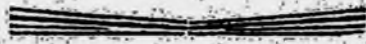

## Report of the Selectmen

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron:

Revised Statutes, Chapter 4, Section 41

At the meeting of the Selectmen of the Town of Hebron, held on the 1st day of the month of January, 1891, the Selectmen, in pursuance of the provisions of the Revised Statutes, Chapter 4, Section 41, do hereby report to the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, that with the expenditures of the money of a Town the morning of each annual meeting make a full printed report of all their financial transactions in and during the municipal year, immediately preceding, with an account of the receipts and disbursements during that period, and to whom and for what purpose each item of the same was paid, with a statement in detail of the indebtedness and resources of the Town.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Hebron:

I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

The past year has been very satisfactory from an educational viewpoint. It is the first time in three years that the schools have not been broken up more or less by contagious diseases. Regular attendance by pupils is an important factor in maintaining a strong educational program. Pupil progress has been excellent and much credit is due to the faithful efforts of the teaching force.

## TEACHERS

Three of the five schools in Hebron had new teachers, beginning with the fall term in September. Although the turn over was some larger than last year, yet adjustments have been made readily and successfully. The town now has the best trained corps of teachers of any time for several years. Every teacher has had professional training, varying from one to three or four years, and in addition to this, teaching experience ranging from three years upwards. Experience is a most valuable adjunct to professional training, and the children have profited by this combination.

## TEXT BOOKS

The policy of replacing the obsolete textbooks with modern publications has been carried out again this year. The old geography books have been removed and each school supplied with a new series containing maps harmonizing with present geographical boundaries. The subject matter is also the product of modern research and arranged according to well established pedagogy.

The needs are still great for modern text books. By introducing a new series each year, the schools will soon be well supplied without any noticeable increase in appropriations.

---

## REPAIRS

The school buildings are in a very good condition. With a few minor repairs, the schools may be placed in satisfactory shape for another year. The estimated appropriation for this item has been considerably reduced.

### Suggested repairs:

Nelson: blackboard, hinges for door.

Academy: ceiling repaired, floor oiled, two window panes, chimney topped out.

Brighton Hill: new door panel, new covers in boys' toilet.

Sodom: seats loose—need new bolts, water cooler.

## FINANCIAL

The financial report would have shown a large balance in favor of the town had it not been for a large increase in tuition for secondary education. We are glad to see boys and girls going on to higher schools, but the expenses must be cared for in the school appropriations. It will be shown further on in this report that the town paid about a thousand dollars more this year than last for tuition. Prospective conveyance pupils made it necessary to include another one hundred and fifty dollars in the budget, and just now a letter from the State Commissioner of Education informs that the state school fund will be reduced six per cent. next year. However, the budget totals only about five hundred dollars more than last year's appropriations.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

1. More yard room is needed at the Academy school. Due to the kindness of the neighbors, the children have had considerably more than the present school yard for a play ground. A change of ownership might deprive the children of a proper playground. A piece of land may be purchased at the present time if the town desires.

2. It is also recommended that a health officer be appointed, who will also be a school physician. Such an officer should be secured to co-operate with the county nurse in examining all school children.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to citizens, teachers, and town officials, who have helped to make the past year pleasant and successful.

- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter work.
- Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regard to snow removal for the ensuing year, and raise money if needed.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting bushes.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Town Officers' bills.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for miscellaneous account.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for A. A. Dwinal Post for Memorial Day.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School, according to the School Laws of 1903.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Common Schools.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for superintendent's salary for 1931.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school committee, office expense account, text books and for repairs.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to continue school where an average attendance of eight pupils has not been maintained the past year, if they consider it necessary.

Art. 28. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to match \$50.00 of State money for Blister Rust Control work.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the maximum amount of \$2,665.00 in accordance with provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157 of the Public Laws of 1919 for the construction of a State Aid Highway through the towns of Minot, Hebron and Paris. This to continue the work of last year.

Art. 31. To hear report from Library Committee and act on same.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Moody Library.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to instruct its treasurer by the written consent of the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for payment of interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$30.00 toward the support of county public health nursing under the State Department of Health to continue work with mothers and children.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 37. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$75.00 from the Z. L. Packard Relief Corp, this to be placed with the fund which the town already has as a monument fund.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$150.00 to cut bushes and maintain State Aid road to entitle the town to receive State apportionment.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$570.00 to maintain Third Class road to entitle town to receive third class road money from the State.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to cut bushes and maintain resolve road, to entitle the town to receive resolve money from the state.

Art. 41. To see what action the town will take in regard to snow fence and raise money if needed.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote and raise the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of widening our town roads where needed, to allow the plowing out of our winter roads, to the width of fourteen feet as required by the State law to entitle the town to receive state aid for plowing winter roads.

Art. 43. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as made out by the selectmen.

Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to buy land of Mrs. Leavett for a school yard at the Academy school and raise money for same.

Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to instruct the auto tax collector to assess the fee of (25) twenty-five cents for collecting the auto tax from the owner of the car.

Art. 46. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not and have you this warrant with your doings thereon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at the Grange Hall, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.
