## Superintendent of Schools' Report

---

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sherman:*

I hereby present my annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the town of Sherman for the year 1909 and 1910.

I have attended to all the duties required of me by law, and to all the duties assigned me by the school board. It has required a considerable portion of the year to become acquainted with existing conditions, and to decide upon those changes which were necessary and needed. I have made no radical changes, preferring to bring about the desired changes gradually.

I found the physical conditions governing the schools in fairly good order, with the exception of No. 1 and No. 2. The building at No. 1 needs extensive repairs and new furniture, while the condition of the building at the village is too well known to need any comment from me. If the building is to continue to be used for school purposes there is imperative need that some system of drainage be found that will keep the basement free from water. New floors are needed, the smaller room needs to be doubled in size, and the light, heat and ventilation are very poor at the present time.

### COURSE OF STUDY

Efforts have been made to continue the course of study which was given in outline by my predecessor. It takes several years, and is a very difficult matter to take an ungraded school and bring it into any system of regularity for several reasons: 1st, the older pupils have taken too much of some studies and not enough of others; 2nd, the attendance of the older pupils, especially in planting and digging time is very irregular. We have made greater advancement with the younger pupils in this line than with the



older. But here again we meet difficulties, for as soon as cold weather sets in the younger ones drop out and stay at home.

In spite of all these difficulties we feel that considerable advancement has been made along this line, and expect to do better next year.

We are at present at work on a course of study which will outline the work in detail for the teacher, and render her material assistance in showing just how much a pupil should accomplish.

### TEXT BOOKS

We found the text books, on the whole, in very good condition. In my estimation the grammar and language books in use at the present time are not in any way suitable and should be changed at once. New copy books have been put into the schools. New readers have been partially introduced and the change should be completed as fast as new books are needed. The other books in the common schools are fairly good and up-to-date.

In case a high school should be established a considerable sum of money would be necessary for few of the books on hand at the present time would be suitable.

### SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

I have been very dissatisfied with the attendance this year. The town will never have first-class schools until there is a change in the sentiment of the people in regard to compelling their children to go to school. We cannot teach the children unless we can get them into the schools, and even then if they are irregular in attendance it is almost impossible to arouse their interest and enthusiasm. I wish I could state this matter so strongly and emphatically that every child and parent would make an especial effort to improve the attendance next year. While I fully understand the labor conditions which prevailed last fall, yet these same conditions will probably be found next fall and so on; meanwhile your boys and girls are the sufferers because of a limited education.

## HIGH SCHOOL

On account of the new State law which went into effect last July, the town is debarred from receiving State aid for high school purposes unless it maintains a school under one of the three following classes :

Class A, which includes those schools which maintain at least one approved course of study through four years of thirty-six weeks, and of standard grade, with approved laboratory equipment, and at least two teachers, and expend for instruction at least eight hundred and fifty dollars exclusive of tuition.

Class B, which includes those schools which maintain one approved course of study through two years of thirty-six weeks and of standard grade with approved equipment and expend for instruction at least five hundred dollars exclusive of tuition.

Class C, which includes those schools which maintain at least one approved course of study through four years of thirty weeks each, and must expend at least four hundred and fifty dollars exclusive of tuition.

The State will reimburse any town maintaining a school under any one of these three classes to two-thirds of the amount expended for instruction, no town to receive more than five hundred dollars.

The question whether you will have a high school or not is a very important one to you just now, for the present state of affairs is having a most demoralizing effect upon your common schools. The trouble in the grammar school was due as much to the presence of those boys and girls who ought to have been in high school, as it was to the incompetency of the teacher. The matter ought to be discussed in a fair, candid and impartial manner, in order that whatever decision is arrived at may be for the best interests of the town.

It is the privilege, or rather, it is the duty of the superintendent of schools to make a study of the conditions and needs of the schools in town, and to point out and recommend to the committee and citizens ways and means which, in his estimation, will improve them ; and it is in this spirit that I wish to state that the present conditions are injuring your schools, and that the best thing you can

do to improve them is to build a new school house with adequate provision for the two grade schools and a high school. Do not think that I am trying to force these opinions upon you. I offer them as, in my opinion, the wisest solution of the problem. If you do not see fit to adopt them I shall endeavor to cheerfully carry out your wishes, whatever they may be.

## TEACHERS

The hardest task which devolves upon the superintendent is the selection of competent and suitable teachers. Teachers who are very successful in one place may be miserable failures in another. There is a decided lack of suitable teachers for country schools. You cannot get a trained teacher to go into a country school, because there are so many openings in the graded schools of villages and cities. There has been one complete failure, but there were conditions which made this school difficult. The other teachers have all done creditable work, and some have excelled. I wish to especially commend the work of the teachers in No. 3, No. 5 and No. 2, Primary. In three schools the same teachers have taught throughout the year, and in five others the same teachers have taught for two terms.

Thus you see, comparatively few changes have been made in the teaching force during the year. On the whole, we have had faithful and conscientious teachers who have labored hard for the welfare of the school and the community.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the School Board, teachers and citizens for the very pleasant relations which have existed between us, and also for their many kind words and helpful suggestions.
