Hebron, in said county:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Hebron, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Hebron Grange Hall in said town on the first day of March, 1926, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will accept the report as printed.
- Art. 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- Art. 5. To choose a chairman to the board of selectmen.
- Art. 6. To choose a second selectman.
- Art. 7. To choose a third selectman.
- Art. 8. To choose a board of Assessors.
- Art. 9. To choose one member of Board of Overseers of Poor for three years.
- Art. 10. To choose a road commissioner for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.
- Art. 11. To choose one member of school board for three years.
- Art. 12. To choose a collector and fix his compensation.
- Art. 13. To choose a fire ward and fix his compensation.
- Art. 14. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for summer work on roads and bridges and patrol labor.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter work.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for town officers' bills.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous account.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for A. A. Dwinal Post, for Memorial Day.

Art. 22. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$300 to repair No. 4 Hill, by making better ditches and by putting in suitable culverts and bars to prevent the water from washing the road, also by cutting down and filling in at the bottom of the steepest pitch and by doing any other work necessary to put the road in a more permanent condition.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School, according to the school laws of 1903.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for superintendent's salary for 1926.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for common schools.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to pay each member of the superintending school committee annually \$5.00 for each meeting, if attended, of the joint committee of the towns composing the Union, and \$2 for each meeting of the local committee attended, a record of the attendance of each member of the committee at these meetings to be kept by the superintendent of schools and given to the selectmen at the end of the year so each member may receive pay according to the provisions of this article.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school committee, office expense account, textbooks and for repairs.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to maintain for the coming year, any school, the average attendance of which for this school year is less than eight pupils, if in the opinion of the committee such maintenance seems advisable.



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Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Aid road work, according to Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for dependent children.

Art. 34. To hear report from librarian committee and act on same.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Moody Public Library.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to instruct its treasurer by the written consent of the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 38. To see if town will vote to abate the real estate tax of Mrs. Ella Johnson for the year of 1925.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$65, it being the overdraft in 1924.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 for fire patrol.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$200 to widen and gravel the road leading from Ralph Pierce's driveway to State Aid No. 2.

Art. 42. To see if town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$150 to straighten a curve in the road near W. H. Packard's.

Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer to execute the necessary papers to release the town's right on account of tax sales.

Art. 44. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not and have you this warrant with your doings thereon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
